BIRD NOTES



Government ministers are in a drive to help nature thrive. They have vowed to help bring back missing species with laws to enforce “rewilding” targets. George Eustice said a task force would be set up to see which species can be safely reintroduced in England. Golden Eagles could be returned to wild areas to help nature thrive.

From 31st March 2022 the government is banning metaldehyde based slug pellets due to the risk they pose to birds and mammals. Please don't use them in the 2021 growing season. Dispose of it at a local authority waste facility. The new Raven chick at the Tower of London has been named Branwen, following a public vote. Branwen will live at the Tower with her brother Edgar.

Urban birds have evolved to be different genetically to rural birds of the same species, scientists have discovered. Blood samples were taken from flocks of Great Tits in cities including Glasgow. They found they had genes linked to aggression and sleep patterns not found in rural birds, so cities are leaving their footprint on birds.

Minnie, one of the world's largest Penguins was 30 on 24th May. She is kept at Harewood House, Leeds.

At the Lizard Point, the Shrike was still being seen with rumours of a pair at the end of May.

Seven Cygnets have hatched after Rob Adamson saved a Swan's nest from sinking in the Great River Ouse, Cambs.

Jays are being seen again after nesting is almost complete. A good place to see them is the woods below Treliske. Jays are the shy member of the Corvid family, unlike bold brash Magpies who will attack other birds nests for the eggs or even the young.

On the 4th June, I saw Herring Gulls grabbing food from unsuspecting people having a picnic in Newquay Zoo. They then went on to pinch food being fed to the Humboldt Penguins.

A very rare Sulphur-bellied Warbler was seen on the 8th June on Lundy Island. This bird comes from Tibet and is coloured brown and yellow. It's normal habitat is stony, bushy, semi-arid slopes in Asian mountain ranges, especially in India. Expert Josh Jones of Birdguides.com said “There's nothing bigger or more exciting than a new species for Britain. This is a huge find and totally unexpected.” A flight of 4,000 miles is the distance travelled by this bird to get here,

At least five Choughs are being seen close to the local nesting site. Tim Hodder saw these on 7th June, three of them were obviously this year's young as the beaks were not yet red, but the legs were already red.

In mid-May, joggers were being attacked by Crows on Southsea Common, Portsmouth. They were thought to be protecting a nest. An extremely rare bird was seen on the Scilly Isles on 14th/15th June.

It was an Egyptian Vulture last seen in 1868. This bird was seen on St Mary's and Tresco and caused a stir to see it by avid bird watchers.

A Rose-coloured Starling has been seen in Lizard village. This is a rare visitor to NW Europe. The bill is quite pale and not as long as Starlings; but readily associates with them and resembles them in behaviour and calls.

Penhale Camp Bombing - 7th July 1940

Located high up on the Cornish clifftops, Penhale Camp was once a hub of military activity where up to 700 soldiers returning from war would go to train and recuperate.

The camp was originally developed by the Ministry of Defence (MoD) in 1939 as an emergency measure to train anti-aircraft gunners. On July 7, 1940, only months after the site opened., a lone German bomber dropped six bombs; four exploded in the camp. There were 22 soldiers killed and several injured. The camp at this time was holding some of the Dunkirk survivors who were resting and retraining. After this incident many soldiers wished to sleep under canvass on Penhale Sands. Most of the soldiers were with the 58th L.A.A. RA (Light Anti-Aircraft) from Scotland and were mostly TA volunteers. The same group of soldiers returned to France and were the first group of the British Army to evacuate the Belsen P.O.W. camp and uncover its horrors. There are records of the above regiment at Army Records RA Dept, Greenwich, London and there is also a memorial plaque with the names of the soldiers lost at Penhale in the remembrance chapel at Perranzabuloe Parish Church.

The Puzzle Women is Anna Ellory's second book. She was a nurse by profession and has recently completed an MA in Creative Writing at Bath Spa University.

The book is set in two different time periods separated by ten years. The first is just before the fall of the Berlin Wall. The story is told mostly from the view of two children, a boy called Rune and his younger sister Lotte, who has Downs Syndrome. The puzzle women were people tasked with putting back together sacks full of shredded files left by The Stazi when the wall came down. Lotte goes to find them after her father tears up a notebook that arrives, apparently from her missing mother.

It is story of domestic abuse, torture and their mothers attempts to flee from her powerful husband.

