Welcome from Chairman Bob Watson

Welcome to the 2017 Newsletter from Torthorwald Community Council (TCC). We are greatly obliged to the sponsors for our Newsletter, who are the Annandale and Nithsdale Community Benefit Company (ANCBC) on behalf of Scottish Renewables.

TCC continues to operate at full strength. All meetings are open to the public and are held on the third Monday of each month except December, alternately in Collin Village Hall and Torthorwald Village Hall. The meetings start at 7:30 pm and the 2017 AGM will be held on Monday 18th September at Collin Village Hall, when the following year's meetings will be scheduled. All are welcome at TCC meetings and we have enjoyed close support from our local Lochar Ward Councillors who regularly attend. If you have a matter to raise with the County Council, the TCC meetings are a good place to start. Our primary function is to communicate with the local people and facilitate communication with the local authority. We have close support from our Council Ward Officer, Derek Hextall, and the Community Police Unit in Division V of Police Scotland, who are based in Dumfries.


We are grateful to the 200 Club whose fund-raising activities allow us to organise events during the year, especially for older people within the community. Please join the club if you haven't already done so and help to support its aims.

One of the TCC functions is to manage the community funds available from ANCBC. Organisations or groups within the community can apply for grants for projects which will benefit the community in some way. For example, Collin Social Group was awarded a grant to purchase a projector for use at the hall. This can be made available to any groups using the hall if they require it, as it is the intention of the grant award that resources are for the benefit of the whole community where possible. If you have an idea which needs funding you may find that you can apply for help from ANCBC. The first step would be to contact us and we will try to help.

During the past year there has been considerable disquiet at the misuse of Auld Tree Road in Collin by travellers and by people illegally dumping rubbish, and local residents were understandably upset. The TCC did its best to facilitate communication between various bodies within the local authority and will continue to act as well as it can on behalf of all residents.

There are community Notice Boards in several locations throughout the TCC area, two in Torthorwald (one in Highfields and one in Linns Road), three in Collin (one at the Village Hall, one at the school and one on the Roucan Road) and one each in Greenlea and Racks. These are for the whole community, so if you have a notice you would like to see displayed please contact any council member to arrange to use one or all of the boards.

We are here to serve the community in whatever way we can be of most use. On the back page of this newsletter is a list of Community Councillors and their telephone numbers.



Collin W.I. meets in Collin Village Hall at 7.30pm on the 3rd Wednesday of each month from September to May, starting this year on the 20th September.

Collin Rural began in June 1964 and has remained a very active rural throughout the years. With a membership of 39, it is one of the larger rurals in the Dumfriesshire Federation.

This year's syllabus is hoped to include talks and demonstrations on beauty, handicrafts, baking, music, how to tie scarves, old Dumfries, Nith in-shore rescue and Butchers from Kilnford. Monthly competitions are on offer and the chance to compete at Federation and National levels in such sports as bowling, darts, golf, curling and 'Ruralympics'. KIRKMICHAEL, TINWALD & TORTHORWALD CHURCH OF SCOTLAND GUILD

Hi there – My name is Nessie Carson and I am leader of the above Guild.

Some of you will already be familiar with “The Guild” but for those of you who are not, let me give you some information about our organisation.

The Guild is one of Scotland’s largest voluntary organisations and has approximately 23,000 members. Our Motto is “Whose we are and Whom we serve “. Every 3 years a strategy is decided by the Guild and within that there are 3 annual Themes. Our 2015-2018 strategy is “BE BOLD, BE STRONG!” and our theme for the 2017/18 session is “GO IN LOVE”. During each 3 year cycle of work, 6 projects are chosen for members to support with worship, prayer and action. It is left to individual Guilds to choose which project(s) they wish to support and raise funds for.

Membership of the Guild is open to all who accept the aim: - “The Guild is a movement within the Church of Scotland which invites and encourages men and women to commit their lives to Jesus Christ and enables them to express their faith in worship, prayer and action.” Members do not have to belong to KTT Church or indeed the Church of Scotland. They can be from other denominations as long as they accept our Aim. I do really want to stress that everyone is welcome to attend our meetings whether as a visitor or potential member.

Our theme for the 16/17 session was “Go in Joy”. We tried to reflect this joy and fellowship in all our meetings and events this year and, as leader, I feel that we were successful in this. In October 2016, at our first meeting of the session, our speaker was Paul Hyles from the charity Water Aid. This was an excellent presentation - One in ten people in the world today are still living without safe water so the information Paul gave us and the slides we saw touched us all greatly. However, we also heard of the joy when a community gets clean safe water for the first time. It was uplifting to hear of the life-changing work that organisations such as Water Aid do by bringing clean safe water, sanitation and hygiene to some of the world’s poorest people.

In October 16 we also engaged with the wider Guild movement as we hosted the Dumfries Presbyterial Council Autumn meeting in Torthorwald Church on the afternoon of Sunday 30th October .This was a good meeting which included a presentation about the charity Playlist for Life. This charity was founded in 2013 by Sally Magnusson after she witnessed the positive effect of music on her late mother’s dementia.

Our speaker for the November meeting brought us an update on the progress of the new Dumfries & Galloway Hospital. It was excellent to hear that the project was progressing well.

