Remind us of Paul's words 'If I have all knowledge but do not have love, I am nothing.' Touch us, teach us, heal us and make us newly aware of your love and forgiveness. In Jesus' name we pray.

Hear and believe these words of grace: God did not send the Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved through him. (John 3:17) And so I declare to you: In Jesus Christ we are loved, we are forgiven. Thank you, Lord. Amen

Reading: Deuteronomy 18: 15-20 and Mark 1: 21-28

Reflection: Who is in Charge?

In the account in the book of Exodus when God called Moses to lead the enslaved people out of Egypt, Moses protested saying, "I've never been a good speaker and I haven't become one since you began to speak to me I am a poor speaker, slow and hesitant." God said "Who gives you a mouth? It is I, the Lord - now - go - I'll tell you what to say."

But Moses still said "No, Lord, please send someone else..." But God insisted, promising Moses, help and knowledge about what to say to the people, saying he

would help Moses to speak and that he would tell him what to say..."
That's a bit different from the Moses we hear speaking through the reading from Deuteronomy ... Moses is a different person from the one who first spoke with God. He's telling the people that they are going to get someone to tell them what to do - just like him...! He now speaks with authority - the authority bestowed on him by God.

This is a common theme - the exercise of authority.

Even although Moses would no longer be there to lead the people, God would raise up a new prophet just like Moses from among them. The people knew that the role of the prophet was one of tremendous authority and they wondered how they would be able to tell a true prophet from a false one. The answer was that if the prophet's word did not come true in due time, then the prophet was not from God. In contrast, God's prophetic word, spoken with authority, brings results.



Even so, Christians often wonder- how do we know who speaks for God? Sometimes, time alone can tell because we are all accountable for the word of God entrusted to us. In Deuteronomy our reading stresses both continuity with the present and readiness for the future - faithfulness to the authority of God's word to us as we hear it through the power of the Holy Spirit enables us to accomplish God's purpose through us.



In today's gospel, we find Jesus teaching with such authority that things happened. The people there in the Synagogue were overwhelmed with amazement. Twice we hear that people were amazed at Jesus' teaching because he taught them as one who had authority.

What does the word authority conjure up in your mind? Does it suggest negative or positive thoughts? I can remember when I was in primary school, one was so afraid of the headmaster - the principal's - authority that you were scared to even walk past his door. I can still remember creeping past with my heart in my mouth. Maybe principals these days would be the ones to be amazed at such authority. Sadly, however, it was an authority based on the inappropriate use of power leading to fear. Also, sadly, this is also the type of authority experienced by many people here and in so many places around the world. True authority has been compromised when it is based on professional status, success, wealth, and the lack of any sense of moral integrity or ethical behaviour.

The authority Jesus had was a totally different kind of authority - every fibre of his being spoke love and hope and healing. People were astonished because they had never heard anyone speak and act the way Jesus did. The amazement that came over the people shows that they experienced something of the presence of God. That experience was made real as Jesus exercised his authority in service to others, through teaching and healing. In this way, Jesus demonstrates what he will later say to his disciples - and to us - about authority - that it is not for lording it over others, but for serving them, even as he came not to be served but to serve.



So - are we sufficiently amazed at Jesus' teaching? Is the reason that we do not astonish the world more as Christians based on the possibility that we are not sufficiently astonished ourselves? A bored, bland, unsurprisable, unamazed Christian is a contradiction of terms because an authentic meeting with the living Christ has to be an amazing experience now.

The first and lasting source of joy and power is the astonishing miracle that God actually has come, in the person of Jesus Christ, into our world of need and struggle and evil. If we were more astonished at God choosing to act through us, perhaps, like Jesus, we would do more astonishing things to help people meet needs, to be alongside in their struggles, to identify and overcome evil where it exists.

Let us pray for all people everywhere according to their needs. We think first, this week, of those whose lives have been touched by genocide and war. Every death touches many people with grief and sorrow. We cannot comprehend the evil that brings people to try to destroy another race or people who are different. We pray that such acts, such hatred, such bigotry may be overwhelmed by love and empathy - love shown by Jesus to all who hated and tried to destroy Him

We pray for those who work to help those who suffer. Guide their work and give them the strength and resources to do their work. Jesus taught all of us to help and empathise with those who are poorer and less fortunate than ourselves. We pray that you will guide us, in the affluent West, to continue to help those who suffer poverty, ill health, and starvation in Africa, Asia, and the many countries that will suffer for many years from the effects of the tidal waves which destroyed their communities.

We pray for countries in the Middle East - especially Iraq which is trying to embrace democracy, and shake off the old prejudices, violence, and religious dictatorship. We pray for Israel and Palestine - that they may find a way to live together, side by side,

without hatred and violence

Strengthen your church, Lord, to be united in love, understanding, forgiveness and prayer. We pray for our local leaders, Charlie, Neil, Sam, and Joan. We also pray for the wider Church throughout the world. As the richest nations in the world seeks to try to find solutions for some of the poorest, we pray that their help is guided by commands and instructions - to "love one another, as I have loved you"

We pray for all who suffer in mind or body and for those who care for them. We pray for the sick; for those who mourn; for those without faith, hope or love. We pray for any known to us who are in special need of our prayers at this time. Amen.