On the whole the group really liked this book although the subject matter was rather upsetting. We thought it was well written although a little too wordy at the beginning and the ending rather unsatisfactory. We all thought that the character of Lotte was delightful, she refused to be defined by her condition but accepts it as part of who she is. Rune's love for her shines through, despite everything they go through.

YELLOW LINES

Waiting restrictions indicated by yellow lines apply to the carriageway, pavement and verge.

You may stop to load or unload (unless there are also loading restrictions) or while passengers board or alight.

Double yellow lines mean no waiting at any time, unless there are signs that specifically indicate seasonal restrictions.

The times at which the restrictions apply for other road markings are shown on nearby plates. If no days are shown on the signs, the restrictions are in force every day including Sundays and Bank Holidays.

Vehicles parked on grass verges/pavements

If you are aware of a vehicle causing disruption by parking on a pavement or verge with parking restrictions in place, you can report this to Cornwall Council (see June issue on how to report parking offences).

If the pavement or verge does not have parking restriction in place, you will need to report in to the police.

HIGHWAY CODE

(I have used the text from the rule book but removed items in the rules that do not apply to Cubert Parish e.g. items applying to London or cities)

PLEASE READ THE HIGHWAY CODE YOURSELF TO UNDERSTAND ALL RULES

Rule 238

You **MUST NOT** wait or park on yellow lines during the times of operation shown on nearby time plates (or zone entry signs if in a Controlled Parking Zone)

Double yellow lines indicate a prohibition of waiting at any time even if there are no upright signs.

You **MUST NOT** wait or park, or stop to set down and pick up passengers, on school entrance markings when upright signs indicate a prohibition of stopping.

Rule 239

Use off-street parking areas, or bays marked out with white lines on the road as parking places, wherever possible.

If you have to stop on the roadside:

- do not park facing against the traffic flow
- stop as close as you can to the side
- do not stop too close to a vehicle displaying a Blue Badge: the occupant may need more room to get in or out
- you **MUST** switch off the engine, headlights and fog lights
- you **MUST** apply the handbrake before leaving the vehicle
- you **MUST** ensure you do not hit anyone when you open your door. Check for cyclists or other traffic
- it is safer for your passengers (especially children) to get out of the vehicle on the side next to the kerb
- put all valuables out of sight and make sure your vehicle is secure
- lock your vehicle.

Rule 240

You **MUST NOT** stop or park on:

- a pedestrian crossing, including the area marked by the zig-zag lines – see June issue
- a road marked with double white lines, even when a broken white line is on your side of the road, except to pick up or set down passengers, or to load or unload goods

Rule 243

DO NOT stop or park...

- near a school entrance
- anywhere you would prevent access for Emergency Services
- at or near a bus or tram stop or taxi rank
- on the approach to a level crossing/tramway crossing
- opposite or within 10 metres (32 feet) of a junction, except in an authorised parking space
- near the brow of a hill or hump bridge
- opposite a traffic island or (if this would cause an obstruction) another parked vehicle
- where you would force other traffic to enter a tram lane
- where the kerb has been lowered to help wheelchair users and powered mobility vehicles
- in front of an entrance to a property
- on a bend
- where you would obstruct cyclists' use of cycle facilities **except** when forced to do so by stationary traffic

The results from the "provision of sports and leisure facilities" will be collated during July and added to our library. Those of you who avidly read the Cubert NDP updates may remember that in May I referred to NDP Steering Group members contacting local businesses on a personal level during June and expanding on the information collected last September. This exercise will have been completed at the time of going to print. Collation of the results will again be undertaken with a view to taking them to a public meeting.

I think that realistically, given the uncertainties related to covid and public assemblies, it would be pointless for me to second guess when and where a public meeting will be held. That said no one should be in any doubt that there will be one.

I anticipate that during the forthcoming couple of months the members of the Steering Group will be analysing the data we have and putting it into a format suitable for presentation to and consideration by the residents of Cubert.

WHERE TO RECYCLE IN CORNWALL

As you may know, I am always looking for places to recycle those items that cannot be done by the kerbside recycling once a fortnight or directly to the tip (civic amenity site)

Crisp packets have been on my radar for a while as many people have these in the non-recycle bin and we used to be able to donate them to Prickles & Paws. These overwhelmed them once the process for handling crisp packets became complex and they had to pack this in in order to concentrate on the hedgehogs.

