Sunday 30 November 2008 - First Sunday of Advent

Prophet Isaiah

Today we begin the **Season of Advent** and our first reading is from the prophet Isaiah. Apart from the Gospels and Psalms, more of our Sunday Mass readings come from Isaiah than from any other book of the bible (in fact its nearest rival is a long way behind!). There is a variety of reasons why Isaiah is chosen so often but the most important is Isaiah's influence on Christian thinking and particularly the influence of this book on our understanding of who Jesus is.

Let us illustrate this with two examples: At Christmas we hear of Jesus as **Emmanuel** (meaning '*God with us*') and in Holy Week we hear of Jesus as the **Suffering Servant** – these two very important understandings of the identity of Jesus come from Isaiah. From the book of Isaiah we learn a little of who Isaiah was: He was called to be a prophet "in the year King Uzziah died" 742BC. He is married to a woman who is designated as a prophetess and has two sons. He exercised his prophetic ministry in and around Jerusalem and from his writing style and other evidence it would appear that he was highly educated and from the upper classes. The main political power in the region was Assyria, and Isaiah ministered in a period when Assyria was threatening and taking over control of its neighbours.

Isaiah's ministry probably ended around 701BC when King Hezekiah, whom Isaiah strongly opposed, led a disastrous revolt against Assyria, resulting in humiliating defeat and economic ruin.

The book of Isaiah as we have it in the bible is a rather complex book written over almost three centuries. What Isaiah himself wrote is found in the first 39 chapters and the rest is written by later authors, some (chapters 40-55) during the period of exile in Babylon and some later again when the exiles have returned to Judah.

Isaiah contains some of the most beautiful and profound writing in scripture and has some of the bible's finest poetry. It is difficult to summarise the teaching of Isaiah but the following points are to be noted:

- * There is one God and he is the ruler of all.
- * All earthly power is vastly inferior.
- * The people of God have cut themselves off from God by sin.
- * Pride is the greatest of all sin.
- * God wants his people to repent and open their hearts to him.



- * God is faithful to his people and will not let them down.
- * The people must put total trust in God.
- * The people's future destiny is in God's hands and God is already preparing that future.

We see most of these themes and much more woven together in our extract today. As we go through Advent and into Christmas, Isaiah will challenge us, guide us and inspire us to prepare more fully for the coming of the Messiah.
