

It is a long time since I did English Literature at school and I wonder if paraphrasing Charles Lutwidge Dodgson is the right way to motivate the parishioners of Cubert to contribute to the composition of their Neighbourhood Development Plan.

In the absence of any other better ideas; here goes: The time has come to talk of many things, not shoes, not ships, not sealing wax, not cabbages nor kings but how you, the parishioners of Cubert want your parish to develop over the forthcoming years. When he wrote "Let us talk of cabbages and kings" Dodgson, a.k.a. Lewis Carroll, went on to say, "not the shadow waiting in the wings."

I would like to suggest that the shadow waiting in the wings for Cubert could be the unbridled development of the Parish to the detriment of many and the benefit of few.

Irrespective of my thoughts, the Cubert Neighbourhood Development Plan Steering Group want and need to hear your thoughts to help them best compose a Plan to help protect and enhance the development of the Parish, in accordance with the wishes of existing residents, for years to come.

With this in mind there will be an exhibition, based on the results from various local surveys, relating to:

- Priorities for new housing development in the parish both in terms of quantity and location.
- Future business development in the parish both in terms of quantity and location.
- Protecting our heritage assets and green spaces.
- Traffic control and car parking within the parish.
- Provision of sports and leisure facilities for local residents.
- Safeguarding our school facilities and potential expansion needs.

As I said last month the primary purpose of the exhibition is to inform, publicise and seek the views of as many parishioners as possible prior to the composition of the initial Cubert Neighbourhood Development Plan. ECO NEWS

The big news this month must be the gathering of the Nations in Glasgow for COP26. It has been twenty six years since the first meeting, when the Panel for Climate Observation was formed, to monitor the effects of human activity on the climate, and the rate of change taking place. Since then there has been a great deal of good words spoken, but sadly good deeds have not followed at the rate needed to allay the worst of the problems that will be afflicting our planet. Governments will have to make determined, sustained, painful and costly changes. Sadly China, one of the world's biggest CO2 emitters will not be attending, although the Chinese government has pledged the country to become Net Zero by 2050., and is investing heavily in the production of renewable and green technology. However, there are many of the smaller and more vulnerable countries of the world who do not have the means to make the changes needed, and the billions of dollars that have been promised by the richer nations have yet to materialise – another example of speaking good words but not following up with good deeds. There are four stated goals for COP26. The first of these is to secure Net Zero emissions by the middle of this century to be a solution to the state goals for COP26. The first of these is to secure Net Zero emissions by the middle of this century.

to keep global warming within the 1.5degC rise which might mitigate many of the worst effects. To be able to do this countries will have to drastically reduce the amount of fossil fuel used in industry and in generating electricity, phasing out the use of coal especially, as an early response. Alongside this, invest heavily in renewable energy and encourage the change to electric motors across the transport system. There should also be a global commitment to ending deforestation and to allowing natural regeneration of forests as well as sustainable tree planting.

The second goal is to adapt and protect vulnerable communities and ecosystems. This will involve investment into flood management and fire control, water management and urban overheating, as people find their homes lost to rising sea levels and their food and water supplies depleted by drought and poor harvests. Short term exploitation of rain forests and oceans for single crop agriculture and intensive fishing, not only harms the whole ecosystem but as a result leads to loss of species and loss of livelihood for the people relying on growing their own food and fishing to feed their communities.

The third goal is to deliver huge amounts of investment from the wealthier nations, to enable the first two goals to be achieved world-wide.

