Jesus taught in Parables

Jesus was a teacher. In any definition or description of Jesus we will find the term teacher used to describe him. When we look for his method of teaching what is most striking is that he used parables – parables seem to be his favourite method of teaching. In particular, he likes to respond with a parable when he is asked a direct question. For example, today's parable is a response to the question: *Who is my neighbour*?

There are many definitions of parables but I find this one from the scripture scholar, C.H. Dodd, especially helpful: "At its simplest the parable is a metaphor or simile drawn from nature or common life, arresting the hearer by its vividness or strangeness, and leaving the mind in sufficient doubt about its precise application to tease it into active thought".

The example from everyday life that Jesus draws in response to the above question is a mugging – that is certainly familiar to us, people are mugged every day in London. It is the response of the passers-by that surprises and shocks. The priest and Levite should have helped or would be expected to have helped! The Samaritan helps in an extravagant or exaggerated way.

The lawyer in the end must conclude that the Samaritan proves himself neighbour to the victim of the mugging. Jesus' final exhortation is "Go and do the same yourself". Only by doing the same, putting charity into action, will the lawyer discover the answer to his question. The word "neighbour" implies relationship, the question cannot be answered with a sterile explanation of definition, the answer can only be found by active engagement with others.

In the above definition by C.H. Dodd we have two characteristics that should be in all good teaching and especially in all good Christian teaching. Firstly it must "arrest the hearer by its vividness or strangeness". In other words there must be something to make us wake up and listen, an element of surprise or an unexpected twist or outcome. The same old words we have heard over and over again do not "arrest" us.

That is not enough however. We must be left with "sufficient doubt about its precise application". The listener or student must be "teased" into actively engaging with mind and heart in the particular issue or subject.

The truths of the Christian faith and their application in an individual's life must be discovered in an active and personal way. They can never be imposed from above or reduced to definitions, systems or practices. Christians are not robots or slaves, they are free, intelligent and creative human beings. The parables are teachings designed for just such people. We must actively engage with the parables, keep returning to them and look at them in different ways. For example, one day read this parable from the point of view of the Samaritan, another day the mugged person, another day the priest or Levite or inn-keeper. What is it like? How does it feel? What are the questions going through my mind? What are my fears, doubts, etc? In the midst of all of this, let the voice of God's Spirit enter in a free, open and new way. Be surprised, disturbed and enlightened by the outcome.