Our December and January meetings were given over entirely to fellowship and celebration with a Members Night in December and, on the evening of 11th January, we all met for dinner at Casa Mia restaurant in Dumfries. Joy was again present at our February meeting when we were entertained by a group of 5 ukulele players from St George’s Church. The group was led by John Glover and we had a really fun evening. John is a superb raconteur so there was much laughter and we all enjoyed singing along to the ukulele music -despite the fact that our youngest members struggled with some unfamiliar tunes!!

In March the Dumfries & Galloway Blood Bikes told us about the important work they do in our region to deliver blood, samples and urgent medical supplies out of hours. This is a charity which is run by volunteers. Our session finished In April with our AGM. Plans for our 17/18 Session are underway. At our AGM in April this year, it was agreed to try a slightly different approach to our meeting times. Our 17/18 session will now start a month earlier than usual in September - on Wednesday 13th September at 7.30pm in Kirkmichael Hall. Our meetings in November 2017 and February 2018 will be afternoon meetings (1.30pm to 3.30pm) instead of in the evening and there will be no meeting in December 17.

Please feel free to call us for more information on our plans for our new session. We will be delighted to hear from you and/or welcome you to our meetings.

OBITUARY

Isobel Cowan

January 1921 – June 2017

It is with great sadness that we report the death of Isobel Cowan, a much loved resident of Torthorwald village.

Isobella C Kelly was born in Whithorn on January 5th 1921. She was known as Tibbie in her home town but we in Torthorwald knew her as Isobel. She and her sister, Betty, were known for their immense generosity to all around them. The villages of Torthorwald and Tinwald have particular reason to be grateful for the support and kindness these two ladies showed to the residents and to the church.

Isobel's fascinating adult life began before WWII when she worked for the GPO. When war broke out she joined the Auxiliary Territorial Service from which she was selected to be trained in the use of Morse Code. As a very intelligent young lady, Isobel became involved in the development of the code breaking system used at Bletchley Park, a system which intercepted and de-coded signals from the enemy. It is widely believed that this work shortened the war by 2 years saving thousands of lives. Isobel's code-breaking activities remained a secret for many years after the war but she was extremely proud of her service to her country and quite rightly so. We all owe a huge debt of gratitude to Isobel and her Bletchley colleagues, a fact endorsed by Sir Winston Churchill himself.

Post war, Isobel went on to carve out a long and successful career with the SSEB. Reluctantly she retired at the age of 60 but happily, she married Bob Cowan from Torthorwald soon after. Since moving to Torthorwald in 1982, Isobel has always taken a very active interest in many aspects of the village. The Cruck Cottage, Torthorwald Community Council and the Village Hall Association were just some of the local organisations which benefitted from Isobel's great generosity. To raise funds for their beloved church, Isobel and Bob wrote a book on the History of Torthorwald Parish Church, a precious legacy that will remain for future generations to enjoy.

After Bob died, Isobel continued to support the village life. In latter years her failing health has not deterred her from her keen interest in the local people of Torthorwald, many of whom were long standing friends.

It has been a pleasure and a privilege to have known this remarkable lady during her long life. She will be greatly missed by all.

A New Path

Hemplands is a 190 acre sheep, beef and arable farm run by John and Nessie Carson.

The farm is situated on the Tinwald High Road – approximately 1 mile from the A709- and the views from Hemplands of the surrounding area are superb.

With the support of their landlord, John Cunningham-Jardine and Dumfries & Galloway Council Countryside Services Department, John and Nessie are planning a brand new route over Hemplands to link the Tinwald High Road and the Shieldhill Road. This will ensure that there is a circular route for walkers from Torthorwald village, along the High Road, up through Kilnshaw Wood then crossing 2 of Hemplands fields and back onto the Shieldhill Road and back to the village (or vice versa).

The path crossing Hemplands will be fenced off from the rest of the field to ensure that the welfare of farm livestock will not be compromised. This fence will be funded by Dumfries & Galloway Council Countryside Services Department.

Travellers/Gypsies, Auldtree Road, Collin.

The last few years have seen an escalation in problems related to illegal encampments. The community council would like to thank all those who attended a public meeting to discuss the issues. The council has now set up a gypsy/traveller liaison group. The first meeting was held in April and further meetings are planned 4x a year. A Gypsy/Traveller Liaison Officer post is being created and the following plans were agreed:

The Scottish government guidance on unauthorised encampments is to be reviewed and translated into a Dumfries and Galloway multi-agency response.

The possible use of CCTV to secure prosecutions against fly-tipping is to be reviewed.

The latest guidance from the Scottish Government in relation to the minimum standards for Gypsy/Traveller sites is to be reviewed. This document will be used as a template to create an improvement plan for both of the sites in Dumfries and Galloway as the group agreed that the current standards are not being met. Significant investment will be required to achieve the Scottish Government targets.

A re-vamped tenancy agreement and code of conduct for unauthorised encampments and for the sites will be developed. This will clearly set out to Gypsies/Travellers their rights and responsibilities both on site and in encampments.

Collin Village Hall





We're currently working on refurbishing our hall using the £300 kindly contributed by the Torthorwald Community Council we plan to take our first step by replacing our cooker. We've also recently been granted £3,310 from the ANCBC to replace our boiler and we don't plan to stop there.

We'd like to express our deepest thanks to Torthorwald Community Council and encourage anyone who'd like to make use of our hall for only £7 an hour to get in touch. Last Christmas one of our hard working committee, Leona Milligan, organised a successful Christmas party which she plans to repeat this year and we're a great venue for events such as private functions, meetings & parties.
