It was with great pleasure that I took over the post of Chair of the Association of British Philatelic Societies at the annual general meeting held on 24th September. I must say thank you to Graham Winters for all the hard work he put in over the four years he was Chair. Graham will remain part of the Management Committee, specifically focussing on the work with federations and how the ABPS can provide support. So what am I going to do as Chair? I think the hobby is at an interesting point in time. Many societies, because



of the pandemic, stopped face-to-face meetings, but with the start of the new philatelic season and the relaxations in Covid restrictions many have started meeting again face-to-face. I would like the ABPS to help reinvigorate the hobby by supporting all local societies, clubs and federations in their resumption of activities. Over the next few months, the ABPS will be launching several new initiatives to help the hobby to flourish in its "re-start".

One other objective I have is to raise the profile of the ABPS, making it clear to everyone both inside and outside the hobby what the ABPS does, why it exists, and achieving a situation where no one needs to ask "what does the ABPS ever do for me?" because we have made it crystal clear why we are here and what we do!

The ABPS AGM was held as part of the 2021 Congress in Harrogate in September. I think the event was much appreciated by all those who attended especially as Congress could not be held in 2020. Only two world wars have stopped it before! It was good to see so many friends after such a long gap.

The event had several elements to it as well as the ABPS AGM. There were a series of philatelic displays and talks, standing displays, the signing of the Roll of Distinguished Philatelists and the presentation of the Congress medal.

At the Congress banquet, on the Saturday evening, it was excellent to see Keith Burton, our editor of ABPS News, being recognised for all his excellent work by receiving a FEPA Certificate of Merit from Bill Hedley, President of FEPA.

Congress 2022 is going to be held in Birmingham – more news on this in my next *Chair's Update*. If you have never been to Congress do think about coming to Birmingham – four unadulterated days full of your hobby!

One thing I would like to stress is the importance of communication. Without good communication who knows what's going on or what the current issues are in the hobby that need addressing? This is why I really want to hear from you; from federations, societies or individuals. What are your thoughts about where the hobby is and its future? What should we be doing? Editorial

At last face-to-face meetings have started again and the reports and photographs have come in to prove it. It is good to know that most societies have survived but two have told us that they have stopped, and their former members are presumably looking for a new philatelic home. I am sure that you will all be willing to welcome



them. I hope that they will know to look on the ABPS and Federation websites to find their nearest or most convenient society.

Meetings are sometimes being forced to go to new premises because of post-Covid restrictions or changes of practice. This can cause its own problems.

Erene Grieve of Haverfordwest has contacted me as follows: **WANTED - Lightweight display boards.** Due to a change of premises for their meetings,
Haverfordwest Stamp and Postcard Club will no longer have a store room. This
means that their large wooden display boards will need to be replaced by
smaller, more portable ones that could be brought to the meetings by a member.
Would anyone be able to recommend a source for such boards? Please contact

Does one of the closing societies have some boards that could be of use?

Another matter has been raised by **Grace Davies** at the Harrogate Congress and later in an email by **John Gledhill**. Apparently some banks have contacted societies to say that they are no longer giving free banking to them. The two mentioned by John are HSBC and NatWest as follows: For example we've been quoted by two banks which we'll have to choose as at the moment we are not charged at all: (1) HSBC will charge £5 per month and 0.4% of all cheque and counter cash transactions (from November) and (2) NatWest do not have a monthly fee but charge £0.70 per cheque and counter cash transaction.

Some advice given was to make an appointment with the Bank Manager, stressing that they are penalising community services by doing this to philatelic societies. The letter has almost certainly come from some automaton in a Head Office. Don't go down without a fight. If it helps at all – I know at the moment that Virgin Money and Lloyds are still providing Harrogate PS with free banking. If you need to shop around be prepared to have a lot of hoops to jump through to set up a new account. DO NOT CLOSE the old account until you have set up a new one. With all the necessary money-laundering checks it can take time. Leave a small amount in the old account until everything is done. With multiple signatures needed it is not possible to use online banking (I believe) but perhaps you can set up to use BACS whenever possible. Any other suggestions?

Let's help each other. During Covid lockdowns and restriction many societies and individuals worked together; why not now? Don't forget to advertise your Zoom meetings - those stuck at home might be glad to join you from just about anywhere. And keep your own speaker list up-to-date! Keith Burton FRPSL

Society anniversaries

According to the date of foundation shown in the societies' information on our records, significant anniversaries include those shown below (though several societies have not let us known their foundation date, so there may be more).

