Remembrance Sunday

We welcome you all to our Mass today, **Remembrance Sunday**, as we remember and pray for those who gave their lives in two world wars and in other conflicts of our time. We pray for those who have been bereaved and we pray for peace.

"They shall grow not old, as we that are left grow old. Age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn. At the going down of the sun and in the morning we will remember them."

Dedication of the Lateran Basilica

Today we have a change from our usual Sunday mass cycle and we celebrate the **Feast of the Dedication of the Lateran Basilica in Rome**, a feast traditionally celebrated, since the 12th century, on this day 9 November. This feast commemorates the dedication of the Basilica built by the Emperor Constantine on the Lateran Hill in the 4th century. This Basilica is considered to be the Mother Church of Christendom and is the seat of the Pope as Bishop of Rome.

I lived in Rome for three years and I have been back there a number of times since. I have studied and taken a keen interest in the history of early Christianity, especially when I lived and studied in Rome. In addition on numerous occasions I have showed visitors around the sights of Rome. Despite all this I could count on the fingers of one hand the number of times I have been in the Lateran Basilica. This fact keeps nagging and disturbing me as I reflect on what to write for this feast.

So I open the mass book to look at the readings and prayers for today's mass and I find another problem (see pages 116-119 of the parish mass book). Apart from the title given to the feast, there is no further mention of the Lateran Basilica! Among the many questions this raises I will single out two:

1. How important is the basilica Constantine built on the Lateran Hill in Rome to the worldwide Church of today? This is the easy question to answer: *not very much!!* It is a routine visit for pilgrims and tourists; occasionally it hosts liturgies and events of importance to the universal Church and it possesses many objects and records of historic and religious value. However, I guess its symbolic value has got lost somewhere in the midst of time.



- 2. What is it that we are really celebrating today? This is the difficult question to answer and any attempted answer runs the risk of getting bogged down in history, tradition and complex symbolism. I will pick out three directions to look in trying to understand this feast:
- (i) God is present in our world. The scriptures use many means to express the presence of God in our world and among his people -Ark of the Covenant, Tent, Jerusalem, Temple, Holy of Holies etc., places that give people a sense of being physically close to God.
- (ii) Church as Building: The New Testament often uses the image of a building to explain what the Church is. For example, in our second reading today, St Paul says to the Christians of Corinth "You are God's building".
- (iii) Buildings as symbols of God's Glory: Architecture, art, music, ritual, prayers etc. remind us not only of the presence of God among us in this world but also of the heavenly world. For example, in the Preface of our Mass today we hear these words: "Your house of prayer is also the promise of the Church in heaven. Here your love is always at work, preparing the Church on earth for its heavenly glory".

The Opening Prayer of our Mass tries to pull these three themes together in a rather complex set of wording: God our Father, from <u>living stones</u>, your chosen <u>people</u>, you <u>built</u> an eternal <u>temple</u> to your <u>glory</u>. Increase the spiritual gifts you have given to your <u>Church</u> so that your faithful <u>people</u> may continue to <u>grow</u> into the new and eternal <u>Jerusalem</u>.
