1 **APOLOGIES** 1.1 As above 2 **DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST** 2.1 **MINUTES** 3 The Chairman asked for approval to the minutes of 2 July and this was seconded by Mrs Ansell 3.1 **RESOLVED:** to accept the minutes as a true record 3.2 3 7 The Chairman asked for approval to the minutes of 24 September and this was seconded by Cllr 3.4 CIIr Stanley queried the wording of the minutes but suggested that the matter could be dealt with in the confidential section 3.5 RESOLVED: to accept the minutes as a true record MILL GREEN DEVELOPMENT Mark Loveday, Giles Membrey, Tess Randels and Bob Keys attended the meeting to give a 4.1 presentation with regard to the proposed outlet village (by a consortium led by Rioja Developments) at Mill Green 4.2 Mr Membrey advised the meeting that the company had been involved in developing many outlets worldwide eg Budapest, Bratislave, Prague, Swindon, Bideford 4.3 He continued that the idea originated in America and was in no way a discount operation but quality goods being put through a retail outlet rather than simply being discarded or destroyed He said his company had identified a geographic gap in the Birmingham area which they felt 4.4 could be a very profitable location, given its proximity to transport access eg Toll Rd, bus station, rail station He said his company was in talks with the Toll Rd to give a discount for shoppers as an added incentive to use the road He indicated that the outlet village performance was that of a tourist attraction with the average 4.6 visitor staying for approximately 5 hours 4.7 He acknowledged that the development was costly but that there tended to be a 60 minute drive time catchment area and that the proposed development was 70 minutes from the nearest existing outlet village 4.8 The location was intended to be a West Midlands destination but which would form a local employment opportunity, for all but experienced managerial staff 4.9 He outlined how his company was contribution to existing highway upgrades along Eastern Way and at Churchbridge to improve vehicular access, which tended to be the preferred mode of transport for visitors (approximately 80% arriving by car) 4.10 The proposed site would feature landscaping both on and off site, 2000+ car parking spaces, 130 units including a cinema and tourist office and 24/7 security 4.11 It was envisaged that the hours of operation would be up to 11pm for the cinema but with shops closing no later than 8.00pm For safety, pedestrians would access by an underpass and the cinema, at 2 stories, would be the 4.12 highest rise building on the site, to reduce visual impact 4.13 He concluded by advising that as this proposal was not contained within the Local Plan it would have to be sanctioned by the Secretary of State but he emphasised the benefits eg job
