| 107.          | <ul> <li>Matters Arising</li> <li>The noticeboard had been delivered and would be put in place by Les Bass.</li> <li>Hedge at Fenwick Corner – Cllr Hitchenes still to action.</li> <li>Updates to the website were being overseen by Cllr Hitchenes – thanks to him were expressed. He would compile some analytics of the pages which were being looked at which would inform future developments.</li> <li>A response had been received from the Post Office setting out the position regarding staffing and opening hours. There would be no change of opening hours to the post office for the long-term nor any change to its core service provisions, but they were doing what they could to maintain staffing levels and opening hours. An email address had been sent to register complaints. Thanks were recorded to Stan Johnson and Dean Bennett for their help with the trees, and to the PC members who had also been involved. Cllr Porter was very disappointed about some of the comments which had been made on social media which intimated that this was the first year there had been any lights/trees in place, which was not the case. It was **agreed** that St Oswald's removal service would be contacted to remove the trees after Christmas.

### 109. Village Projects

#### Tree replacement and maintenance programme

The PC's marked up plan for the new trees in the village had been included in the NCC planting 2024-25 season. New NCC tree officer Rhiannon McNaughton would make contact late summer/early Autumn to arrange a village walkaround to finalise locations and numbers.

# Turn the area of the Old School Field remaining after construction of the Doctors into a small simple park.

Although agreed in principle by NCC, this could not proceed until the Doctors land purchase and site requirements had been finalised.

## Speed Limit Reduction to 20mph on Main Road.

The consultation comments were still being reviewed by NCC, due to limited available staff. It was hoped to receive an update in the New Year.

#### New play park equipment in recreation ground

The slide and toddler unit were still fenced off whilst the ground continued to dry out and the surfacing could be rectified. The Activity trail was in, but again the grass mat surface had not established and they were still water logged. The Cantilever and Flex were now surfaced and would hopefully be opened soon. The other 4 new bits of exercise kit would have to be fenced off for another 2 or 3 weeks to allow the ground to recover, before reinstating the turf.

The timber trail marker posts had been installed.

The tree planting event hopefully with the cubs/scouts would probably not now happen until March, when the ground conditions had improved.

# Improvements to Footpath down to Big Waters

The Stakeholder meeting was well attended on 21 Nov and the following decisions had been made: A new gravel footpath would be constructed from the bridge adjacent to the pumping station down to the gravel farm track approx. 250m. Ramps would be constructed both sides of the bridge. 2 x New Kissing gates would be provided on the main track down to Big Waters. A new gate would be installed on the Brunswick section to allow tractor access for hedge cutting along the footpath and some minor improvement works would be carried out at Big Waters Park.

The 2 x New Kissing Gates had already been installed. Making the footpath from the recreation ground along the back of the Trees estate to the track down to Seaton Burn into a public footpath was discussed with the footpath officer. His advice was due to high legal costs and difficulties in obtaining agreement from landowners, that it would be best to leave as is and the PC carry on maintaining the path.

# **Electronic Traffic Speed signs in the Village**

Both back to back speed signs on Front Street were now complete and set at 20 mph.

### 110. Updates

**Village Hall** – Pilates class was no longer taking place so this left a vacant slot. Also, "Legs, Bums and Tums" on a Monday night had ceased. Contact had been made by the City Council's Community Wellbeing Officer regarding the activities taking place in the village hall. It was noted that the community coffee morning had been very well received and a Christmas get together had taken place that day, which had included the library volunteers. This had been a really good event.

**Newsletter –** there had been some issues regarding the delivery of the newsletter this time around. The majority of the newsletters although later than requested had been delivered by 12 December. However, the delivery company claimed they had run out of copies, so some extra copies had had to be ordered from the printers. The PC had not been aware of this until reports about non delivery had started to come in, and then contact had been made with them. This was not the first time the delivery company had let the PC down with delivering late, and this time not completing at all. The most concerning issue was that they had not informed the PC that they had not delivered all of the newsletters. It was **agreed** that the PC revert to delivering in-house so that it could keep control over the delivery.

Library - Nothing to report.

Development of field adjacent to the allotments known as the Pleasure Grounds to facilitate additional Allotments - The drawings had been updated to take in NCC Highways planning concerns and returned to them for approval. Once they were approved they would be returned to the ecologists to re-check the BNG issues to check the retained meadow and recalculate requirements at the Recreation Ground, as well. Planning issues should be finalised by early February.

**Allotments –** nothing to report.

**Website** – The latest copy of the draft minutes had been put onto the News section and additional tidying up had been carried out as discussed at the last meeting.

**Dinnington Surgery-** The new slightly larger site area had been resolved, subject to the Road Safety Audit, which was currently being reviewed by
