Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31 August 2021

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 August 2021. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

The objects of the Trust as set out in the Articles of Association are as follows:

- 1. To provide recreational facilities and organise recreational activities, with the object of improving the conditions of life for the members of Stronsay.
- 2. To advance education through:
- 2.1 the provision and supervision of learning-orientated extra-curricular activities for school and pre-school children;
- 2.2 the promotion of opportunities for learning for the benefit of the general public; and
- 2.3 the promotion of training, particularly among residents of Stronsay, and with particular reference to skills which assist the participants in obtaining paid employment.
- 3. To advance the arts, heritage and culture.
- 4. To advance environmental protection and improvement through the provision, maintenance and/or improvement of public open space and other public amenities and other environmental and regeneration projects (but subject to appropriate safeguards to ensure that the public benefits so arising clearly outweigh any private benefit thereby conferred on private landowners).
- 5. To provide, or assist in the provision of, housing for those in need by reason of age, ill-health, disability, financial hardship or other disadvantage within the Stronsay.
- 6. To prevent and relieve poverty particularly among the residents of Stronsay.
- 7. To advance citizenship within Stronsay by encouraging, stimulating and supporting volunteering projects.
- 8. To preserve, for the benefit of the general public, the historical, architectural and constructional heritage that may exist in and around Stronsay in buildings (including any structure or erection, and any part of a building as so defined) of particular beauty or historical, architectural or constructional interest.
- 9. To advance the health and wellbeing of the residents of Stronsay and to prevent or relieve ill-health among residents of Stronsay and provision of health education for such residents.
- 10. To promote, establish, operate and/or support other similar schemes which are in furtherance of charitable purposes for the benefit of the residents of Stronsay.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

Community Turbine

The Community Turbine is managed by the Trust's subsidiary, Stronsay Renewable Energy Ltd (SREL) and has been producing income from the export of electricity and the payment of the government's feed in tariff since November 2011. The resulting income has been passed on to the community by virtue of gift aid payments to Stronsay Development Trust, which has transferred these funds to the Community Fund.

The company continues to actively explore and initiate off-grid solutions with a view to increasing income from the electricity that was being generated but was currently being lost through curtailment.

SREL has not been able to transfer funds through gift aid to the development trust since early 2019 but continues to look at avenues to adapt and develop solutions to curtailment and increased running costs to enable future transfers.

Stronsay Community Fund

The fund was officially launched in November 2012 to enable the revenue gift aided to the trust to be used to support applications for grants from community groups and individuals in Stronsay which met the aims and objectives of the trust. Funds have been used to support groups, improve facilities and tackle fuel poverty on Stronsay. It has also provided educational and skills bursaries to help both young and older residents to improve their career and employment prospects.

The Trust is unable to offer grants as part of the community fund programme with no income form the turbine but looks to connect community members to other services and funding options.

Woods Yard

The construction of a building providing workshops and storage units for lease to local community members, and an office for the trust was funded by a BIG Lottery grant under the 'Growing Community Assets' scheme. The trust purchased part of a large haulage yard and a redundant adjacent building which previously housed ponds used by local fishermen to hold lobsters awaiting transportation to mainland.

Woods yard now homes the Stronsay Recycling Centre, and the Stronsay Pop up Heritage Centre as well as business units and storage facilities.

Recycling Centre

Housed in Woods Yard the Trust received funding from the Climate Challenge Fund (CCF) to open a recycling centre where cardboard is processed into briquettes that community members can utilize as a fuel source. During the course of the project the centre has expanded to include glass which is crushed into a usable aggregate and suitable for sandblasting and cans that can be sold for scrap.

Stronsay Pop Up Heritage Centre

The centre showcases Stronsay's maritime history, specifically related to the herring industry. It provides a variety of experiences with pictures of Stronsay as it was with 4,000+ people living on island, interactive exhibits, as well as the opportunity to browse the numerous record books

The pop up centre offers the community and visitors the opportunity to influence the permanent Stronsay Heritage Centre by providing a chance to comment and give feedback on existing displays, add ideas and offer suggestions on future displays.

A Heritage committee has been established now known as the Stronsay Heritage Society and continues to work on the pop up centre as well as a number of other projects. The Society is working towards the renovation and establishment of the permanent heritage centre within the Mission Hall.

Education and Skills

The Trust has been working with partners including Business Gateway, Northvet and the Skills Network as well as talented community members to meet its aims and objectives to advance education.

A number of Education and skills courses including Farm skills, business management, sewing, and online qualifications have been facilitated by the Trust utilizing community facilities such as the Community Hall, Stronsay School and the conference room at Woods Yard. This has enabled those that would find travelling off Island to attend such courses challenging, to have the opportunity to progress their education and skills here on Stronsay. The courses have received positive feedback and have been heavily subscribed and plans are being made to offer further courses in the future.

The Limpet

Stronsay is very fortunate to have such a committed and enthusiastic editor in Bruce Fletcher for its monthly newsletter with Printing funded by the Trust. All are encouraged to contribute, whether with photographs, monthly reports, poems or letters and local businesses find it a valuable medium for advertising their services. The Limpet has become fully digital with the trust now providing only a handful of non-digital community members a printed copy. Thus, supporting the green solutions for the Islands Net zero goals.

