



oday the church year comes to an end - next Sunday it all begins again. For now, we turn our eyes to the kingdom and we gaze on Jesus our King, as he stands before Pontius Pilate, not robed in purple majesty and might, but wounded, abandoned and vulnerable. And yet, for all that, he is powerful beyond measure. He is Alpha and Omega, beginning and end. Kingship has been a thread all through the Gospels and it's never looked quite like people expected. From the wise men looking for a king and finding a baby, to Jesus riding on a donkey, to the soldiers sticking a crown of thorns on his head - Christ the King is not like any other

The disciples must have wept when they heard about Jesus' trial before Pilate. They felt let down by the authorities, and they knew that they had let Jesus down too. And yet the deeper truth is that even when everything failed, Jesus did not stop being king. Nothing is able to stop God's kingdom from growing. Pilate may have played his part in Jesus' journey to the cross, just as Judas and the other disciples did. But ultimately the love of God has more power than anything - and it is this powerful love at the heart of the kingship of Christ that we celebrate and acknowledge today. As the year turns, let us centre our lives once again on Christ the King.
