The Gospel According to Mark

Mark's Gospel opens with this remarkable line: '*The beginning of the Good News about Jesus Christ, the Son of God*'. Is this meant to be a title or prologue or preface? Who knows, but we can take it to be all three. This line tells us all we need to know as we begin reading this fascinating account of the life and death of Jesus. Let us look a little closer at what we have here:

Beginning: This takes our minds back to the story of creation, the beginning of everything. This is the story of One who existed before creation and *through whom all things are made* [words of the Creed]. Our meeting with Jesus, the subject of this story, is the real *beginning*.

The Gospel is a new beginning for all who read it, and as we read it and accept its contents, we are beginning a whole new life. Mark is not setting out to tell us the whole story – only the beginning. There is no ending to Mark's Gospel just as there is no ending to our discipleship of Jesus Christ.

Good News: This could also be translated as **Gospel.** This is the announcement of the greatest news humanity will ever hear. At the time Mark was writing, this term had already been used by Paul in his letters to describe the content of all that he and the other apostles preached. Now with Mark it also becomes the name of four documents that tells us the life of Jesus, of which Mark's is the first to be written.

Jesus: As I have already said, Jesus is the subject of this story - it is all about Jesus. There are two questions that we must always keep in mind as we read Mark's Gospel:

Who is Jesus? What does it mean to become a disciple of his?

Christ or **Messiah:** Jesus is the fulfilment of all that the scriptures long for. We will hear this term again in the Gospel: Peter will profess his faith with these words, "*You are the Christ*", and when Jesus is dying on the cross the chief priest and scribes mock him saying, "*Let the Christ, the king of Israel, come down from the Cross now, for us to see it and believe*".

Here the chief priests and scribes express one of the central difficulties for believers in Mark's Gospel: How do we believe in a Christ or Messiah who suffers and dies; if he is who he claims to be, then why does he not save himself??



Son of God: We are told this three more times in Mark's Gospel, twice by God the Father [at Jesus' baptism and at the transfiguration] and by the Roman centurion after Jesus dies. However, this is the central fact we must remember whenever we read a passage of Mark's Gospel. This is the story of Jesus, Son of God. Sometimes Mark's Gospel has been described as the story of the death of Jesus with a long introduction – the life, teaching and miracles of Jesus are really an introduction to his death. This then is the story of the rejection, suffering and death of the Son of God. How do we accept or understand this?

I said at the beginning that the introductory line tells us all we need to know in order to begin reading this Gospel, it also introduces us to the questions this Gospel frustratingly leaves unanswered. Jesus is the Christ or Messiah and the Son of God; he is also the one who is rejected by friends and opponents alike, who suffers and who finally dies. Both his disciples and his opponents, indeed everyone who meets Jesus in Mark's Gospel, struggle to come to terms with this fact. Every disciple of Jesus in any situation or era of history must struggle with the same mysteries and unanswered questions.
