OFC Newsletter for Spring and Summer 2008

Its incredible to realise that a whole year has passed since the publication of the 2007 Newsletter. Then everyone was full of optimism for the summer ahead. Now perhaps all we should say is "Can this one really be as bad as last year?!

We owe members a word of explanation about the rationale behind the way we fit events into the OFC calendar. The timing is largely dictated by what species of plant, bird, mammal, insect, etc, are around and at their best at a particular time of year and the date can be critical to within a few days. For example it would be very unusual to find a black darter dragonfly before the 7th July, although soon after that date their flight period commences.

Up until the end of May few flowering plants are in evidence whereas April and early May can be a good time for seeing displaying raptors and waterbirds in their finest breeding plumage. By the end of May most male ducks will have left their breeding sites while the females complete incubation and the rearing of young, and soon after that the males moult into their drab eclipse plumage. Very early June brings out a large number of coastal heath flower species while the rest of June and early July see many other flowering plants at their best. Early August is a good time for heathers and other moorland species. Early July to late August is the optimum time for most dragonflies, butterflies and moths and mid-August for grasshoppers (and midges!). August is a good time for searching rock-pools for marine creatures when the sea temperature is at its maximum. Late September and October are rewarding times for looking at fungi and ferns. Back in May there can be good "falls" of spring bird migrants but these are too unpredictable on Mainland to be worth planning an event for. The autumn "falls", however, are much more predictable and, although varying greatly in extent depending on the weather, usually present some reasonable birdwatching opportunities. Lastly, the conditions of December are ideal for looking for a turkey - roast with all the trimmings!

Don't forget that we value the opinions and wishes of our members as to the nature of our events and the way they are conducted, so please don't hesitate to phone, email or write to any of the committee members with your ideas. Out in the field our more "expert" members will gladly give assistance with identification of species and answer requests for information.

OFC Programme

For trips involving ferries or car-sharing please book with the contact **2 weeks** in advance so that we can work out transport arrangements. For other outdoor meetings phone the contact a few days beforehand. Where possible last minute changes will be notified on Radio Orkney. We suggest that you bring binoculars, notebook, hand lens, packed lunch, weather proof clothing and waterproof footwear, also midge repellent from late June onwards.

Please remember that youngsters under 16 must be accompanied by a parent or close family friend. As usual to promote the mutual study, enjoyment and conservation of wildlife we include the RSPB local Group programme. Both programmes will also be published in the OCEAN calendar which is due out in early April.

Some Recent Records

The fine weather over much of the period of the autumn migration meant that not many birds ended up off course in Orkney and as a result few passerine migrants over-wintered. Numbers of fieldfares, redwings and bramblings have been well below normal. A notable exception has been the siskin which had its biggest autumn passage through Orkney for many years and now we are seeing a steady trickle through the County moving back northwards.

A fine male bullfinch has been in the vicinity of Finstown for some weeks and a flock of goldfinches has appeared regularly in the same area.

A grey phalarope was a nice Christmas present for Deerness folk when it took up residence near the slip at Newark Bay on Christmas Eve and stayed for a couple of months. Phalaropes are swimming waders and spin their bodies to stir up the water and bring food items to the surface. They are also very approachable so that watchers had superb views of this elegant bird employing its unusual feeding technique.

A handsome drake smew found at the Loch of Skaill on 12th Nov 07, although somewhat elusive, has stayed the winter. This could be the same bird that wintered there 2 years ago.

A very pale juvenile rough-legged buzzard turned up at St Peter's Pool, Deerness, in early November. After several days it disappeared and not long after a similarly pale juvenile was seen in the Rendall hills. Presumably the same bird, it has stayed in Rendall until the present time. Many local birdwatchers have been able to get great views of this superb raptor.

The star winter visitors were 2 common cranes which were discovered near Finstown on 5th Jan. Their arrival coincided with that of another 14 cranes in north-east Scotland. Although the mainland Scotland birds stayed for a few weeks (some perhaps until now) the Orkney cranes were not seen again after the 5th. What is notable is that this is the only mid-winter visit to Orkney of this species ever recorded.

As usual at this time of year cetacean records are nearly all of strandings. Thus on 5^{th} Jan there was the carcass of a fin whale found at Newark Bay; a minke whale stranded at Grobust on Westray. Scapa was the scene of two harbour porpoise strandings, a freshly dead adult on 23^{rd} Jan and a juvenile on 8^{th} March.

On a brighter note a member had a close view from his car of a young otter at the Brig of Brodgar at about 9am on 6th March. The otter was about to cross the road from the Loch of Stenness to the Loch of Harray but was startled by the approaching car and did a quick about turn back into Stenness.

Bequest to OFC of Land in Orphir

Mr Thomas Wilson and his wife lived at Midland Cottage overlooking the Bay of Houton for 10 years after his retirement in 1986. Mr Wilson had started his teaching career at Lyness on Hoy and had then moved to southern Scotland where he taught at a number of schools progressing to the post of headmaster. He had a life-long interest in gardening and enjoyed the peace and tranquillity of the countryside. Sadly Mr Wilson died in 1996 but very graciously he bequeathed the area of land next to Midland Cottage to the Field Club to be managed as a wildlife haven. Mrs Wilson found the property too much to manage on her own and moved to Kirkwall. Recently she instructed solicitors to expedite the transfer of the land to OFC and the process has just been completed.

The land which abuts on to the main road consists largely of a beautiful area of pristine heather and, next to the road, a large patch of coarse grasses and some trees and shrubs. To repay the debt we owe to Mr Wilson and to honour his memory we must now decide how best to manage the land for wildlife.