Stronsay Community Greenhouse

This continues to provide a sheltered environment for growing those fruits and vegetables which are so easily blighted by the Orkney weather. Another year of full plots including continuation of the community flower plot run by volunteers who present bouquets through the year to community members on Stronsay. We have bid farewell to plot holders and welcomed new and plans are underway for expansion. The mini greenhouse has also been allocated to support wellbeing within the community.

G P Exercise Referral Scheme

This project is now looking for additional funding to support an exercise programme at the Stronsay Healthy Living Centre to those patients whose GP feels that their condition would benefit from regular exercise under the care of a qualified referral consultant. The Trust is working to support health and fitness in a number of additional areas and expand the Exercise referral scheme in the future. Feedback from users of the scheme as well as the GP's continues to be positive.

Community Led Wellbeing

Community led care was researched in 2017-2018 by Rosie Alexander, via interviews and a group workshop on Stronsay. This research highlighted community assets such as medical provision, transportation links and the small caring community. The current project was started in January 2019 to facilitate access to activities and services designed to enhance health and wellbeing of older people on five of the non-linked Orkney Islands

The project has enabled the Trust to employ a Community Wellbeing Coordinator whose role is to promote community led wellbeing, through support of current projects and groups, development of new initiatives and facilitating delivery of additional services to the island. The project was funded for a further two years and expanded to include a wider age range. This project was able to support a number of community members during COVID and continues to support individuals and groups with health, financial and social wellbeing.

HOUSING

The Trust has been successful in a funding application to the Scottish Land Fund for £130,000 to purchase Beachwood with the intention of renovating and providing affordable rented housing to the community to support young families or couples to live and work here. The Trust has been impacted with a number of delays with COVID and the added pressures this placed on contractors but is once again looking at tenders and in the process of applying for renovation funding with the Islands housing Fund as well as new funding from OIC. Part of the project will include working with an existing property management company to take on the management role with allocations and advertising etc while the Trust retains the maintenance work locally.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Principal funding sources

The principal sources of funding in this year have been external grant awards from HIE, VAO, OIC and include COVID recovery funding.

Reserves policy

With the exception of donations from Stronsay Renewable Energy Limited, most of the Trust's income is restricted meaning that it is received for a specific purpose or project. As such, most of the Trust's reserves are already earmarked. The Board has designated that donations from Stronsay Renewable Energy Limited, while unrestricted, will form part of the Stronsay Community Fund to be used to support applications for grants from community groups and individuals in Stronsay which meet the aims and objectives of the trust. The amount transferred to this Designated fund is after funding the essential running costs of the trust.

FUTURE PLANS

The Development Trust will be launching its new 5 year Development Plan and will look at future projects including

Community Ownership of Hotel

With the creation of a Community Benefit Society, a community group set up by the Trust ahead of a community shares scheme enabling community members to buy into the project and become shareholders. The community benefit society is then made up of shareholders who elect a management board from its membership. The society is solely tasked with the acquisition and running of the hotel. The hope would be for the Trust to support the Society to access purchase funding from the Scottish Land Fund and utilise the Community Shares for additional finances associated with the project. The Trust is keen to support the community in gaining control of its assets and taking the hotel and pub forward in the best way it can, with the passion and input from the people that know the island best, its community.

Sea sports- We have taken on the sea sports club and looking to take this forward. With development of the sea sports shed and the procurement of equipment and training to hold a number of activities and events in the future.

Housing Phase 2- Completing an application to Scottish Land Fund for our 2nd purchase of a property for development later in 2021-2022.

Horticulture - working currently on the joint feasibility study for potential vertical farming or horticulture activities. As well as the expansion of the community Greenhouse

Digital- looking to develop a new website for the trust that will follow a more consistent theme with the community site and have further interactive aspects to support our projects.

Wellbeing - development of a mental health project to run in partnership with current wellbeing project.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

Individuals on the island of Stronsay who have time to give and a strong interest in supporting the island's community are encouraged by the board to seek appointment as trustees. Prior to each AGM notices are placed in the island's newsletter and on noticeboards in the local shops and Post Office explaining the role and responsibilities of trustees and inviting persons to come forward.

Organisational structure

the business of the trust has been undertaken by individual directors with some administrative assistance from Voluntary Action Orkney

Induction and training of new trustees

Each new trustee is provided with a comprehensive induction pack which includes OSCR guidance on the role, the latest annual report, SDT policy documents and the directors code of conduct.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 August 2021

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, with the exception of investments which are included at market value.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Plant and machinery - 25% on reducing balance

Fixtures and fittings - 10% on cost

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trusteestrustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Designated funds comprise unrestricted funds that have been set aside by the trustees for particular purposes. The aim and use of each designated fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements. Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the charity for particular purposes. The cost of raising and administering such funds are charged against the specific fund. The aim and use of each restricted fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Irrecoverable vat

Irrecoverable VAT is charged against the category of resources expended for which it was incurred.

Enterprise Zone

This is Big Lottery Funded. The fund was set up for the purchase and building of a sustainable enterprise zone providing business, employment, social and training opportunities for the island.

Greenhouse Project

This project was set up in 2010/11 and was funded by Keep Scotland Beautiful for revenue and capital. The project has now stopped and the remaining fund balance is being written off to general funds in line with the depreciation of the large greenhouse in the fixed asset register.

Recycling Project

This project commenced in 2018 following the purchase of equipment for recycling which will be funded by the Climate Challenge Fund (CCF).

Scottish Land Fund

This project was set up in 2019/20 to purchase property with the intention of renovating and providing affordable rented housing to the community to support young families or couples to live and work here.
