Gillian Cooper reflects on Mark 5:21-43

ven today, with all our medical and scientific dadvancements, it still happens: the problem for which there is no diagnosis. The tests come back negative. The drug regimes have side effects, and anyway do not work. Even the most expensive private specialists are baffled. Is it psychological? As the symptoms continue, we ask ourselves whether we are imagining things, whether it is our fault somehow. We become increasingly miserable. We lose interest in life.

So even today we can empathise with the woman in our Gospel reading. Jesus is her last resort. There is no human cure for her. She has no more faith in doctors, but she does still have a little bit of faith in goodness, and in the possibility of something, perhaps a miracle. And that faith is rewarded.



One touch is all it takes, one touch that contains all her despair and longing, and that is met with an answering reassurance. It is not her fault. She is valuable and loved. She can be whole again.

Health wholeness and mysterious. We know so much, and can cure so much, but human beings are complex. We need more than medicine for our ills. There is still

the prospect of death, in the end, to contend with, and for that we need hope, and faith, and the knowledge that we are loved. For these, Jesus is still available.

Healing God, when our hands are tentative and our hearts afraid, help us to reach out to you, and to be bold in the asking, that by the power of your love we and all your children may be made whole. Amen.

How many different meanings of "rest" can you think of? Dictionaries list quite a few and the Bible is full of references. This single English word is translated from several in Greek and Hebrew, each with their own nuances of meaning and used in different contexts throughout the Old and New Testaments. The most familiar is surely the one in the creation story in Genesis 1. God rests on the seventh day. This is the reason for the sabbath. You will often hear it used as a reason for punctuating our working week with sufficient down time and also for taking longer breaks during the year.

But Hebrews 4 talks about entering God's rest as something we enjoy constantly, however we are spending our days. Keeping that rested feeling after time off is not easy, but this is what God wants for us. Fresh from our holidays, we could work with God to keep resting all year round.