Finally the fourth goal is to secure commitment from the attending nations to work together to rise to the many challenges of climate change. Finalising the rules of the Paris Agreement of 2015 would make that Agreement begin to make a difference, meaning that governments are showing they are committed to reaching the goal of net zero by 2050. Already many of those nations are lobbying against some of the proposals, especially in relation to phasing out fossil fuels. All of this can only work if all aspects of our communities also work together, from the large institutions, business and commerce, local government and down to each individual. We all have a part to play. At a recent conference in Truro, at which Simon Reeve came to talk, there was a gathering of just such people. The Green

Shoots conference was organised by Truro and Penwith College, to bring together local businesses and other organisations, to see how the climate crisis can be managed and mitigated by commitment to investment in green strategies and reducing carbon emissions. There were people from education looking at how digital skills and apprenticeships might encourage young people and provide important new jobs. There were people from local businesses and local government seeking ways to work together to improve their communities and address real problems of poverty and deprivation, as well as working together to bring innovation and exciting new developments for sustainable living and improved well-being. Simon Reeve commented on the important role Cornwall can play in the national effort, through the great affection the county has in the memories and experiences of those who visit. By being an example of good practice in caring for our environment and working together, those who come on holiday would go home with a better awareness of the importance of the measures that will have to be taken to make Britain a safer, less wasteful, healthier and more ecologically diverse country.

Students from the College had worked together to come up with a 'Ten Pledges for the Planet' plan, written for young people, but which everyone could take part in to make a difference. These were: Meat-free Mondays, Sustainable transport, Recycling as much as possible, Reducing use of plastic, Sustainable fashion, Working out your carbon footprint, Saving energy in the home, Litter picking, Finding out about our planet and Talking about the climate crisis. If we all did just some of these things, it would make a difference because it would mean we are taking the situation seriously and wanting to play our part.

Simon also reminded us that as human beings we are the most adaptable and ingenious of creatures and our future is in our hands. We do not have to feel helpless, but use the emotion of the crisis to fuel our desire for ways to change.

Domestic waste should never be placed in litter bins. Please use the Cornwall Council regular collection service.

As the evenings are now drawing in, when walking, please dress appropriately to be seen and face oncoming traffic.

BIRD NOTES

Golden Eagles became extinct in Wales centuries ago, but an escaped one has been living in the Cambrian Mountains for nine years. Believed to be female, she is thriving in an area largely abandoned, with only a few deserted farmhouses. There are also Red Kites, Buzzards, Merlin and Golden Plover in the area.

Nicola Phillips saw a Wryneck on the Scillies and soon after saw another at Pendeen in Cornwall on 16th September. Wrynecks are related to Woodpeckers; they are very shy and are slightly larger than a House Sparrow. Those occurring in Britain are usually displaced breeding birds from Scandinavia. Wheatears were also spotted at Pendeen. A Penguin as big as a man roamed a now sunken continent 30 million years ago, fossils in New Zealand show. Toxic algae, known as 'Red Tide', has killed thousands of birds and fish along the East coast of Britain, experts say.

This occurred in mid-September and the birds mainly affected were Guillemots and Razorbills. A wildfire last Spring caused devastating damage to heather habitat in the Mourne Mountains, County Down. Before the fire, Ravens were seen feeding their chicks at Thomas's Mountain. The blaze moved past their nest site and the ranger was concerned. Fortunately, a few weeks after the fire, the call of the Raven was heard in the mountain again. The National Trust renamed a meadow on the White Cliffs of Dover 'Dame Vera Lynn Down' on memory of the late star. The meadow was saved in 2017 after she supported a fundraising campaign. The meadow is now filled with wildflowers and an abundance of Skylarks.

The National Trust also has traditional orchids at Brockhampton, Herefordshire with rare Lesser Spotted Woodpeckers living there.

On 8th October Tim Hodder saw the local pair of Choughs near their nest site. He said that they were very active and noisy. It is his first sighting there since around June time. Both birds were in superb condition and he couldn't recall ever seeing their beaks and legs so red.

A Green Woodpecker is still being seen in the Trevail area by Len and Nicola Phillips. Nicola also say a Grey Wagtail at Chynoweth in the first week of October.

On 9th October, a Long-toed Stint was seen at St. Aiden's Reserve near Leeds. This species has only been seen three times in the British Isles. The last sighting was in Ireland in 1996. Stints have a slender body, yellow legs, a short dark bill and a unique flight call. This bird is thought to have got lost flying from Siberia to Australasia.

