




ST PIRAN'S DAY

A baby crow taken in by Lee Calvert, 46, mimics his dogs by barking at them in Weymouth, Dorset.



On the 3rd March, Choughs were seen carrying nesting materials into their nesting site locally by Jon Cripps, the CWT warden. On the 14th March Tim Hodder observed one Chough making regular visits to the cove and it would appear that the female is sitting. Two other Choughs were nearby.

Also **Wheatears** were in evidence so possibly Swallows can't be far off.

Bob Eardley saw a **Greater Spotted Woodpecker** where he was working locally. On the 20th March whilst out walking, Dave and Sharon Smith and Val Eardley saw a beautiful Fire-crested Wren. **Rodney Phillips.**




The Financial Annual Report was presented and adopted. Thanks were given to Josie Grant for her work as Treasurer during this financial year.

Firstly I would like to thank everyone who took part in the "Traffic and Parking review" in March.

For those of you who completed the questionnaire in the Newsletter. your responses have been uploaded and combined with the responses submitted on the website. The analysis of overall returns will be taken forward to the public meeting later in the year as a part of the draft Cubert Neighbourhood Development Plan.

This month, we are looking to develop our understanding of what residents want in respect of "Protecting our heritage and green spaces" The initial survey indicated prioritised six areas; the beaches of Holywell and Polly Joke, the setting of Cubert Church and war memorial the public footpath network, the Southwest Coastal Footpath, play areas (suitable for all ages) and woodland within the parish.

Spending time in green, peaceful areas, reconnecting with nature is widely acknowledged to have considerable health benefits. Knowledge of and access to historical heritage is important for creating a sense of place and belonging within a community. The data we collect will be stored securely, and solely used to aid the creation of policies to include in the Cubert Neighbourhood Plan.



The yellow and green areas on this map show the parts of Cubert parish that are owned and managed by the National Trust. The purple lines mark the parish boundaries.

Holywell sand dunes, Cubert Common and the Kelseys are internationally important natural environments, home to a variety of rare species and widely valued for their unspoilt beauty Without careful management there is a danger that these areas will become seriously eroded, losing their species diversity and charm.

To protect and preserve these areas for future generations we need to understand patterns of visitor use. The questions below will provide us with vital information, helping to ensure that management plans can be put in place to preserve these valuable environments.

As the USA begins to settle into the new Presidential term, climate change and global warming are being taken seriously again, and with COP26 taking place this year, in Glasgow, it will be good to have America contributing once more to international plans to cut carbon emissions and tackle the widespread effects of climate change on millions of people around the world. An independent team at Climate Action Tracker has suggested the US needs to cut emissions by almost two thirds over the next nine years to help keep the world aligned to the Paris Agreement of keeping global warming to 2degC or less by 2100.

A good news story from America is that New York City's Empire State building is now entirely run by wind energy. The owners of the 120 storey building, as well as thirteen other office buildings have just signed a contract to provide green energy to all their buildings, making them the largest US company to use 100% green energy.

Meanwhile at home, there has been another disappointing delay in making the Environment Bill law in this country. This Bill will introduce legislation to tackle pollution, wildlife protection and waste management, but is now not expected to come into force until the autumn. However, a £10 million fund has been set up to help environmental projects which tackle climate change, restore habitats and improve water quality, in a bid to attract private sector investment in Green projects. South West Water is currently running one such project in conjunction with Cornwall Wildlife Trust, to improve the water quality in catchment areas across Cornwall, working with farmers and land owners to cut fertilizer run off and improve habitats for wildlife on uncultivated land. The Wildlife Trust is also overseeing the re-introduction of Beavers whose great engineering skills can help regulate flooding. There is now evidence that beaver activity in Scotland is increasing, and in the city of Perth on the river Tay, beavers have been seen working right in the centre of the city, providing a fascinating wildlife watching experience to the residents of Perth.

Here are two stories about making the most of what is around you. In Columbia, a company named Woodpecker, has found a way of using the discarded husks of the coffee plant – Columbia being one of the world's leading coffee producers – to make low-cost, lightweight, waterproof, resilient material into panels for the construction of houses. This has the added benefit of avoiding the husks going into landfill sites where they would add to methane emissions.

And finally, in Kenya, where there is an on-going problem of locust infestation, an African company called The Bug Picture is helping communities to harvest the insects and turn them into protein-rich animal feed and organic fertilizer for the land. Warmer seas producing more rain, and increasing cyclones which disperse the swarms, are creating ideal conditions for the locust 'plagues', but The Bug Picture is trying to convince farmers to see the insects as a seasonal crop that can be harvested for an income and bring some hope amid the devastation.

These stories make us aware of human ingenuity and innovation, which is the way we have always responded to problems in our world. Nations working together to tackle global issues is a vital way towards trying to restore the balance of our climate and natural world, and we can all play a part in that process through the choices we make, either in what and how we buy, how and why we travel and how we use our votes. Working together we can make changes that help protect the future for everyone, One and All.


