Remote Learning

During the recent weeks there have been some audits taking place about the quality of learning offered both at school (face to face) and remotely. The teachers monitor the engagement and give feedback to senior staff each week. The marking and feedback and curriculum coverage are also checked, to ensure those learning off site are being offered the same provision as those on site. Governors and Trust leaders also monitor our offer, and would particularly like to hear from anyone if they have comments they want to feed back. The survey taken mid way through the current lockdown has been fed back to staff and leaders, and hopefully those with constructive criticism have noticed the positive changes staff have made.



Why did you become a teacher?

A question that is asked fairly often of those in education. People have different motivations for their career choices—some because other members of the family do the same job, because they enjoy working with children, and those that feel they have the right skills to support children with their school lives to improve their long-term outcomes in life.

What route did you take to becoming a teacher?

There are a variety of routes into teaching. Completing a degree is the standard route, either while completing a Qualified Teacher course at the same time, or a Post Graduate course after the main degree. The Post Grad course can also take different forms—school centered training, university based training with placements or even now teaching apprenticeships.

Why did you choose Primary and not Secondary?

Experience with all age groups is essential when thinking about working in education. Your skill set (what your qualification and interests are) can dictate your choice, but also where you feel comfortable. Primary children are generally 'pleased' to be at school and want to learn, whereas this can't always be said about secondary -aged pupils! Enthusiasm, engagement, motivation and reward all play their part. Primary is certainly incredibly demanding upon self-knowledge as you teach everything rather than just one or two subjects. Assessments for pupils are mostly completed as you go along, rather than formal testing.

With any job you would have good and not so good points. Getting to know the children and supporting them (and their family) is really important. Observing their 'light bulb' moments is exhilarating. Being the consistent voice giving them confidence, self-belief and instilling values is one of the best feelings.


What can you see?

The rare Snow Moon will be visible tomorrow, Saturday 27 February 2021. This stunning full moon is the last of the winter and celebrated across the world as the first in the Lunar New Year. Those hoping to see the second full moon of the year will have to wake up early on Saturday morning to catch it looking it's best.

Why is it called the snow moon?

Traditionally, each full moon name was applied to the entire lunar month in which it occurred, not just to the full moon itself.

The second full moon the year, the Snow Moon, is named so because of the heavy snowfall that occurs in some parts of the world in February.
