1. INTRODUCTION

1.1 Background

This report summarises the findings of the community survey conducted as part of the community engagement and stakeholder consultation undertaken in the Summer of 2024.

Other elements of the community action planning process included:

- Stakeholder meetings and interviews
- A business survey
- Preparation of a community profile
- A Community Futures feedback and prioritisation event

The process has been guided by a steering group including representatives from Aberfeldy Development Trust, Aberfeldy Community Council, Dull & Weem Community Council, Warm Connections/Aberfeldy Parish Church, the Birks Cinema, Climate Café, Healthiest Town, Town Hall/Locus Centre, Tay Valley Connections and other volunteers.

STAR Development Group provided their expertise and guidance in community action planning and Perth & Kinross Council also contributed some valuable support to the steering group.

1.2 Survey Organisation

The survey questionnaire was based on a template and guidance provided by STAR Development Group with input from the steering group. The form was designed by local business EMB Graphics.

The survey was carried out as a household survey with a team of around 18 survey volunteers distributing survey forms to approximately 1200 households in the area and returning to collect these. Some of the outlying areas were not reached by the volunteers, but these were encouraged to complete the survey online.

The survey form was also available in the Birks Cinema, the Library and the Locus Centre and was promoted at the farmers' market and in local cafes. The online survey link and QR codes were promoted on the survey form, posters, the school, the Quair and through Facebook and with local groups.

The Breathe youth project also helped by carrying out the survey with some young people who attended their summer activities.

1.3 Survey Response

A total of 557 completed community views surveys were received - 218 from the household distribution, 331 online, and 8 from the Breathe project.

Although there is a spread of responses across age ranges there were significantly more responses from the older age ranges than from children and young people. This is typical in this type of household survey, as it tends to be older adults and retired people who have more time to respond.

We aim to balance the views with younger age population by working with local schools to encourage young people to contribute through survey and project work.

The results of this will be reported separately.

The survey was hand delivered by volunteers to 1200 households across the Aberfeldy, Dull & Weem communities. The 2011 Census states that there are 218 households in Dull & Weem and 1007 in Aberfeldy - giving a total of 1225.

The 2011 Census (the most recent available at time of writing) shows that around 10% of properties in Aberfeldy are empty or 2^{nd} homes, and around 24% of properties in Dull & Weem.

11% of the respondents said they lived 'elsewhere' than Aberfeldy, Dull & Weem.

The table shows where those responses came from, with the majority from the neighbouring Mid Atholl Community Council, Loch Tay and Glen Lyon Community Council, and Kenmore and District Community Council areas. Some also came from visitors to the caravan park, or people who said they had connections or a second home in the area.

These are valuable responses as they give a view from those who use Aberfeldy as a centre for accessing services and recreation.

2.1 Community Spirit

Over 70% of respondents said they liked the community spirit, including the friendliness of the people, the welcoming and mixed community and the way that people help and care for others.

2.2 Countryside, Views and Nature

Nearly 60% of respondents said they like the beautiful countryside, rural setting and proximity to nature. Specific mention was made of the river and the loch, the mountains and the forests. Also noted was the open space, the lack of pollution and the abundance of wildlife in the area.

2.3 Community Groups, Activities and Facilities

Many comments in the survey reflected on the range of local voluntary groups and organisations and the activities and services they provide for residents of all ages. Of particular mention was the Birks Cinema, which gained over 40% of the comments under this theme for the role it provides not only as a cinema but as venue and support for other groups.

2.4 Outdoor Activities

Respondents appreciated the surrounding countryside not only for its scenic beauty but also for the many opportunities it provides for outdoor activities. People said the area is well served with paths and trails, many of which are maintained by the Upper Tay Paths group of volunteers. The new Feldy-Roo trail at the riverside is a much appreciated addition, and the range of local sports clubs too – e.g. golf, rugby, cricket, football, tennis.

2.5 Sense of Place

The character of the community – its sense of place – is what a lot of people like. This includes the peace and quiet and low crime compared with other areas, the compact size and easy access to facilities. It has a good size of population, and well balanced with tourism while retaining its working heritage and sense of history.

2.6 Public Services

Nearly one third of respondents commented on the good range and quality of public services provided for Aberfeldy, Dull and Weem. This is high compared to many rural areas, and particular mention was often made of the range of medical services, the accessible GP service, as well as the Breadalbane Campus facilities, the schools and the library.

2.7 Local Economy

The range of cafés in the town is popular, as well as local shops for essential supplies. Some businesses got special mention, including the Watermill and the charity Thrift Shop. People enjoy the monthly farmers' market and other opportunities to buy local produce.

