Caroline Hodgson reflects on Isaiah 2:1-5, Romans 13:11-end and Matthew 24:36-44

n the run-up to Christmas some years ago, a British supermarket became the first in the country to open its doors for twenty-four-hour shopping. At last it was possible to shop at two, three or even four in the morning - and shop people did. The first night's opening was a resounding success in retail terms - and a dismal failure in terms of peace and goodwill. In the scramble, many of the "luxury" items sold out. The consumer frenzy gathered pace, and by midnight people were pinching things from each other's trolleys. In the early hours, the store ran out of trolleys and was forced to close for a while in order to restore order.

In today's reading from Matthew, Jesus looks back to the time of Noah, when the terrible flood took people with little warning. He offers the example of ordinary, day-to-day life for people before the flood. So it will be when the Son of Man returns. The message is clear - be prepared. Being

prepared, however, means spiritual rather than material preparedness. Being prepared means being prepared in day-to-day life in the supermarket every bit as much as in church on Sunday. The supermarket shoppers were so wrapped up in material things that they forgot or disregarded the true spirit of Christmas.

This year, are we prepared to forego or share the trimmings of Christmas, if that's what God calls us to do?

Lord God, in all our preparations this year, keep our sights on what really matters. Amen.

World Aids Day

1 December marks World AIDS Day, designated by the United Nations in 1988. Although the virus was only identified in the 1980s, it has killed some 35 million people worldwide, making it among the most destructive pandemics in human history. Today, 101,000 people in the UK, and more than 36 million people around the world, live with HIV/AIDS. Three quarters are in Africa, where women are especially vulnerable to infection, and where AIDS has created a generation of orphans.

The Anglican Communion, alongside other denominations, actively supports World AIDS Day, which raises the profile of the scientific battle against the disease, supports those who live with it (often suffering stigma, prejudice and isolation), and remembers those who have died. Despite scientific advances which mean that a diagnosis is no longer necessarily a swift death sentence, each year there are nearly two million new cases, five thousand in the UK alone.