I have now found a place near Portreath that will take crisp packets and more besides. You may think – that is a distance to travel – but if you collect items until your collecting ‘bins’ are full, then a visit per month or more may be all that is needed.

Not only does this small company collect recycling they also upcycle products and hold workshops on how to upcycle.

Report of the Parish Council Meeting 16th June 2021

PRESENT: Cllrs. S. Bell, W. Caff, T. Hulbert, A. Percy, G. Rowe, M. Smith, R.L.B. Spencer & Cornwall Councillor Adrian Dennis Harvey the Clerk: D. Hawken, and 7 members of the public.

APOLOGIES: Cllrs. D. Hopkinson, and W.C. Longden . **Police Report** – None.

Before the meeting opened: Francis Philips – Addressed the Parish Council with regard to parking on the Zigzag lines. He suggested railings on zigzag lines or CCTV with ANPR (automatic number plate recognition) could help the situation.

OPENING: The Meeting was opened at 7.19 pm, by the Chairman Cllr. A. Percy

MINUTES OF THE MEETING HELD ON 19th May 2021: The Minutes were approved and signed as True Records.

MATTERS ARISING FROM THE MINUTES OF 19th May 2021:

The Clerk further confirmed he is still trying to get the issue of the dropped curbs in Churchfields. A site visit has been conducted by Roger Gates and Tracey Langley of Cornwall Council. However Adrian Drake of Cormac has stated it will cost £10,000 to do the proposed works and he does not have the budget for it. It was decided to contact Cornwall Council to try to get this resolved. Cllr. G. Rowe and the Clerk to work on this together.

Cllr. A. Percy – Outstanding enforcement issues. Newquay showground has been reported in. Further letters on the other outstanding issues with regard to Penhale View and the Section 106 assignments for affordable housing in neighbouring parishes will be sent out soon.

Cllr. M. Smith agreed to raise the parking on the ZigZag lines at the police liaison meeting and ask what evidence they need in order to obtain a prosecution.

It was decided to chase up the moving of the 30mph sign outside Penhale View.

THE QUEEN'S PLATINUM JUBILEE

In 2022, Her Majesty The Queen will become the first British Monarch to celebrate a Platinum Jubilee, seventy years of service, having acceded to the throne on 6th February 1952 when she was 25 years old.

Platinum Jubilee Bank Holiday will be on Friday 3rd June 2022

The Queen succeeded to the Throne on the 6 February, on the death of her father, King George VI. She was in Kenya at the time and became the first Sovereign in over 200 years to accede while abroad.

The coronation, a ceremony marking the formal investiture of a monarch with regal power, of the new Sovereign follows some months after his or her accession, following a period of mourning and as a result of the enormous amount of preparation required to organise the ceremony.

Queen Elizabeth II was crowned on 2 June, 1953 in Westminster Abbey. The Coronation service used for Queen Elizabeth II descends directly from that of King Edgar at Bath in 973.

CUBERT ALLOTMENT SOCIETY (as at MAY 2021)

Cubert Allotment Society has successfully navigated the pandemic with the committee elected in 2019 in post. Cubert Allotment Society Chair is Kate Malt, Vice Chair is Liz Bradder, Secretary is Elaine Roll and Treasurer is Helen Jones. No formal meetings have been held for some time due to Covid-19 restrictions, however an AGM is being discussed for June or July 2021.

Lockdown and social distancing rules throughout the period have at times limited allotment holder's usage of their plots and that of the Community Plot. Rules regarding social distancing and safe usage of communal areas, such as water taps, have needed to be followed. To reduce the risk of the spread of Covid-19 the society have tried to ensure only allotment holders enter the allotments. Unfortunately, pedestrians unable to exit the church field via the village hall carpark sometimes use the allotments as an alternative route, so increased signage has been needed in order to try to prevent unauthorised admittance.

Despite the lockdown conditions over the last year, there has been renewed interest in the allotments from the local community to the point that all plots are now leased, and the society has a waiting list of approximately 5 households. Once all restrictions have been lifted the Community Plot can once again be used for meetings and events to the benefit of all allotment holders and the wider community. Pleasingly we can report that allotment plots widely reflect community enthusiasm with many already full of fruit, vegetables and flowers and in good repair. The society is optimistic that members old and new will be able to enjoy normal allotment life this year, especially when the weather warms up a little.

