#### A note on Wells in the Parish

Following on from last month's article on the Holy Well, the Holy Well in the cave on the beach was once visited by John Wesley, one of the founders of Methodism. There is also a well on Trevornick Holiday Park down in the valley, which has a striking stone structure and is maintained annually by Newquay Old Cornwall Society.

On Tresean Moor there is a Well, known to locals as Stony Well. This well was renowned for its excellent water, so much so that late resident Harry Reed had some brought to him in hospital.

These days now grown over, there was also a well at Trevail on the moor. There were also wells at Trebisken, Trelaske and at Cubert Primary School.

The well in the square at Cubert was said to be as deep as the church steeple is high (70 feet). **Rodney Phillips**



'He restores my soul'

David said, 'The Lord is my shepherd; I shall not want. He makes me to lie down in green pastures; He leads me beside the still waters, He restores my soul.

In the fifteen years I lived on the north coast of Cornwall my daily visit to the beach was often enriched by some film crew or other using Holywell Bay as the backdrop to a TV drama or Netflix series. It was great fun looking out for famous faces, always marvelling with the other dog walkers on how many people were employed on the "set" and how long it took to film just a few minutes or even seconds of airtime. We all moaned of course about our walk being disrupted but secretly we loved the fact that our little hamlet was so much in demand by the film industry because of the natural beauty on its doorstep. The one problem I did have, was that Holywell Bay was always a "stand in" for somewhere else and never the star in its own right. I know other people felt the same way. Well, I have tried, in my own humble way, to address that issue with this book.

Kernowsaurus is based in an idyllic, rural, hamlet on the North Cornwall coast. It tells of two thoroughly modern children coming to the rescue of a creature from the depths of Cornish myth and legend. Jacob and Eliza take it upon themselves to help Kelsey fulfil a destiny that is over a thousand years in the making.

The story begins on the deathbed of a time worn Arthurian wizard full of remorse and seeking redemption. It ends on the star cooled terrace of an open-air theatre on the edge of the ocean amid joyous scenes of song and celebration. The tale weaves a thread around historical occurrences that took place in Cornwall over many years. Including the sinking of SS Francia in 1917 and the bombing of Penhale Camp in 1940 where at least 22 people lost their lives.







The May members meeting saw dismal weather again but the hall was warm and the programme held the promise of interest and entertainment.

Sam kindly brought along some examples of her work and gave an excellent PowerPoint presentation of her background, tips about how to pose and tips on taking a good photo. All this was delivered with good humour and in a most interesting and enjoyable way.

Following refreshments, the results of the competition 'Native Birds and Bird Song' were announced. In first place was Juliet Weller with her written reflections on birds she regularly sees in her garden supported by pictures and a decorated birds nest. Second place went to Maggie Billing who had cleverly set out a long list of popular songs containing the names of different birds. In third place Maureen England showed her artistic flair, having drawn and painted a number of British birds. The theme for next meeting is 'Here comes Summer' and we look forward to members interpreting it in their own way.

The meeting ended with the raffle and the distribution of birthday posies and cards.



#### Visit to the Japanese Garden

Our final outing before this article goes to press was the visit to The Japanese Garden in St Mawgan. The day was perfect for the visit, warm and blue sky although under the many trees it was shady and cool.

Gaps in the trees had been arranged to allow the sun through to illuminate the beautiful Acer trees that varied in colour from acid green to deep, rich red. The colour continued beneath the canopy where Azaleas of all colours covered the ground. Twisted trunks and branches added interest between the bridges and shelters.

On our way out of the garden we stopped in the area that housed Bonsai trees and plants for sale. After the visit we enjoyed lunch in the garden of the Falcon Pub before a visit to St Mawgan Church with its beautiful stained glass windows. This visit was a great success and we look forward to the next at Tremenhere Sculpture Gardens.

#### Visit to Wheal Martyn Museum

On the 18th of April the ladies of Crantock WI visited Wheal Martyn, an old china clay mine. We were blessed with beautiful weather and were fortunate to have a tour guide who actually had worked in the mine when he was a teenager. Personal anecdotes made his narrative quite amusing and

interesting.

We learned about the process of extracting feldspar which forms when granite decomposes, to produce kaolin, used in the manufacture of fine bone china, paint, paper and even toothpaste.

They used to blast the granite with water delivered at very high pressure through hoses to extract the feldspar.

The extracted mineral then became suspended in the water that was used to



loosen it from the granite and the resulting water mixture, or slurry, was channelled down the hill from the quarry, for processing.

We saw the numerous ponds into which slurry would flow, travelling downhill with the help of gravity and being moved and separated by large water wheels. Water would be extracted along the way and the mixture eventually thickened in the last set of ponds to a consistency of clotted cream, before finally being shovelled into the large drying oven at the bottom of the hill. After being dried in the ovens, the resulting china clay powder was shipped off to be used in various manufacturing processes.

If a man became ill and unable to work at the mine, his children would be sent to work in his place so that the family could continue to receive housing and wages. Assigned tasks would be appropriate to their age. During the war, women took their husbands' places at the mine so that china clay production could continue and their housing and income were ensured.

