172.	Apologies for Absence Apologies were received from Cllr Phelps and from City Cllrs A. King and P. Lower.	
173.	Declarations of Interest Members were reminded of the need to declare interests at relevant items.	
174.	Police Issues PCs Maddison and Parker were in attendance. From 1 February there had been one reported incident of anti social behaviour and 13 reported crimes. A burglary dwelling was believed to have been committed by travelling criminals. Members reported incidents of the locks being superglued at the East Acres field gate and two youths riding round on a quadbike. Any further information on these should be reported to the Police.	
175.	Minutes of previous meeting RESOLVED that the minutes of the meeting of the Parish Council held on 20 February 2019 be agreed as a true record and signed by the Chairman.	K. Hadfield
176.	<ul> <li>Minute No.156 – Cllr Lower reported that more parking enforcement was being done outside the school with tickets being issued as a result of camera recording. Discussions were still ongoing regarding the location of the crossing and a meeting was to be held about this the following week. Some speed checks had been carried out but this had taken place during the school holidays which affected the result, so they would be done again. She had also asked about the proposed location for the bus stop.</li> <li>Minute No. 158 – Cllr Wood had been in contact with Gary Cooper again and the Secretary of the Football Club was now dealing with the issue. He would pass on the contact details to Cllr Lower so she could speak to Banks direct as time was running out for applications. He also reported that traffic monitoring survey on Main Road, opposite Brenkley Close had been being done for a couple of weeks as indicated by Cllr Lower, and the results were awaited survey before coming back to the PC to discuss matters further.</li> </ul>	

177.	Celebration of Dinnington Parish Council Centenary  Members supported the idea of a display of historic photographs in the memorial hall to coincide with the June Strawberry Fayre, and again in October for the first meeting 100 years ago. Cllr Lower agreed to speak to Sue Wannop about some moveable display boards for this. It was agreed that Alan Proudlock would be approached to assist with the display and Miles Watson regarding the book of the village's history. It was suggested that the PC could possibly assist with funding its publishing.  It was agreed that the centenary event be a standing item on the agenda.	Cllr Lower Cllrs Porter/Thompson K. Hadfield
178.	Proposed Closure – Brunswick HWRC  The Clerk reported that a reply had been received from the City Council regarding the proposed closure. This advised that the date for closure set out in the budget consultation documents was March 2020. The new Waste Strategy would be launched in March which would include reviewing Household Waste Recycling Centre provision in the City to tackle waste more effectively, including minimising waste and increasing reuse and recycling. When plans and timescales were clear, the Parish Council would be kept updated.	
	Cllr Lower advised that she had been encouraging the City Council to talk to its neighbours in North Tyneside and Northumberland to take a more strategic view of provision as part of the new combined authority arrangements. However, joint arrangements would only work if there were enough sites. She would send on the Cabinet report for members' information.	Cllr Lower

180.1	Cllr Hood – there was still a lot of rubbish everywhere. She had cleared the school path that day but it never stayed clean for long. Members felt the school should be encouraged to keep the school path clean and the City Council could loan them the equipment. It was <b>agreed</b> that Kevin be asked to take photos and forward them to Cllr Hitchenes so he could raise the issue with the school.	Cllr Lower
180.2	Cllr Thompson – the tree stump in the old school field needed removed. Cllr Lower advised that the Council would be unlikely to do anything about it without the Parish Council paying to have it removed as it was not doing any harm, but she would ask.	Cllr Lower
180.3	Cllr Wood –a resident living near the White Swan had raised the issue of big security lights on her neighbour's property. The house recently renovated next door had a garage in the rear of the garden with a security light which was very bright and shining into her bedroom window at night, disturbing her when it went off. She wondered whether anything could be done about it. She had found out from her new neighbours that they only bought part of the plot, and the garage and top end of the garden still belonged to the builder who was using it for storage, and she queried whether this was allowed. Cllr Lower agreed to raise with Planning Enforcement.	Cllr Lower
180.4	Cllr Dellow – there was graffiti on the litterbin next to the bus shelter.	Cllr Lower
180.5	Cllr Dowd– the rubbish bins were often not being emptied on Sheraton Park until the day after their nominated day. Cllr Lower advised that this could be because they weren't getting round the whole estate so had to come back

f	Dinnington First School - Kier Construction – Kier were planning to commence the asbestos removal from the old school on Mon 25 March and follow on with its demolition during the school Easter Holidays. They had not found a lot of asbestos, and should carry out the removal in 2 weeks, with the follow on demolition taking about 4 to 5 weeks.	
\	The only remaining work after that was to construct the new cark parks where the original school was and to dig up the temporary car parks, finish off the playing fields and clear the site. They were due to complete all of the works by September 2019, but would probably be finished before then.

Cllr Oliver undertook to maintain this, should Keepmoat agree. This was seconded by Cllr Hood.
