The Epiphany of the Lord

Today we are told of "wise men" coming from the "East" to see Jesus. Who were these people? Scholars, explorers, scientists, religious leaders, elders of some distant tribe??? We do not know, there is a certain mystery about these visitors. Perhaps we are not meant to know, we can draw our own conclusions.

What we do know is that these people came from a distant land and are not Jewish, therefore they do not know the scriptures and are unfamiliar with the religion, culture and traditions Jesus is born into. This means these "wise men" have quite a lot in common with all of us. These are people of learning, people searching for truth and meaning, people who are prepared to take risks and go any distance necessary in order to discover and learn. These people value knowledge, education and new discovery.

One could argue that with the visit of the "wise men" there begins what will become a very important tradition in the Church: learning, research, exploration, scientific study [for example, almost all the great universities of Europe began either as monasteries or theological colleges]. The search for God and the search for the truth about all he created are one and the same work. The "wise men" understood this and that is why their search led them to the stable in Bethlehem. They fall on their knees and do homage before the child "through whom all things came to be, not one thing had its being but through him [words of John's Gospel].

So the "wise men" see that everything they study, research, explore and wonder about has been created by this child and could not stay in existence one moment without His sustaining power. The "wise men" know something else also and once more we will let John's Gospel express it for us: "All that came to be had life in him, and that life was the light of men, a light that shines in the dark, a light that darkness could not overpower". Put simply, this means we need Jesus in order to discover truth and in order not to be deceived – Jesus is the light that guides humanity in its search for the truths, mysteries and treasures hidden in his creation. The "wise men" represent all human beings who are genuinely searching for truth, meaning and knowledge. Their search led them to the source of truth itself. All that scientists, researchers, explorers and scholars discover has been designed and created by God and the end point

God Himself. The well known words of St Edith Stein put this very well for us: "God is truth. Those who seek truth, seek God, whether they know it or not".
