II the characters in today's Gospel reading are faithful to and nurtured by the best of the Jewish tradition. It is to such faithful folk that God reveals fresh truth. Enter Simeon - close to God, sensitive to God, guided by the Spirit. Such a person has the knack of turning up at the right time, understanding the significance of what they see, and saying the right thing. While many would see just a child, Simeon sees salvation - salvation for all the earth. Simeon is led by the Spirit and the Spirit is always alive and fresh. The freshness and power of Simon's words amazes Jesus' parents.

Then we hear of the cost. No new move of God comes without a price. It is not only Jesus who will suffer, but those who love him – especially his mother. Love costs. Why is there a cost? Because the light of Jesus will not leave the status quo unchallenged. Things have been going on which should not have been. People are not who they appear to be. Some exalted people will be toppled. The nature of power is such that people do not like to lose it and will fight to keep it. Hence the suffering.

The other side of the coin is that some who have been ignored will turn out to be great. This is the arrival of God's kingdom of truth.

God's upside down kingdom, where the exalted are humbled and the humble are exalted.



Lord God, by your grace we may be like Anna and Simeon, guided by the Spirit and knowing the significance of what we see. Enable us to bring your word to situations, as Simeon did. We ask this in the name of your Son, Jesus Christ. Amen.