2.8 Location

Nearly 8% of respondents appreciated the location of Aberfeldy – that it is rural but still accessible to larger towns and cities.

2.9 Everything

Some people just like everything about the area.

3.1 Transport and Travel

Over one third of respondents were concerned about public transport – in particular the inadequate local bus service and lack of connectivity with wider bus and rail services. Added to this are the difficulties for active travel options, particularly between Aberfeldy and the outlying villages – Dull, Weem, Camserney and Kenmore being mentioned.

Lack of usable public transport, the train gets into Pitlochry 5 minutes after the last bus leaves for Aberfeldy

Very very poor transport – worst I have seen in a rural area, especially after school hours and in evening.

The fact that you are unable to walk or cycle safely along the road to Aberfeldy (Dull & Weem response)

Could do with a pathway all the way to Aberfeldy for safety reasons (Dull & Weem response)

Not so great for bike travel

You can feel cut off unless you have your own transport"

3.2 Roads, Traffic and Parking

Respondents (both as road users and pedestrians) voiced concerns about the state of the local roads and traffic issues locally. Road safety is compromised by speeding traffic, the volume of traffic and the number of HGV vehicles and motorbikes, added to by the parking situation. Many people mentioned the lack of appropriate parking in Aberfeldy both for locals and visitors to the town.

Traffic speeding, especially on Kenmore Street

The driving is shocking, speeding, parking anywhere, lorries coming through the town and driving on the pavements. The risk is high of an accident on the main street.

Pothole city on Dunkeld Street

The state of the roads, they are positively dangerous and way worse than normal coming out of winter.

Streets are a mess with potholes, litter and a load of dog mess.

The speed of traffic through Weem; this area desperately needs traffic calming measures for safety of residents, walkers, cyclists and motorists.

Generally wheelchair access around the area could be better with a few tweaks"

3.3 Housing and Development

The biggest single issue for respondents to the survey was the lack of affordable homes to buy or let, for people who work or want to work here. A contributing factor is seen to be the lack of control on 2nd homes and properties being used as short term holiday accommodation. There were also a number of concerns about the negative impact of large developments, and Taymouth Castle was mentioned specifically. Some people did not like what they viewed as inconsistent planning decisions which put restrictions on small residential developments whilst allowing larger ones.

Seems to be a lack of housing for the young, so they can't stay here. We need more Council housing built.

Lack of affordable housing is a major problem, not just for local youngsters hoping to stay where they have been brought up, it is also a significant drag on the local economy.

Too many new housing estates that would be more suited to the outskirts of Glasgow or Edinburgh – why not smaller schemes with more diversity

PKC's poor development control, especially of holiday homes and lochside

All the 2nd homes in outlying villages which lead to tiny communities

The selling of large chunks to foreign investors who don't understand the area.

The rules and regulations and delays in trying to improve your own house and garden, by PKC"

3.4 Local Economy/Town Centre

Although respondents appreciated the local shops and cafés, they also commented that there is a lack of choice, and this leads to high prices. The number of empty shops is also worrying and adds to the slightly 'run down' look of the town centre, along with messy pavements outside the shops. A number of respondents would like a wider choice of pubs and restaurants, as the existing ones all seem very similar, and

there is nothing at all in Weem. Lack of jobs and training, and the difficulty of finding local tradesmen are also issues of concern.

Surplus of cafés and lack of shoe shop, clothes shopping

Too many shops have closed down so the high street is starting to look abandoned.

All the pubs are the same and never feel very welcoming

Identical 'football' pubs and nowhere else to meet/eat/drink

Lack of convivial evening space, all of the pubs are 'sports' pubs and are not to everyone's tastes. A wider choice of 'evening economy' would be very nice.

I don't like how the cleanliness of the town centre has deteriorated – Aberfeldy used to be spotless – pavements swept daily by the shopkeepers, not a weed or litter in sight

The Square looks too bare, most of the time it just looks empty. Perhaps benches would help give more of a feel to it.

No tradesmen available – all working for the big landowners!"

3.5 Lack of/Loss of Services

Respondents were concerned at the erosion of local services, all vital to the wellbeing of the population, with the closure of banks and the cottage hospital being top of the list. The lack of a police presence and the increasing concerns about anti-social behaviour are next. Many people also noted that there is no local medical service at night and weekends.

I worry that important community services are reducing (we've already lost the hospital, banks etc) we need to retain the Post Office, Library.

Need to go further afield for hospital and dental appointments e.g. Ninewells

Lack of police presence especially as we head into the stag night season.