We look forward to the future in providing excellent facilities for the local community and will, of course, continue to comply with any Covid 19 rules and regulations that may remain thus ensuring the Hall is safe for all.

We would like to extend thanks to all of the Committee for their service and commitment during the last year.

THE FOLLOWING HAS BEEN ANALYSED FROM DATA COVERING THE LAST 16 MONTHS**ADVERTISEMENTS**

This period has seen advertising at the height of 35 adverts per issue down to the lowest at 17. We have then seen an increase after the first lockdown to an average of 26 adverts per issue. We have been generously supported by advertisers who carried on advertising through lockdowns and welcome new advertisers.

FINANCE

REVENUE: From advertising and donations has dropped, with many events, from which we generally receive monies, not taking place. However, due to diligent finance management by our Treasurer, currently and in previous years, and the generous donations from the now folded Cubert Footpath Association and personal donations, we still are in the black.

COSTS:

Printing costs were saved during the first lockdown as the printers were closed during the April and May issue production. The number of pages per issue now averages 28 instead of 32 which brings costs down. This is mainly due to the lack of events taking place and the lower advert take up. Other article contributions are still at a good level. Checking distribution quantities has resulted in a lowering of print copies even taking into account 11 extra copies for Penhale View.

ECO NEWS JULY 2021

The Global Leaders came and went and we were treated to views of the beautiful coastline at Carbis Bay as a background to the national News every night for a few days. But did the magic of Cornwall help to bring about exciting new moves to face the problems which are threatening life as we know it? After being addressed by Sir David Attenborough, some countries made a promise to move away from using coal plants, but with no details on how or when that might be achieved, although they did agree to stop financing new coal-powered energy generation in developing countries from next year.

Meanwhile, the climate crisis continues to develop in intensity: In America an unusually early and long-lasting heatwave has been affecting more than 40 million people with temperatures riding as high as 49C (120F) in California. News from the Polar regions is not much better. A sheet of ice has broken away from the Antarctic coast, bigger than Majorca, becoming the world's largest iceberg. Melting ice from the Polar regions has caused sea levels to rise by 9 inches since 1800, and the Arctic is now warming 3x faster than the global average. Soot pollution, which settles as a black deposit on the ice, is causing it to absorb more warmth from the sun, and so heat up faster. This pollution is also affecting the health of the entire ecosystem, including humans. Some positive news, however, has come from the American Government which has suspended oil and gas drilling licenses in Alaska's National Wildlife Refuge; a breeding ground for polar bears and grey wolves, musk ox and caribou, as well as many migratory birds. Also in America, a controversial oil pipeline project has been axed following years of protest from environmentalists and indigenous people. The 1,200-mile pipeline was set to run from Canada to Nebraska, but work has now been halted due to the Biden administration.

Closer to home, a worrying report by the UK's independent climate advisors has warned that the country is now less prepared for the effects of climate change than it was 5 years ago. The document reveals the wide-ranging problems affecting our homes, food supplies, health system and economic output. UK temperatures have risen by 1.2 °C since the period 1850-1900 and average sea levels have risen by 16cm. Extreme heatwaves are now 25% more likely, bringing the risk of severe thunderstorms and flash flooding in their wake. In Margate recently, due to unusually high volume heavy rain, the sewerage pumping station was unable to cope and emptied tons of raw sewerage into the sea to prevent it backing up into domestic drains. Now the coast of Kent between Margate and Broadstairs is polluted with raw sewerage which will take up to a month to disperse.

Ending on two positive stories, news has come in that the film actor Leonardo DiCaprio, is donating £30.4 million to help protect and re-wild the Galapagos Islands. He is a founder member of 'Re-wild'; a plan to re-introduce locally extinct species and re-establish wildlife populations on the islands which played a key role in Charles Darwin's theory of Natural Selection, now in crisis because of increasing numbers of predators and industrial fishing around their coast. In the world of video games, environmental issues are becoming a popular theme with two new games; one involving a diver scientist trying to discover secrets of the deep in the Western Pacific, based on the TV series Blue Planet 11 and another called Bee Simulator where players become bees buzzing through their microworld. The UN believes that games like these will help to raise awareness of environmental issues around the world as around one in three people across the globe play video games – nearly 2.6 billion people
