oday there are wars throughout the world and powerful oppressive regimes. There are disasters causing untold distress and suffering: earthquakes, tsunamis, droughts and flooding, famine and disease. We may feel helpless in the face of such things, but can we imagine what it would be like if these events multiplied and intensified, so that it seemed that our world really could end very soon? Might we not feel faint in our fear and sense of foreboding?

The message of Jesus in today's Gospel is that we are to be ready for such times. We are not to do what many of us do when we they are unable to face the reality of their lives; living wastefully and irresponsibly, numbing pain with drink or drugs, or simply burying our heads in the sand in the hope that it will all go away.

The words of Jesus will certainly not go away - they are eternal and we are to focus on them, not allowing anything to muffle his voice. We are to be ready, we are to stand with our heads held high, firm in the belief that these signs surely mean that Jesus, the Son of Man, is coming in power and glory and brings redemption with him. This is the wake up call of Advent - let's listen and respond to that call.

Lord Jesus, speak to us the eternal words of your love and redemption, so that we may live with courage and faith and be ready to stand before you when you come again in power and glory. Amen.
