From **Reverend Rachel Petley**

It was an absolute joy to be ordained as a deacon in Llandaff Cathedral at the end of June after 3 years of training for ordination within the Church in Wales. By the end of the day, my face hurt from smiling and it took another few days for the reality of it all to sink in, but I'm now just about getting used to wearing a clergy collar and being called 'Rev'. My personal favourite moment from the days following ordination was a child in one of our local schools announcing that my collar meant I am now a 'Bible Story-teller'; a description I love and hope that I can embody through my words and actions.

I was delighted to be asked by Bishop Mary to continue here in the East Vale Ministry Area as assistant curate and am looking forward to another 3 years in our wonderful local communities and churches, working alongside fantastic individuals in both the clergy team and our congregations. But if you're wondering what a deacon is, you won't be alone; I'd not really heard the term myself until a few years ago. 'Deacon' is an ancient role and ministry that dates to the first few decades of Christianity. It involves individuals being set apart, commissioned and sent out by the church to serve their congregations and wider communities, including those who might be struggling with health, finances, grief or loneliness. The fact that ministers never stop being a deacon even if they also go on to become priests or take other roles within the church is a reminder that leadership within Christianity should take a very different form to that more commonly seen in our societies today. Our focus should always be on serving, loving and enabling the flourishing of those around us, rather than seeking after power, influence or any other such end for ourselves. God-willing, I will be ordained as a priest in a year's time, and I already look forward to being able to bless and share communion with others, but if I lose sight of the fact that Jesus calls me first to be a deacon (and even before that, a mum, wife, daughter and friend), something has gone badly wrong. God has a wonderful sense of humour, and in case I was in any danger of forgetting this fact it was brought home to me by a bout of illness in the family that meant I spent most of my second week as a deacon caring for sick children and scrubbing toilets. The irony wasn't lost on me!

'Ministry' is not limited to those who are 'ordained'; only when the church works together and celebrates the unique gifts of every individual will it fully express what it means to be the Body of Christ here on earth. Part of the role of ordained ministers is to enable and encourage those around them to recognise and live into their own gifts and callings. I won't pretend that it's something we always get right, but the hope of seeing those around us free to be who they are called to be is a beautiful and glorious one.

As new deacons, we were called to make many promises in the ordination service, but the rest of the congregation also made one; to support us in our ministry. Part of that includes calling us to account if we lose sight of our role or start taking ourselves too seriously. So when you see me around, consider that your license to ask me how I'm getting on. It is only possible to be a deacon within the context of a community, and it is a real privilege to be part of this one.

Pendoylan Community Council Update

August 2025

Police Report:

PCSO Richard Davies has advised regarding the following reported incidents in the parish in the last month, namely:

- (a) Theft of motor vehicle at Hensol – no suspects identified
- (b) Miscellaneous fly tipping – referred to Local Authority
- (c) Suspicious drug related activity at Hensol – enquiries ongoing

Planning:

The following Applications have been received:

1. Rear two storey extension and changes to fenestration at 1 Hensol Villas, Hensol

Advertisement consent for 2 no. non-illuminated signage and 1 no. illuminated signage at Football Association of Wales Vale Resort, Hensol

Vale Councillor Michael Morgan's Report:

(a)Vale Council's Live Well Committee's Annual Review of Commissioned Services – Adults with Care Support Needs

Cllr Morgan advised that the Committee continues to deliver and sustain reduced waiting times for domiciliary care with the average wait for service set up being 3 days, a maintained position from March 2024. Whilst it has reduced the numbers waiting for packages this remains an area of fluctuating demand, and the situation remains subject to weekly monitoring. Monitoring includes packages established, increases to care and support, hospital admissions, care home placement and delayed discharges. Its performance in this area is some of the best in Wales.

(b)Road issues - There has been an adverse response from a large number of local residents to a letter received from Andrew RT Davies MS regarding the problem with HGVs and articulated lorries travelling the narrow lanes through Pendoylan & Peterston. Mr Davies advised that he has raised the matter in the Senedd and is pressing for more passing places to be installed. However there was no prior consultation with either the Community Council or residents and the general feeling is that additional passing places are definitely not the answer. Cllr Morgan has therefore proposed that a meeting be set up between Pendoylan, Welsh St Donats & Peterston Community Councils with representatives from the Vale Council and the Senedd to discuss this issue.

(c) Hedge/verge cutting: Cllr Morgan advised this should commence 21 July 2025

Culvert:

With regard to the fallen tree blocking the culvert in Heol St Cattwg, Pendoylan this has been reported to the Vale Council and a response is awaited.

Road Closure:

The road closure will be situated on Pont Sarn Lane, Clawdd Coch. The road closure to start approx. 100m westbound from the property of Brooklands Farm. From this point the closure is to continue along Ponsarn Lane in a westward direction and end outside of Duffryn Mawr Farm from 26 August until 27 August 2025 from 23.00-5.00. Traffic management will be installed and removed at specified times

Damaged stones on the village green:

In two separate incidents recently the stones alongside the village green and the main highway have been damaged by passing vehicles. This has been reported to the Vale Council's Parks Dept with a request that urgent steps be taken to remedy the situation

Peterston super Ely "Cuppa with a Copper":

Your local Neighbourhood Policing Team will be at Peterston Super Ely Community Hall on the 2nd Saturday of each month between 10.30am & 12 noon. Come along and meet them. They can discuss any local issues, provide information on crime prevention and tell you about some of their local initiatives. These sessions are open to anyone and everyone.

