



NEW STORAGE EXTENSION

The new build at the rear of the Hall.

An extension for extra storage was designed and the planning permission granted in December 2020. Most of the funding has been from grants and the build needed to start by October 2021 in order not to lose some of this money. The Hall was given an extension to this deadline to the end of December 2021. Quotes were sourced and the builder commenced groundworks in November 2021.

You will see the blockwork is in progress and the completion is anticipated to be the end of March early April 2022.

HEDGES AND TREE


You may have noticed that the hedge on the Church Field side and the boundary of the farmer's field at the rear of the hall has been reduced in height and given a heavy cut back. This has given back areas of the car park that had been overgrown. The Elm tree at the back was diseased and may well have fallen down if not attended to. This has been removed.

Cubert Parish Social Club

Due to slow response so far and the late newsletter for January, the survey reply time is being extended

A proposition from within the parish has been put to **The Cubert Village Hall (CVH)** committee that the **CVH** be extended to include a village social club possibly known as **Cubert Parish Social Club (CPSC)**

The "Cubert Parish Social Club" would be operated as a separate concern (committee) located within the "Cubert Village Hall" and would be licensed for the serving of alcoholic drinks and a limited food menu.

All profits to be reinvested into **The Cubert Village Hall** with donations to various community organisations within the parish.

This would give Cubert Parish a very useful amenity for local residents.

The added facility of the Bar and Lounge area would make the CVH more attractive for Functions, Parties, Wedding receptions, Entertainment nights, Bingo, Quizzes, relaxed discussions ETC.

This in turn would increase the utilisation of the Village Hall, expanding operations and improving the operational efficiency.

As with all social clubs, a small annual membership fee would be applicable with possible temporary membership available for visitors.

It has been suggested that the extension required for the **Cubert Parish Social Club** could be self-build like the original Cubert Village Hall building with volunteers donating their time and expertise. Please indicate on the form whether you would be able to offer your assistance on a volunteer basis.

Before the meeting opened: Kirstly Edlin addressed the Parish Council with a detailed objection to

OPENING: The Meeting was opened at 7.10 pm, by the Chairman Cllr. A. Percy

MINUTES OF THE MEETING HELD ON 15th December 2021: The Minutes were approved and signed as True

Records.

MATTERS ARISING FROM THE MINUTES OF 15th December 2021:

Cllr. G. Rowe commented that the Bramble overgrowth has been cut back by the School.

Cllr. A. Percy advised the Parish Council that we have received a revised quote for refurbishment of Cubert Toilets.

Platinum Jubilee – a volunteer has been found to do designs for the road signs for Cubert and Holywell.

Finance: Resolved to accept the Brannan & Sons quote to refurbish the Cubert toilets.

Cubert Parish Council have decided to recommend that the Cubert and Crantock Community Benefit Trust provide cash support of £8000 towards the costs of the Platinum Jubillee and refurbishment of the toilets.

PLATINUM JUBILEE

Cllr. Wayne Caff updated the Parish Council on preparations for the Platinum Jubilee. The next meeting of the committee will be held next month. He talked about ideas for the Beacon and suggestions for Lighting up the church in red white and blue with possible Laser lighting behind the Spire. The Smugglers Den has agreed to provide a food service on Thursday 2nd June. Possibilities for Entertainment included a School play, a children's fun run, Stalls, Childrens Entertainment such as Bouncy castles, Musicians. A tree planting is also planned for the day.

NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

The group have had their sixth post Covid face to face meeting. The steering group are currently drawing up proposed policies and are currently looking at employing a site analysis company.

MODIFICATION OF STANDING ORDER 26. EXPENDITURE - Resolved to ratify the modification of standing orders.

ANY OTHER RELEVANT BUSINESS NOT REQUIRING DECISIONS AT THIS MEETING:

Cllr. A. Percy announced that Granite block for the wishing well has been ordered and that the Post on the well may need replacing. Cllr. A. Percy thanked Cllr. T. Hulbert for all his work in moving the Speed Visor – A couple of Volunteers have come forward to assist with this in the future. Cllr. A. Percy asked all Councillors to consider any highway issues in the Parish that need addressing and report back at the next Parish Council meeting.

CLOSING, DATE OF NEXT MEETING: The meeting was closed 10.03pm.


