Q 5 If you hold 4 Clubs and 4 Hearts.

Q 7 Your partner opens 1 and you
hold 4 cards in Spades and 13 HCP's.
What do you bid?

Q 9 You open 1 and Responder bids 3 A .

What does that mean?

Q 2 What do you need in order to open 1 Heart?

Q 4 If you have 4 Clubs and 4 Diamonds. Which suit do you open?

Q 6 If you hold 5 Spades and 5 Hearts. Which suit do you open?

Q 8 You open 1a and Responder bids $2 \boldsymbol{A}$.

What does that mean?

Q 10 Define the term "support for partner's suit"

A 2 You need to have 4+ cards in the Heart suit and 12-19 HCP's

A 4 Bid the Clubs first - bid the lower of two 4 card suits of the same rank.

A 6 Spades. With two 5 card suits, bid with the higher ranking suit first.

A 8 Responder has 4+ cards in the Spades suit.

His point range is $6-9 \mathrm{HCP}$.

A7 You know that the partnership holds a total of $25+$ HCP and that is enough for game. You also know that you have a FIT in Spades. Bid $4 \boldsymbol{a}$

A10 You are looking for an 8 card FIT. You can support your partner's bid suit when the partnerships has 8+ cards in the suit. If partner has promised 4 cards and you have 4 then you have a fit and can support.

A1 When Responder makes a limit bid he shows his HCP count within a narrow range. e.g.

A 3 Diamonds - bid your longest suit first.
