Reading: Luke 2: 1-20 NRSV (Shona)

In those days a decree went out from Emperor Augustus that all the world should be registered. This was the first registration and was taken while Quirinius was governor of Syria. All went to their own towns to be registered. Joseph also went from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to Judea, to the city of David called Bethlehem, because he was descended from the house and family of David. He went to be registered with Mary, to whom he was engaged and who was expecting a child. While they were there, the time came for her to deliver her child. And she

gave birth to her firstborn son and wrapped him in bands of cloth, and laid him in a manger, because there was no place for them in the inn.

In that region there were shepherds living in the fields, keeping watch over their flock by night. Then an angel of the Lord stood before them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified. But the angel said to them, 'Do not be afraid; for see—I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people: to you is born this day in the city of David a Saviour, who is the Messiah, the Lord. This will be a sign for you: you will find a child wrapped in bands of cloth and lying in a manger.' And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host, praising God and saying,

Glory to God in the highest heaven,

and on earth peace among those whom he favours!'

When the angels had left them and gone into heaven, the shepherds said to one another, 'Let us go now to Bethlehem and see this thing that has taken place, which the Lord has made known to us.' So they went with haste and found Mary and Joseph, and the child lying in the manger. When they saw this, they made known what had been told them about this child; and all who heard it were amazed at what the shepherds told them. But Mary treasured all these words and pondered them in her heart. The shepherds returned, glorifying and praising God for all they had heard and seen, as it had been told them. (2:40)

2nd Congregational Hymn: 316 Love came down at Christmas

Reading: John 1:1-14: (Martin). (From William Barclay, Daily Study Bible; before gender-inclusive language)

THE WORD:

When the world had its beginning, the Word was already there; and the Word was with God; and the Word was God.

This Word was in the beginning with God. He was the agent through whom all things were made; and there is not a single thing which exists in this world which came into being without him. In him was life and the life was the light of men; and the light shines in the darkness, because the darkness has never been able to conquer it.

There emerged a man sent from God, whose name was John. He came as a witness, in order to bear witness to the light, that through him all might believe. He himself was not the light; his function was to bear witness to the light. He was the real light, who, in his coming into the world, gives light to every man. He was in the world, and, although the world was made by him, the world did not recognize him. It was into his own home that he came, and yet his own people did not receive him. To all those who did receive him, to those who believe in his name, he gave the right to become the children of God. These were born, not of blood, nor of any human impulse, nor of any man's will, but their birth was of God. So the Word became a person, and took up his abode in our being, full of grace and truth; and we beheld his glory, glory such as an only son receives from his father.

Meditation:

Christmas Eve; Christmas very near.

No theological lecture tonight: just a very simple re-statement of what it is all about. God came from heaven to take on our human form to show us just how much God loves us. That's it in a nutshell.

OK, there's more. When God looked at men and women and saw all the painful things we do to each other, he decided to get involved - personally, intimately involved - with his fallen creation.

Notice this: God didn't come to punish, or frighten, or threaten, or any of the other things often attributed to him. No! God came to tell us that we are loved deeply, truly, and forever.

To make sure we got the point, God, made flesh in Jesus, brought that message first to people that the world saw as completely unimportant, unloved.

Unimportant "humble shepherds"; an unmarried, teenage mum; astrologers practising a completely different religion. All to show that God wasn't going to leave anyone behind; that God's message of love was for all, for everybody, whether the world thought – thinks – we are important or loveable or not.

That's still the way it is. God loves all of us, but he especially wants those who don't feel loved or lovable; who always feel they're on the outside looking in, those who feel forgotten; those who wonder what the point of life is - he wants us all to hear the "good news of great joy" that God loves all of us.

That's the simple message. In all the hassle of preparing for Christmas amid all the stress of Covid restrictions, trying to make ends meet, cope with family problems, we need this short, simple, peaceful message: we are of infinite value and worth to God.

The angels say, "Jesus is born for you." And the "good news," is "good news of great joy for you and all people." The Gospel reminds every one of us that God believes we are worthy of honour and dignity and, above all else, love. His love.
