Day for Life

The "Day for Life" is celebrated yearly by the Catholic Churches of England, Wales, Scotland and Ireland. It is a day dedicated to raising awareness about the meaning and value of human life at every stage and in every condition. This year the theme is *the meaning of Christian death* and the care of those who are dying. I quote from the official communication for today:

"Human death is not only a physical and psychological process, it is also a spiritual reality. Without this dimension, all our attempts to understand death and dying remain limited and impoverished. In faith we know that all life has a value which cannot be measured or bargained away. No matter how short it may be, or whatever its condition, every life has a purpose and contains a grace. This is why we should not allow ourselves to be persuaded that incapacity or impairment somehow lessen the value of a person's life or make them less able to enrich others and give glory to God in whose image they are made and continue to grow. We do not possess our lives as we possess some material object, to be used and then disposed of at will. **Life** is a gift we hold from God, who not only gives life but redeems it".

Death is not a subject we like thinking about and even less talking about it – particularly those who are young enough or healthy enough to put death on some hidden horizon. When we do think about our own death, many uncomfortable questions come up: When? How? Will I suffer? Will it be quick? Slow? Will I die alone? Will I die loved? Successful? Remembered?

Equally, we do not like speaking with another person about their death: Will I upset the person? Cause embarrassment? Perhaps he/she might ask uncomfortable questions! Will I sound despondent? We can add so many questions, fears and deep feelings to these lists.

There are some very interesting moments in the Gospels when Jesus tries to speak with his disciples about his impending death: they do not listen, do not understand, they change the subject, they argue among themselves, etc.

Jesus dies in great suffering, he faces fears and anxieties, he is rejected by friends, mocked by enemies, there is no dignity in his death, he even feels

God has abandoned Him. We can say that the death of Jesus contains most of the fears, anxieties, worries we have about our own deaths. Jesus does not take the pain, fear and mystery out of death, rather he goes there with us, accompanies us and saves us through it.

For Jesus, death is the most profound spiritual moment in his life, the time when God is closest, when he is doing God's will most fully, when he is saving all humanity and fulfilling his mission on earth [but it does not seem like this to him!].

We are all going to die, that is the only certainty we have. Everything else about death is mystery. Our Christian faith gives us great strength, wisdom, comfort and hope as we face the reality of death. Death is our final calling [vocation] from God, it is our greatest act of trust in God and it is the fulfilment of everything we live for and hope for.

The spiritual message of today is summed up in the **Prayers of Cardinal John Henry Newman** as follows:

May He support us all the day long, till the shades lengthen and the evening comes, and the busy world is hushed, and the fever of life is over, and our work is done. Then in His mercy may He give us a safe lodging, and a holy rest and peace at the last.

Oh, my Lord and Saviour, support me in that hour in the strong arms of your Sacraments, and by the fresh fragrance of Your consolations. Let the absolving words be said over me, and the holy oil sign and seal me, and Your own Body be my food, and Your Blood my sprinkling; and let my sweet Mother, Mary, breathe on me, and my Angel whisper peace to me, and my glorious Saints smile upon me; that in them all, and through them all, I may receive the gift of perseverance, and die, as I desire to live, in Your faith, in Your Church, in Your service, and in Your love, *Amen*.
