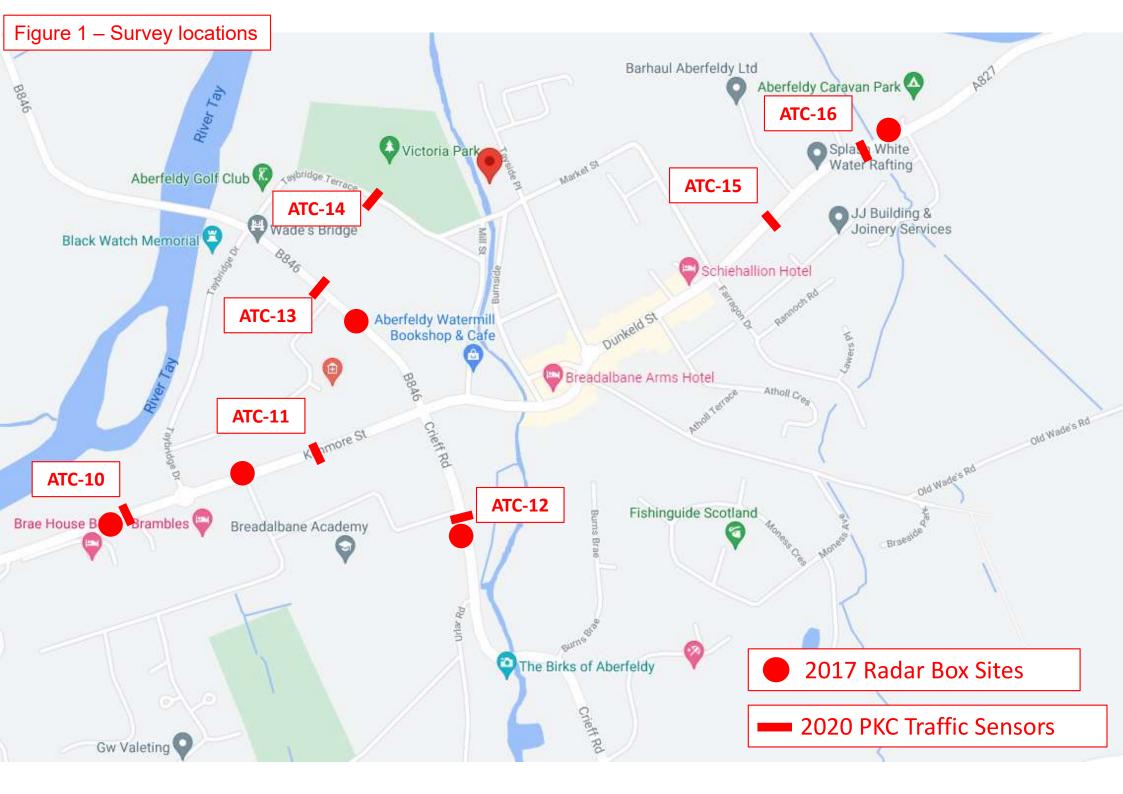


Main Messages

- Over the trial period mean speed has been reduced by between 1 and 9%
- COVID has prevented the trial being conducted as designed
- Lockdown 1 had a significant impact on traffic flow and complicates analysis
- The cleanest data set analysed to date are from Kenmore Road, the "hotspot" of the 2017 surveys
 - A 9% reduction in mean speed was found between baseline and trial end (2.75 mph lower; ROSPA* estimate this should reduce accident frequency by more than 16%; pedestrian fatality risk at mean speed has reduced from c.75% to c.50% [figure 4]))
 - In 2017, 59% of daily traffic was exceeding 30 mph, in September 2020 this had reduced to 20.1%
- Mean speed reduction averaged c 4.5% on Taybridge Road and Breadalbane Terrace, c 1% on Crieff Road
- It is recommended that the whole town 20 mph limit is retained as it has contributed to reducing speeding in the town

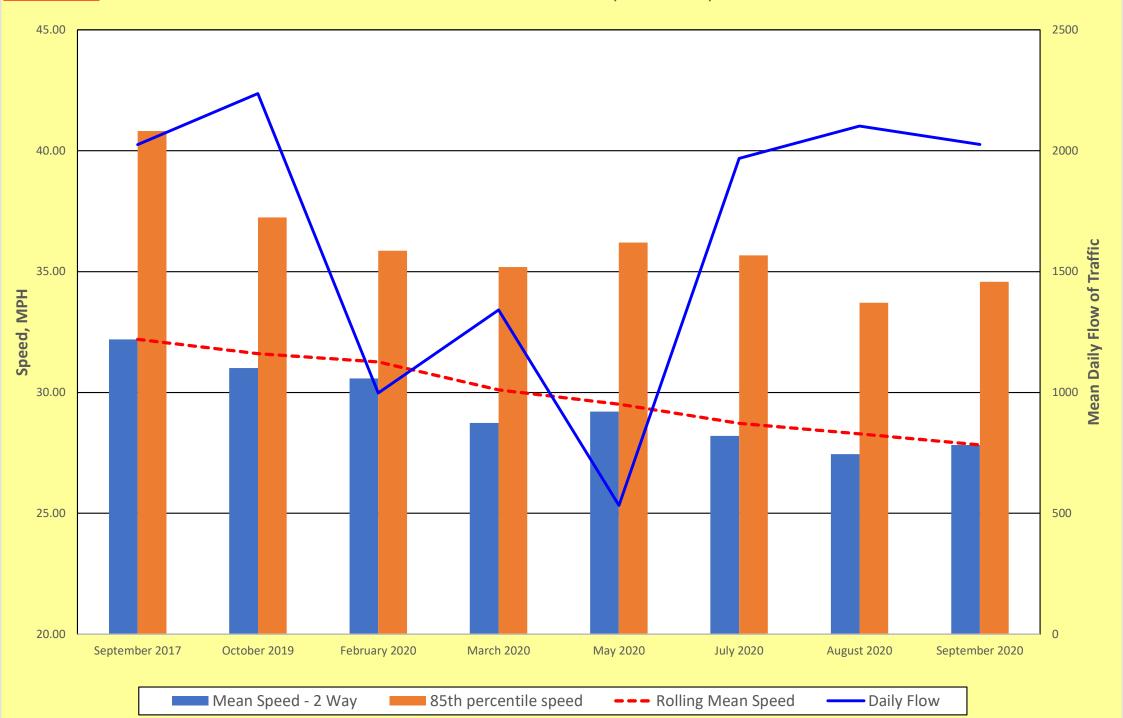
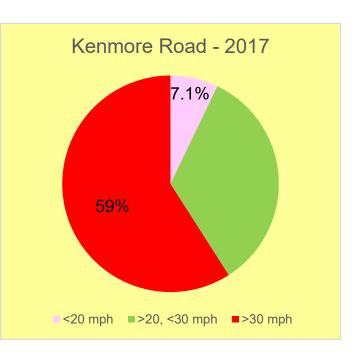
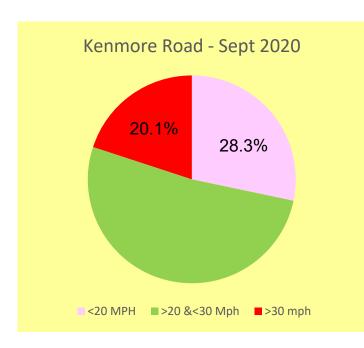


Figure 3 – Overall reduction in speeding September 2017 to September 2020
