Sunday 18 July 2010 - Sixteenth Sunday of the Year

Abraham – at the Oak of Mamre

Abraham lived some time in the period 2000-1500 BC. The Book of Genesis gives us extensive accounts of his life, his family and his travels. Abraham's journey takes him from Ur of the Chaldaeans, which was in Mesopotamia [modern Iraq], in a north-west direction to Haran [modern Syria]. Then after many years he travels south to Canaan, then to the Negev and from there to Egypt. Later he returns from Egypt and settles at Hebron where he dies and is buried. Today's episode takes place at the Oak of Mamre which is near Hebron.

This travel may seem unusual to us but the route taken is linked by historians with the migrations of the Amorrite tribes throughout the course of the second Millennium BC. The story of Abraham is the story of God entering the lives of these nomadic peoples. The bible beautifully tells us that Abraham travelled "at the pace of his flocks". For nomadic peoples and for those who lived in the desert, hospitality was a particularly prised virtue. In today's first reading we are invited to experience the hospitality of an ancient nomadic people.

The scriptures beautifully weave the story of God into the story of the everyday lives of these people. God is the great respecter of people's customs, tradition and lifestyles. God is part of the people's culture and they understand him in the context of their own traditions and beliefs. The culture and lifestyle may be very different but the reality of God is exactly the same.

Abraham is our "Father in faith" and his life experience, and especially his journeys, have come to symbolise the faith of all people. God meets us where we are in life and if we are open to his presence, then we are taken on a great journey. Christians have always seen the three visitors as a symbol of God as Trinity, God coming as human and into the midst of human life is also seen as a prophecy of Jesus, the second person of the Trinity, becoming human.

Another symbolic interpretation of this text is seeing the three visitors as symbols of the three religions that profess the faith of Abraham: Judaism, Christianity and Islam. Abraham is the point of origin and unity of these three religions.

There are many ways we can read and interpret this text but perhaps we need, first and foremost, to see it as a beautiful story of life, culture and faith. We are invited into the lives of Abraham and Sarah that we may be given the courage and inspiration to allow God into our lives. There is an "Oak of Mamre" in each of our lives – a place where God comes to us and wants to meet us. If, like Abraham and Sarah, we allow Him in and make Him welcome, then great and unexpected things will happen, life will be transformed for ever.
