MENTAL HEALTH AND WELLBEING: CARING FOR YOURSELF & OTHERS

The Church of England has provided guidance on mental health and wellbeing during this strange and testing time.

Infectious disease outbreaks, like the current Coronavirus (Covid 19), can be scary and can affect our mental health. This is true within the Church context. However often we think that our faith should get us through alone. But the reality



is, we are all human and subject to both physical and mental ill health. This is true of congregations and of ministers. It is easy to be so busy looking after others' needs that we forget our own!

The guidance is aimed at helping us to better understand the sorts of mental health and wellbeing issues that individuals within our communities might be experiencing and offer support; and for us all to be aware of our own mental health and wellbeing and the need to try to stay both physically and mentally well at this time.

BEREAVEMENT SUPPORT AVAILABLE

While large numbers of those who catch Covid-19 recover, sadly people are dying.

In response to COVID-19, organisations from across Cornwall have accelerated their plans for a joined-up approach to bereavement services, so that people who suffer the loss of a loved one can quickly and easily find information.

Around 85 organisations have already signed up to the network

including faith groups, counselling services, hospice care, funeral services, NHS and council services, support groups, and professional support services.

The diocesan website also has resources for those helping children, young people and families with bereavement along with a list of organisations working specifically in this area.

Lay Canon Carrie Tucker, Secretary to Readers, was to be awarded the honour of receiving Maundy Money from Her Majesty the Queen, in person, at St George's Chapel Windsor, followed by lunch at Windsor Castle. Instead, Carrie, like so many others at this time, had to be content with plan B – a letter personally signed by the Queen and parcel in the post.

In the letter, the Queen expressed her thanks and disappointment at not being able to honour Carrie's commitment by physically giving the



Maundy Money to her in person.

"I know that you, as a recipient of this year's Maundy Gift, will be as deeply disappointed as I am that it is not going ahead."

The Queen continued: "This should not mean your invaluable contribution within the

community goes unnoticed, and I am sending this Maundy Gift to thank you for your Christian service."

Carrie said: "I dressed up with nowhere to go, apart from my garden! But it was a great honour nevertheless."

Churches are living out what they have always known – that faith has nothing to do with buildings. Thousands upon thousands are accessing live-streaming services, one of the biggest searches on

Google is 'How do I pray?' and people are asking the biggest questions of all, searching for the answers in faith.

Churches are also getting creative. Asking themselves, how do we reach people now that people cannot come to us? From online streaming to dial in church services, enchanting services from bishops about turning bananas into penguins to making their quiet places accessible through the magic of virtual reality.

GREENING WORSHIP WORKSHOPS IN MAY

Members of the clergy, local worship leaders and readers are being invited to join one of two 'Greening Worship' workshops during the month of May.

The events will be held via Zoom, and encourage questions and the sharing of ideas via the 'chat' function.

"More and more churches are wanting to include the many aspects of environmental issues within their worship," said diocesan environment officer Luci Isaacson.

"Caring for creation has become one of the central themes in the life of our churches – you only need to look at the 2020 Live Lent digital campaign and the recent vote of General Synod to work towards a Net Zero CO2 emissions target by 2030," she said.

The Environment Core Group is offering these two workshops for worship leaders, lay readers and clergy to resource them to lead 'green' services in their own churches and potentially also in other churches in their areas.

The workshops will be held on Saturday, May 16, at 11am and Wednesday, May 20, at 7pm. Both sessions will be recorded, and links will be published on the environment page on the diocesan website.

The workshops will cover the theology underpinning our care for creation, and offer lots of examples of readings and prayers and suggestions for different kinds of worship. They will explore how this theme can be incorporated into worship at many different times of the lectionary year.

Luci will be on hand to share illustrations and activities she often uses herself.