Perhaps the good weather has kept them here longer as Tim Hodder saw Swallows on 22nd September and Ben Hocking saw House Martins towards the end of September. Ben also saw our local pair of Choughs on 12th October.

On the Scilly Isles a very rare Spotted Sandpiper was seen in the second week of October. -Rodney Phillips





WI BOOK REVIEW



WI BOOK GROUP REVIEW Title : THE STRAYS OF PARIS Author : JANE SMILEY ISBN : 978-1529052985



Jane Smiley is an American novelist who writes books for both adults and young adults alike (in particular about her favourite animal, the horse). Jane also writes historical novels and won the Pulitzer Prize for Fiction for A Thousand Acres.

The main character is a racehorse - Perestroika (nicknamed Paras) who had just won a race and found her stable door unbolted and decided to go 'walkabout' taking her stable groom's purse containing betting wins (the story definitely needed this to make it work) and ended up in the city of Paris befriending a wary dog, Frida. Frida had just lost her owner - presume through his death - and was really a smart 'street' dog but wary of humans.

The unlikely friendship between the dog and horse and the various birds and animals that come into their lives was told through the animals minds. The animals were the main characters and the people incidental, but necessary, to the story.

The group thought the book was charming - a lovely, calm and peaceful read. We felt part of the animals lives and the reader required to lose their cynicism and embrace the lovely tale of the developing relationship with the horse and a lonely young boy, Etienne .

PRICKLES & PAWS UPDATE

It's Spikey...I mean...Spooky Season....

It has been another busy month for the Prickles and Paws team with our 'hogspital' currently running at full capacity with nearly 100 hedgehogs on site. So far this year, we have had over 1,000 admissions, which is higher than last year's total admission. In spring we saw a devastating amount of strimmer related injuries, the summer brought with it many dehydration and flystrike cases which are continuing into the autumn and recently we have had some cases of trapped and injured hedgehogs due to garden waste materials, such as plastic.

Rhubarb and Custard are currently our cover hedgehogs in our

campaign to raise awareness around the dangers of litter, netting and plastic materials used in the garden. Rhubarb was found entangled in black plastic, luckily, she was brought to us just in time, and the plastic had yet to cause any wounds. Rhubarb was found with her sibling, Custard, but because of her entanglement, was over 150g smaller. We are pleased to report that she is responding well to treatment, and we hope she will catch up to the size of Custard very soon!

We hope this serves as a reminder that plastic pollution is not only plaguing our oceans! Remember to keep your garden hedgehog friendly by removing all litter and plastic waste and to raise any netting off the ground. Now the autumn leaves have started to fall, and everyone is beginning to cosy into this auburn autumn month, we have also had a lot of calls concerning hibernation. Is it that time of year already? Well, the answer to that is, 'No'! Although we may all be starting to feel like hibernating, in Cornwall, our prickly pals are not quite ready. Where it is cooler in other parts of England, they may start thinking about it, but with our milder temperatures in Cornwall, some hedgehogs will hibernate as late as January/February. So, please do not worry if you see smaller hedgehogs out at night! They still have plenty of time to gain weight for hibernation. However, do give us a call if you have any concerns regarding any hedgehogs spotted out during the day.

Lastly, once all the Halloween chocolate has been eaten and the skeletons are back in the closet, everyone then starts planning for bonfire night. We would just like to remind everyone that unlit bonfire piles make perfect nesting

spots for hedgehogs and other wildlife. Please ensure that your bonfires are moved 12 hours before and checked again before lighting. A hedgehog's reaction to danger is to curl into a ball and it can take them a while to realise that running away would be safer. It is good to know that if a hedgehog has been hibernating, it can take them 12 hours to be able to move well enough again to escape. So, please, please move and check all bonfires before lighting.
