Bombus barbutellus	Barbut's Cuckoo-bee	Resident. Rare, distribution unknown
Bombus bohemicus	Gypsy Cuckoo-bee	Resident. Widespread and fairly common except in outer North Isles
Bombus cryptarum	White-tailed Bumblebee	Resident. One of three species hiding under the name of <i>B. lucorum</i> . Difficult to identify, status uncertain, but almost certainly widespread and common
Bombus distinguendus	Great yellow Bumblebee	Resident. Widespread but uncommon
Bombus hortorum	Garden Bumblebee	Resident. Widespread and common
Bombus jonellus	Heath Bumblebee	Resident. Widespread and locally common
Bombus lapidarius	Red-tailed Bumblebee	Extinct. Last recorded in 1938
Bombus lucorum sensu lato.	White-tailed Bumblebee	Resident. A cryptic species group including <i>B lucorum sensu stricto, B cryptarum</i> and <i>B magnus</i> . Widespread and very common
Bombus lucorum sensu stricto	White-tailed Bumblebee	Resident. Difficult to identify, status uncertain, but probably locally common
Bombus magnus	Northern White-tailed Bumblebee	Difficult to identify, status uncertain. Probably does not occur
Bombus muscorum	Moss Carder-bee	Resident. Widespread and generally uncommon, but locally common in North Isles
Bombus pascuorum	Common Carder-bee	Resident. Widespread and very common, but absent from North Ronaldsay. A fairly recent immigrant.
Bombus soroeensis	Broken-belted Bumblebee	Probable vagrant. Recorded once, in 2011. Resident in north Scotland
Bombus terrestris	Buff-tailed Bumblebee	Resident. Widespread and common. A recent immigrant.
	Buil-tailed Builiblebee	Resident. Widespread and common. A recent inimigrant.

Andrena coitana	Small Flecked Mining Bee	Resident. Rare, Mainland only
Andrena scotica	Chocolate Mining Bee	Possibly resident. Recorded once, in 2018
Andrena tarsata	Tormentil Mining bee	Resident. Local and uncommon, Hoy and Mainland only
Colletes succinctus	Heather Colletes	Resident. Very local, Hoy only

Dolichovespula norvegica	Norwegian Wasp	Resident. Local, absent outer North Isles
Dolichovespula sylvestris	Tree wasp	Resident. Locally common, absent outer North Isles
Vespula vulgaris	Common Wasp	Resident. Very locally common, absent North Isles
Vespa crabro	Hornet	A stowaway. Recorded once, in 2018

Ancistrocerus oviventris	a mason wasp	Resident. Widespread, fairly common
Ancistrocerus parietinus	a mason wasp	Resident. Rare, Mainland only
Ancistrocerus scoticus	a mason wasp	Resident. Widespread but uncommon
Chrysis ignita sens. lat.	a cuckoo wasp	Resident. A cryptic species group including <i>C. impressa</i> and <i>C. rutiliventris</i> , which have been claimed. Local, Hoy and Mainland only
Priocnemis parvula	a spider-hunter wasp	Resident. Rare, Hoy and Mainland only
Rhopalum clavipes	a digger wasp	Resident? Recorded once, in 2011. Resident in north Scotland
Vespula austriaca	Cuckoo Wasp	Resident? Recorded twice, in 2006. Resident in north Scotland

Lasius emarginatus	The House Ant	An accidental introduction in vegetables. Recorded once, in 2004. A southern species, now resident in England

Lasius niger sens. str.	a black ant	Scotland.  Rarely recorded but status unknown. Probably overlooked and may be resident. Hoy and Mainland
Leptothorax acervorum	Slender Ant	only. A common species in Scotland.
Myrmica ruginodis	a red ant	Resident. Widespread and locally common