The Regular Parish Council meeting to be held **on 16th February 2022 at 7 p.m.** in the Village Hall **LITTER BINS**

Everyone can help us by not putting domestic waste or dog poo bags in litter bins. Please only put dog poo in the allocated Dog poo bins – The Parish Council litter bins are not designed for this use and we do not possess a vehicle capable of transporting the heavy bags laden with dog waste. If you are not passing a Dog Waste bin - Please consider taking your dog waste home with you and disposing of it in your general waste. You might want to consider using a Dicky Dog Waste Bag in future? Domestic waste should never be placed in litter bins. Please use the Cornwall Council regular collection service.

As the evenings are now drawing in, when walking, please dress appropriately to be seen and face oncoming traffic.



As part of the Jubilee celebrations the Carnival Committee are hoping to decorate as much of Cubert and Holywell as we can with fabric bunting. We are thinking patterned bunting triangles, predominantly in red, white and blue. To be able to do this we need the following:-



- Donations of ribbon or tape on which to attach the triangles
- Volunteers to cut out fabric with pinking shears (to minimise sewing). 7" across the top and 10" down either side.
- People with sewing machines who would volunteer to sew the triangles onto tape/ribbon.
- Cash donations to allow us to buy fabric etc.

We know this is ambitious, but we think the village could look incredible.

June 2002: Let's hope for fine weather for Monday 3rd when the Sports Afternoon at the School and the Beach Party at Holywell Bay in the evening mark our celebration of the Queen's Golden Jubilee. Many of you will have noticed that we already have the first plaque outside the Village Hall to commemorate the event. Thanks must go to David Ball for building the surrounding wall.

25 YEARS AGO

(Bryce Currah's editorial from 1977 Edition 28)

Well done, Cubert. It is a very real pleasure for us to extend to you all our hearty congratulations for all the effort which culminated in such a colourful, successful and enjoyable day of celebration on the occasion of the Silver Jubilee. Within the confines of this little parish there is a remarkable flair for organisation; it seems to us that there has always been that ability to transform the ordinary into something special.

There was no lack of entries for the Children's Sports and no less than fifteen teams entered the 5-a-side football competition. Later a happy band of children sat down to their Jubilee Tea in the Village Square. Following this was the presentation of Jubilee Crowns by Mr J R Rodliff.

Age has its compensations, so they say, and one of these was most certainly the Senior Citizen's Tea provided in the Village Hall. Special invitation cards had been sent out and those who responded were greeted by the smiling faces of the ladies who had decorated the hall and tables so beautifully and provided such a bountiful variety of excellent food. Mr A J Rushton, Chairman of the Parish Council, extended a cordial welcome to the guests and 99 year old Mr J R Rodliff led the singing of grace. He also cut the celebration cake. A programme of organ music was provided by Mr N Minns during the proceedings which featured tunes very appropriate to the occasion. Following the "Loyal Toast" Mr W Carhart expressed the sincere thanks of the gathering to all who had worked so hard and contributed so much to make the event the success it undoubtedly was.



WI BOOK GROUP REVIEW

Title: THE ROSE OF SEBASTOPOL Author: KATHARINE MCMAHON

ISBN: 978-0753823743



Many of us had little knowledge about the Crimean War. The author did not dwell on the war but gave enough information for the reader to learn interesting facts, such as how many hundreds of men died or fell wounded daily during the skirmishes which often took place over a few days. It was also fascinating that so many wives and partners followed their husbands to war.

The main character was Mariella, who had a very constrained upbringing, spending most of her spare time sewing. This was typical of young ladies at this time. Her cousin Rose was more ebullient and outgoing. It was not surprising that Rose left for the Crimea without much nursing background. Mariella then followed when it became evident that Rose had gone missing. We felt that on her return to England Mariella would be a different woman as she had gained so much confidence. Some of the group felt that comments about Florence Nightingale were a little unfair and were possibly added to create controversy.

Social changes were included in the book such as philanthropist pursuits to look after the less well off, homes for Governesses and new homes for the poor in Derbyshire. The growing knowledge about advances in medical knowledge re amputation, cleanliness in hospitals and the causes of cholera were mentioned, including information about the sewers and pipes that were being added to new housing in London.

All in all, a very enjoyable book.






As always, thank you for your support and we hope to meet some of you at events this year!