Thanks:

Thanks are extended to the kind person or persons who have kindly cut the grass around the bench opposite the school car park. This area is Vale Council land but their Contractors are apparently no longer instructed to cut the same

As previously advised this will take place on **Saturday 13 September 2025** and will take the form of a Treasure Hunt in and around Pendoylan village & school grounds culminating in a picnic on the village green (everyone to bring their own!). More details will be publicised shortly

BOOK REVIEWS - AUGUST 2025

“The Suspect” by Rob Rinder

When the UK’s favourite breakfast TV presenter Hannah Holby dies live on air in front of millions of viewers, the nation is left devastated. More devastated still when it becomes clear that her death was not an accident. The evidence points to one culprit: celebrity chef Sebastian Brooks who had been brought on the show in order for her to sample his signature recipe – as it turns out one with a lethal ingredient. But junior barrister Adam Green is about to discover that the case is not as open-and-shut as it first seemed. Although her angelic persona would suggest otherwise, Hannah was not short of enemies in the glittery TV world. Can Adam uncover the truth? As he becomes deeply involved in Brooks’s defence, he grapples with questions of justice, media influence, and personal integrity, all while navigating the high tensions and rigid protocols of the courtroom.

Adam has also been asked to help out in an equally difficult case involving a notorious criminal gang who have ‘recruited’ a gullible teenager to admit to storing a cache of automatic weapons under his bed. With Adam’s intervention, the young person pleads ‘not guilty’ which leads to dangerous consequences for all parties.

If dealing with such troublesome cases is not enough, Adam has to also contend himself with the regular phone calls from his ever-caring mother, who constantly tries to match-make her son, as well as trying to ascertain sordid details of the television personalities;

Rinder deftly highlights the pressures of working within the legal system, focusing on how young barristers struggle with the ethical and personal demands of their roles.

Three members of the Fowler family disappear from their dinghy in the middle of a remote Dartmoor lake. The mother, Sarah, stays on shore with toddler Mabel. But less than 60 seconds later she checks to see where they are. The boat is drifting in the middle of the lake. It’s empty! Her family have vanished! She calls in missing persons expert David Raker to find out what happened that day.

Meanwhile, at the Skyline Casino in London, a murder suspect is detained. But after securely locking him in a holding cell until the police arrive, he vanishes into thin air. While Raker investigates the Fowler case, his long-time friend and ex-cop Colm Healy delves into the casino mystery. What they both discover opens up a can of worms, putting both their lives in grave danger.

A somewhat convoluted plot but an absorbing and enjoyable read.

SUMMER RECIPES

Grilled Prawn Kebabs

Ingredients:

- 1.5 lbs extra large peeled and deveined prawns
- 1 Tbsps Olive oil
- 1 Tbsp Lemon juice plus grilled lemon wedges and zest for serving
- 2 Tbsp Herby rub

Method:

Heat grill to medium-high.

1. In large bowl, toss prawns with olive oil and lemon juice, then 2 Tbsp Herby rub.
2. Thread onto skewers (3 to 5 prawn per skewer).
3. Grill until opaque throughout, 2 to 3 minutes per side.
4. Grate lemon zest over top and serve with grilled lemon wedges if desired.

Easy Pasta Salad

Ingredients

- 85g/3oz pasta, such as penne
- ½ unwaxed lemon, finely grated zest and juice
- ¼ red onion, finely chopped
- 1 tbsp olive oil, ideally extra virgin
- ¼ cucumber peeled and cubed
- 100g/3½oz cherry tomatoes quartered
- 15g/½oz fresh basil roughly chopped
- 60g/2¼oz feta, crumbled (optional)
- handful pitted black olives (optional)
- sea salt and freshly ground black pepper

Method

1. Cook the pasta in a saucepan of boiling, salted water as per the packet instructions.
2. Whisk together the lemon zest and juice, red onion, oil and a generous amount of pepper.
3. Drain the pasta in a colander and run it under a cold tap until cooled.
4. Stir the dressing, cucumber, tomatoes, basil, feta and olives, if using, into the pasta and serve.

Strawberry Ice Water

- 12 oz strawberries
- 4 oz sieved icing sugar
- Juice of half a lemon
- 2 egg whites, whisked stiff

Reduce strawberries to a puree (blend or sieve). Add lemon juice and sugar and blend well. Pour into a shallow flat-bottomed plastic container (about 1.5 pints size), cover and freeze until half frozen and mushy.

Remove from freezer and fold in egg whites.

Return to container, cover and freeze until firm – about 3 hours

Family Information Service Launches Summer Holiday Programme 2025

The Vale of Glamorgan Council's Family Service (FIS) has announced the launch of its Summer Holiday Programme 2025 offering a wide range of free and low-cost activities for families and young people throughout the school holidays.

Working in partnership with organisations across the Vale, the FIS team have put together a calendar of events suitable for children and young people up to the age of 25 alongside a range of family activities.

Cryptosporidium outbreak in Cowbridge declared over

Following the most recent meeting of the multi-agency Outbreak Control Team on 18 June 2025 the cryptosporidium outbreak associated with Cowbridge Farm Shop at Marlborough Grange Farm, Cross Ways, Cowbridge has officially been declared over.

A total of 89 confirmed cases were linked to the outbreak. No new cases have been identified since the last OCT meeting was held on 28 May 2025 and the outbreak is now considered closed. As part of routine public health procedures a full outbreak review will now take place and an outbreak report will be produced.

Although the outbreak has ended, Public Health Wales continues to stress the importance of practising good hygiene – including thorough handwashing with soap and water – especially after contact with animals or the natural environment
