parents know how children can pester. And they also know the relief of giving in and letting them have whatever they are after, for the sake of a bit of peace. The story Jesus tells imagines God like an exasperated parent, giving the children what they want. But of course there is more to it than that. The issue here is not biscuits or sweets, but justice. That is what the widow in the story wants, that is what God is being pestered for, and so that is what God is willing to give. But is that all?

Our Old Testament reading tells of Jacob wrestling with God all night, even after he is injured. He does not want justice. Justice for him would involve punishment for all his cheating and conniving. He wants, and gets, a blessing, and also a new name, Israel - the name that he will pass on to his descendants, God's people.

We may think we want justice, our just deserts, but what we need is a blessing, and the name God gives us, his children, despite our faults and failings. "When the Son of Man comes, will he find faith on earth?" Faith to pester God not for what we want, but for what we need?

God of justice and blessing, give us faith to know that we can come to you with our requests, and wisdom to know what we need, that we may persist in asking for justice on earth, and receive your blessing now and in all eternity. Amen.

Faith and disability


God understands sign language by Heather Smith

You may never have encountered anyone for whom British Sign Language (BSL) is their first language, but it's more common than you might think. The deaf community has a vibrant, supportive culture, often with special church services. Many say, however, that they would like to feel confident and included

attending any service. Deaf people may often feel left out, but be keen to join in, while non-deaf churchgoers may want to include them, but struggle to know how.

Neil Robinson, the Salisbury Diocese Minister with Deaf and Hard of Hearing People, says he has two identities - in Christ, and as a deaf person. When they come together he is at his happiest. As a newly ordained priest, his training vicar encouraged him to work to his strengths and abilities, and to believe that he has a great deal to contribute because of, not despite, his deafness. In turn, Neil wants to encourage other deaf people to feel the same. Neil prays in BSL because, of course, God understands.