CUBERT CROSSROADS SURVEY UPDATE

Information from MP Cherilyn Mackrory (this is an extract)

While data on the number of accidents is helpful, it would also help the case if I could prove there is a clear want from the local community. I believe I now have that.

A design has been put together by Cornwall Council Highways, we just now need to find the money to pay for this important project.

The results from the survey paints a clear picture. I was pleased to have received over 650 responses to the survey. This is strong response for such a survey.

Of the 668 that completed the survey:

- 99.7% of respondents feel that the Cubert Crossroads junction need to be improved
- 94.6% of respondents have witnessed accidents or near misses at the junction
- 98.4% of respondents believe the Cubert Crossroads junction is a dangerous junction
- 98.2% of respondents feel that improving of the junction at Cubert Crossroads should be a priority for Cornwall Council and their Highways Department
- 99.1% of respondents feel that this issue has been ignored for too long
- 99.3% of respondents feel that with increased traffic on the roads, particularly in the summer, this issue is getting worse

The results are clear and show that now is the time for action, not more words.

I have now written to the local parish councils, your local Cornwall Councillor Adrian Harvey and Cornwall Council's Highway Department with the results of the survey.

I have also written to the Secretary of State for Transport asking for a meeting, and for the money so that we can get on and address this issue once and for all.



Taking a lead from the BBC's Green Planet series, now showing on Sunday evenings, our news this month will focus on the natural world. In the first part of Green Planet we saw the important influence of fungus on the health of the planet. We saw clouds of fungal spores lying above the Rain forest, combining with droplets of rain to fall back down to the ground. Each drop of water containing a spore of fungus. We saw leaf-cutter ants carrying pieces of leaf to their underground nest where a giant fungus was fed with the leaves, while producing tiny mushrooms for the ants to eat. The fungus was even able to 'tell' the ants which leaves it needed! It has been estimated that there are 450 quadrillion kilometres of fungal networks in the top 10cm of soil around the world – around half the width of our galaxy, creating a vast natural carbon sink.

Another very efficient natural way of storing carbon is in the rich deposits of peat found in many boggy and moorland areas of Britain. Unfortunately our peat deposits have been depleted over recent years, partly to be used in the commercial production of compost, and gardeners are now encouraged to buy non-peat compost. There are government proposals to ban the sale of peat for domestic use from May 2024, but peat for commercial use will not be banned until 2028. 70% of all peat sales in the UK are to commercial and domestic growers. Conservation groups are concerned that this government intervention may not be enough to protect the remaining peat beds.

But here is some good news about coral. Researchers working on the Great Barrier Reef have managed to establish twenty two new colonies using coral IVF. These new beds were planted in 2016 and have now grown to maturity and are filled with eggs and sperm, ready to spawn at the next mass coral spawning event, following a full moon. The project has seen the microscopic larvae grow to the size of dinner plates, surviving a bleaching event and now ready to reproduce themselves, bringing hope for the future restoration of large parts of the reef.

Another story of renewal comes from whale watchers off the coast of Washington and British Columbia, where a record number of Humpback whales has been recorded this season. A significant increase for a species which was on the endangered list twenty five years ago. Twice as many calves were counted this year compared to last year.

Meanwhile, rescuers uncovering bee hives from the volcanic ash of the eruption on La Palma in the Canary Islands, found five hives with the bees still alive after fifty days of being buried. The bees had survived by producing a resinous substance called propolis, which they used to seal up their hive, protecting them from the choking ash. They then fed on their winter store of honey which fortunately had not been gathered by the bee-keepers. Each of the hives could house between thirty and forty thousand bees in springtime, that help pollinate the many plants on the island.

And finally, the first 'State of the Thames' Report has been published by the Zoological Society of London, using seventeen indicators to assess the health of the Thames since it was declared biologically dead in

1957. Highlighting the dedication of conservation groups over the years, the picture now looks a lot brighter with an increase in bird species and marine animals as well as plant life. Some surprising species were found including sea horses and small sharks.

Restoration and conservation of natural habitats is key to maintaining the biodiversity of our planet, but that is also intricately linked to other factors, the most important being pollution and climate change. As we come to realise how our own lives ultimately depend on a healthy planet, we shall all hopefully work increasingly hard to do what we can to help our world survive, encouraged by the richness and resilience of the plants and creatures that live alongside us.