China clay mining has existed in Cornwall for 275 years and was one of the main sources of employment and housing for generations of Cornish families.

The waste materials from the pit excavation have been placed around the outskirts of the mine and have very quickly become overgrown with vegetation. Nature abhors a vacuum and acts to produce new growth even in what may appear to be inhospitable environments.

The next meeting is Tuesday 13th June at 2.00pm in the Village Hall. All ladies welcome.

#### The Feast by Margaret Kennedy

Margaret Kennedy was an English novelist and playwright. She attended Cheltenham Ladies' College, where she began writing, and Somerville College in 1915 to read history. This novel was initially published in a shortened form in a 1949 Ladies Home Journal magazine under the title of Never Look Back.

Published in 1950 and set in Cornwall. A cliff collapses on top of a seaside resort hotel in which guests who were not on a picnic perished. A quote from the Goodreads.com site states the germ of the idea came to the author in 1937 when she and a social gathering of literary friends were discussing the Medieval Masque of the Seven Deadly Sins. .... Margaret conceived of a story that would gather the Sins all under the roof of a Cornish seaside hotel managed by the unhappy wife of Sloth.

There is an entertaining cast of characters - adolescents and children, a clergyman, husbands and wives. It could be described as a thriller or a morality play, a family saga or even a romance. Readers enjoyed this tale which could be described as a mix of Mills and Boon and Agatha Christie. The characters were skilfully but simply written and some more likeable than others but each described in a believable manner. The descriptions throughout the novel are not too wordy or overdone.

Locations felt familiar and believable especially to those of us living in the County. The start of the book has the reader gripped with the telling of the collapsed cliff and deaths of hotel guests — but not who. Each of the main characters represent each of the seven deadly sins and it takes a good chunk of the book to work out which.

The group in general enjoyed this read and felt it to be a clever, novel which covered a great deal in only seven days. Two romances develop, a secret society recruits new members and two daughters defy parents.





**Hedgehog News from Prickles and Paws Hedgehog Rescue** 

#### **Greetings One and All!**

We hope that you are all enjoying the longer evenings and (occasionally) warmer weather. We have been enjoying hearing about all of your hedgehog sightings, we are now well into breeding season and it's likely hedgehog activity will increase due to this. At the rescue we are now very much on countdown to the first orphaned hoglet of the year as last year May saw the first of nearly 350 hoglets admitted to the rescue, making up part of a total of nearly 1300!

As many of you are no doubt aware, hedgehogs are now sadly vulnerable to extinction, but there are lots of ways that we can help them out in our back gardens. **Here are our top tips:** 

Provide a shallow dish of water
Let garden boundaries grow wild
Create a bug hotel
Sow wildflower seed
Create a hedgehog highway
Please check long grass and hedges before strimming!

Most importantly of all, our number one tip

I hope that by now you've stopped feeding the birds in your garden as there is plenty of natural food for them. Now is the time to thoroughly clean and gently disinfect the feeders and put them away for use later on in the year.

Staff at Weymouth's Sea Life Centre were concerned for Chaka, a Fairy Penguin who was unsteady when walking. The penguin became the first bird in the world to have an MRI scan and thankfully Cave Veterinary Specialists in Somerset found nothing detrimental. On 13<sup>th</sup> May, keepers at Edinburgh Zoo welcomed their first Penguin chick of the year, an endangered Rockhopper.

At Sheffield's Tropical Butterfly House Wildlife Conservation Park, keepers taught a Raven called Odin to paint. They started by giving her toys to playfully pick up with her beak and then added a paintbrush. Training included plenty of treats and now she can dip the brush into paint and daub it on the canvas. Proud zookeeper Milly Fox explained that Ravens are highly intelligent and need stimulation while in captivity. Odin, who is 11 years old, was named after the Norse god when she was originally thought to be a male.

Many years ago, Major Scales of Commons Farm had a tame Raven who would come to him when he called if he was working at Crantock. It had a trick of picking up a small stone and putting it into his ear. Subsequently he gave the Raven to the Tower of London and when visiting the Tower he asked the Raven Master if he could go in with the Ravens in their enclosure. When he did, the Raven recognised him and duly did its trick.

At this time of year, Hobbies, the most agile of our raptors, arrive here having flown 6,000 miles from South Africa. Last year they were seen at the RSPB Reserve at Ham Well, Avalon Marshes, Somerset. One bird fitted with a transmitter flew up to 111miles a day during its journey to and from Africa. Hobbies will grab newly fledged Swallows, House Martins and even Swifts. Peregrines may be faster, Kestrels able to hover motionless in mid-air, and Merlins more manoeuvrable over short distances but nothing beats a Hobby for sheer spirit and energy. There are at least 2,000 breeding pairs in England, Wales and as far North as the Scottish Highlands.

On 13<sup>th</sup> May six Red Kites were seen at Bedruthan Steps heading towards Porthcothan. Although seen in reasonable numbers upcountry, they are a rare sight in Cornwall.
