Please Send in Your Wildlife Records

It is very important that as many people as possible should contribute their wildlife records to the Orkney Biodiversity Record Centre database (OBRC). By consulting the database, developers are able to minimise the adverse impact their projects might have on the County's wildlife habitat.

Please send your records to the appropriate County Recorder (who collates them at the end of each year and forwards them to the OBRC) or send them direct to the OBRC yourself. Full details of how and what to record and the contact details of the Recorders are included in the back pages of the Club Bulletin (the Orkney Naturalist).

While it is of value to post your sightings on The Orkney Nature Forum or on Orkbird (and we hope you continue to do so) neither the Club nor the OBRC have the resources to trawl through these to extract and validate records.

Alien Mammals

Until recently all the signs were that the introduced population of **Stoats** in Orkney was in terminal decline. There had been no Stoat sightings for several months and none had been caught during the trapping programme set up by SNH.

Recently however there have been a number of sightings in the Wideford Burn / Airport area and unexplained disappearances of poultry in South Ronaldsay.

Thus it is essential that all sightings or poultry losses are reported to either SNH on 875302 or the RSPB on 850176 or to the Club secretary on 751426.

Now for a real shocker! - A visitor to North Hoy who has a wide knowledge of the wildlife of the North of Scotland reported seeing a **Pine Marten** near Moaness at grid ref: HY 236038 on 21st August. It is difficult to disbelieve a report from someone of his experience (Pine Martens and Stoats are common on estates where he has worked as a part-time gamekeeper) but equally difficult to comprehend how this animal could have got to Hoy. Attractive animals though they are, Pine Martens are even more efficient killers than stoats. They employ their tree-climbing skills to prey on Red Squirrels and the eggs and young of tree-nesting birds (including Ospreys) and are obviously a grave threat to ground-nesting birds and other mammals. They can even climb the harling of exterior walls to take eggs and young from House Martin nests. So, please, if you are foot-loose in North Hoy, keep your eyes open and report any sightings!

Rare Bumblebee Steals Cake!

Field Club members met as usual in the spring (25th March) to carry out maintenance work on the OFC and RSPB native tree plantations in Durkadale and to have our traditional picnic. As so often happens, the weather was kind to us and both the work and the picnic were great fun. As we settled down to enjoy our goodies our kind chairman, Penny, produced a rather delectable walnut cake and proceeded to offer it to the hungry workers. The secretary gratefully accepted a portion and was duly admiring it and savouring its fragrance. However, by now the weather was mild enough for some insects to be on the wing and with a loud buzz a bumblebee hove into view. Admittedly there was only the odd primrose in flower but this bumblebee had non-floral intentions and made a beeline for the secretary's cake to which it tucked in voraciously. Mild persuasion failed to deter it and there was no choice but to let it satisfy its appetite. It was all in a good cause, however, because this was no ordinary bee, but a Great Yellow Bumblebee queen, a nationally rare species, Orkney being one of the last strongholds of this insect.