The fact we have no doctors on call after 6pm and all weekend. Having to wait for a doctor from Perth is totally unacceptable.

Limited offering from Live Active, regularly closing due to staff shortages.

Increasingly feeling isolated from transport and medical facilities"

3.6 Anti-social Behaviour

Although the area is generally felt to be peaceful, there is concern about certain elements of anti-social (and indeed criminal) behaviour. The top of the list is dog fouling and dogs not being controlled, with people also saying there are not enough bins. The increase in drugs, drinking and rowdy behaviour is also a growing concern, with this being linked to the reduced police presence.

Drugs are a much bigger problem here but it seems ignored and there is not enough police presence to combat it effectively

Seems to be some anti-social behaviour according to social media posts

Dunkeld Street can be very noisy and some revellers do not respect local property or residents."

3.7 Community Matters

Although one of the most appreciated aspects of life here is the good range of community activity and groups, there was some concern that there are more limited opportunities for children and young people. A lack of somewhere for young people to meet in the evenings was commented on and the desire for an indoor space for children's play was also mentioned, as was the lack of groups meeting in the evening making it more difficult for working folk to meet. It was also said that activities at the Breadalbane Campus can be unreliable, a source of some frustration.

Some respondents felt that despite the many groups and volunteers there was a lack of community leadership and a common vision to guide decision making. The lack of co-ordination also extends to availability of information to find out what is going on, except on social media.

Community Council could do with some fresh blood and ideas"

3.8 Environmental Concerns

A range of issues were raised in relation to the risks and potential loss of the environmental assets which makes the area so special and valued.

3.10 Nothing

7% of respondents found nothing to dislike about the area.

5.1 Parking, Roads and Traffic

The top three improvements – parking, roads and traffic; local economy; and housing and development – all received around the same support, just under a third of respondents.

Top of the list was improvements to parking, roads and traffic. Much of the concern focussed on safety issues, with parking issues leading to congestion which in turn is seen as a road hazard.

There were many suggestions of parking solutions, a popular one being to reinstate parking in the Square. Suggested solutions to reducing speeding traffic included traffic calming measures and more police presence at key times.

Traffic speed controls rigorously enforced in all parts of the town, especially the A827 and the Crieff Road

30mph for places like Weem that have houses on the road.

Widen the pavement out beyond the Distillery and reduce traffic speed at least as far as Strathtay Lodges

Better marked disabled parking in town

Disabled/wheelchair friendly pavements and door thresholds

Less cars more bikes in town, including bike racks"

5.2 Local Economy

People would like more choice of shops, particularly for affordable food and fuel – an alternative to the current options. Having the empty shops occupied would add to the vibrancy of the town and bring more visitors as well as serving local people with a wider range of goods.

Comments under this heading also related to the lack of choice of pubs and restaurants as it is said that the current ones have the same 'sports bar' ambiance, which is not to everyone's taste.

Jobs, training and support to encourage new/existing businesses would also help to develop a healthy mixed economy in the area.

A range of jobs with security and progression to help encourage younger people to stay and raise their families

Possible funding to help more people train for free to create larger pool of local workers

Lower rent for businesses means less closed shops

Encouragement for business to grow in Aberfeldy and prioritise local skill before outsourcing

Short term leases in the empty shops for people to try them out

Affordable small business/industrial units to allow folk to set up business"

5.3 Housing and Development

The highest number of comments overall was for one single improvement – more affordable homes to rent or buy. Respondents often related this issue as key to improving and sustaining many other aspects of the community.

5.4 Local Services

According to respondents, having respectable, well signposted public toilets would improve the visitor offering, as well as being helpful for locals. Also important is ensuring the existing health services are maintained, and if possible find a way to provide out of hours and small hospital services locally.

5.5 Environment and Access

While the efforts of the Upper Tay Paths group are greatly appreciated, further improvements suggested mainly focussed on connectivity of the outlying villages by foot or cycle, and also connecting to Kenmore.

A further bugbear for respondents is dog fouling and litter, and there were many suggestions of taking stronger action against perpetrators, as well as providing more bins. There were also proposals for ways to improve biodiversity and support a greener community.

5.6 Public Transport

Finding a solution to the lack of co-ordination between buses and train services would be a priority for many – especially those travelling for work, training or health services.

5.7 Community Activities/Facilities etc.

A priority for many young families is to have more affordable childcare in the area, to allow parents to work. More activities for children and young people were also requested, as well as improved fitness activities at the Campus (or elsewhere).

Several people noted that it would be good to have an information hub (e.g. a community website) where all events, groups and activities were kept up to date.
