I knew that my mother had a Prayer Book, so I found it and discovered that the choir had been singing other parts of scripture as well – the Magnificat and the Nunc Dimittis.

The religion of every prisoner, or their preference to declare no religion, is recorded when they arrive in prison, and they may attend appropriate religious services and groups.

These days prison chaplains are of all Christian denominations and all the major faiths. Their statutory duties include responsibility for the pastoral care of prisoners, staff and visitors alike. In addition, chaplains often provide a valuable

link between those in prison and family, friends and communities on the outside. Chaplains now work alongside a wide range of specialists working in prisons, including probation officers, education officers, psychologists and professionals specialising in substance misuse, art therapy and other types of intervention.

Many people find that prison affords an opportunity to think about spirituality and faith, and chaplains have an important responsibility to accompany prisoners on their spiritual journeys. A prisoner's relationship with God is intertwined with getting to know him- or herself, and gaining a deeper understanding of his or her human relationships.
