‘Today a Saviour has been born to you’

“*Caesar Augustus issued a decree*” – with these words St Luke begins his account of the birth of Jesus Christ. Caesar Augustus, of course, never heard of Jesus – Joseph, Mary and Jesus are just another anonymous family in a remote outpost of his vast empire. However, decisions taken by this Emperor are the reason Mary must give birth in a stable, a long way from home, in poverty, vulnerability and great danger. The plight of this family would probably be called “collateral damage” in modern political jargon. The first people to hear of this birth are shepherds “*who lived in the fields and good it in turns to watch their flocks during the night*”. The shepherds and Caesar Augustus live in the same world, the same era of history and are part of the same Roman Empire, yet their lives are worlds apart. God has chosen that it will be the shepherds rather than Caesar Augustus or any other figure with power, authority or money who will be the first to hear the greatest news humanity has ever heard: “*Today a saviour has been born to you*”.

The two biographical details we are given about the shepherds tell us so much. “They live in the fields” – therefore they are poor, homeless and isolated. “They take it in turn to look after their flocks” – therefore they are hardworking and responsible people. It is to these people that the saviour has been born: people with needs, whatever those needs are – physical, spiritual, economic cultural, emotional etc., and people who are prepared to take responsibility, make their contribution to society, to work, be generous, hospitable etc.

It is into this world with its mysteries, contradictions, failures, suffering, struggles, deprivations and pain that **a saviour has been born**. The shepherds symbolically stand for all of us, all who are in need of salvation, all who are open to hearing “*news of great joy*”. God has not been born into our world to solve our world’s problems, that we must do ourselves. Rather his birth communicates to us in the most radical way possible the message that God understands. God is born in poverty, vulnerability and danger. He welcomes the shepherds of the world and He understands our world with all its complications, contradictions and compromises. We are saved by a God who is one of us, one with us in all our pain and struggles and who shares our one destiny.

Caesar Augustus with all his power, wealth and honour could never have understood that he needed a poor and vulnerable new-born baby in order to be saved. Caesar Augustus could never have seen that his future destiny depended on this little baby.

As we look into the crib today, we see before us an image of our world. We see before us a parable of human life. We are controlled, deceived and manipulated by the most powerful, we are saved by the most vulnerable – life has not changed much in 2000 years, human nature is still the same and how we treat each other is still subject to similar traditions, hierarchies and prejudices. Likewise, God still acts in the same surprising, awesome and challenging ways. He enters our world and our lives today where we are most in need. He fills our hearts and minds with peace, joy and hope through the most astounding and unexpected means.