Helvetia Philatelic Society of Great Britain – 75 Years Young.

The society for all collectors of Swiss stamps, covers and postal history, is celebrating its 75th Anniversary this year. **Edward H Spiro** invited a few fellow members of the Wimbledon Philatelic Society who were interested in Swiss

stamps, round to his house. They founded the embryonic "Helvetia Stamp Club" in 1946, later to evolve into the Helvetia Philatelic Society under Edward's enthusiastic leadership.

Following a public display of Swiss stamps at the Stagg & Russell Exhibition Gallery at Leicester Square, London, and the formation of a formal committee, the society flourished. Many eminent philatelists such as **Professor Landau**, **Dr K Strauss**, **Lawrence Moore MBE**, **Colonel H DeWatteville CB**, **R F Bulstrode OBE**, **Alma Lee** and many others were at one stage active members of the HPS. One of the first lady members, **Mrs Edith Rawnsley**, became a firm pillar of the society in her roles as secretary and newsletter editor. She wrote many articles about Swiss stamps and philately in all the British stamp magazines, always fostering the Helvetia Philatelic Society.

Today the society is as popular and as active as ever. The flagship publication,

the HPS Newsletter, has been published without interruption since the late 1940s and continues to offer the membership annually about 150 full-colour A4 pages of philatelic and society news, research articles on Swiss philately and postal history, questions and answers, and meetings reports. Colin Tobitt



...but did it really? What was the real reason? How could a Dealer pay a higher price than a Collector? It doesn't make sense, does it? Collectors are customers. Customers usually pay the highest price, unless... for a Collector, this was...

About The Author > Andrew found his Father's stamps at the age of 10. A year later at Senior School he immediately joined the School Stamp Club. He 'specialised'(!) in British, but soon was interested in Oueen Victoria which he could not afford. Plus the 3 Philatelic 'P's -Presentation Place and Price

▲ Understanding the problem... | always remember the car trade had their own little 'bible' - Glass's Guide. I've no idea, I've not even looked - in this internet-dominated world, it may even have disappeared. Well, there's an insider Stamp Trade publication for Stamp Dealers called "The Philatelic Exporter". There's nothing that special about it - and you won't learn much or find massively reduced prices by subscribing - BUT - it is a forum, a paper focal point, a last 'bastion' in this on-line transparent world that we inhabit... whereby dealers (and auctioneers) can try and communicate with each other. I publish my own articles there...

Recently I discussed the outcome of my 10 years' simple research, asking dealers and auctioneers 'what is your biggest problem?"

To a man, (why are we almost all men), they replied - "my biggest problem is stock, if I can get more of the right stock I can sell it eas-

Strange that, nobody ever asked me the same question back - because my answer would have been entirely different (and I don't treat it as a problem) - I seek to satisfy more collector clients than any other stamp

This is the reason why my company has such massive advertising. This is the reason why we spend up to 8% of turnover - up to £200,000 per annum in marketing costs. (Most dealers don't even sell £200K per annum).

Why is that? Because, as the world revolved the Stamp Market, imperceptibly Changed, and incrementally -Massively

So, although few will tell you this, it's clearly evident that the problem for most Sellers of Stamps today is no longer absent stock - but absent collectors in

In my most recent 20.000+ lot UPA 77th Auction we had 1,793 different bidders from 49 different countries, 95% of whom were Collectors. Some other well-advertised auctions only have 200 bidders (a high percentage of whom are dealers - so that, essentially they are Dealer-dominated auctions) - so that when you sell through them - you're paying up to 18% (including VAT) seller's commission and the buyer is paying up to 25% and more in Buyer's Premium, credit card fees, on-line bidding fee, delivery and insurance etc... AND all of that so that your stamps may be sold, wait for it - TO DEALERS (and some collectors), but Dealers, that naturally must make a profit to survive ...

Now, let's examine the cost implications - Example: Your stamp collection sells in public auction for £800. Upon a 25% buyer's premium, the dealer pays £1,000 and it could be more. obvious so that money may be taken, almost surreptitiously, in numerous different ways, (without us apparently noticing until we see the cheque in our pocket) - the transparent 'seller pays' has been deliberately 'obscured' - so much so that, amazingly, the latest 2017 European Auction Selling Legislation just introduced - now requires auctions that charge 'buyer's premiums' to warn the buyer in advance. Just imagine going into the petrol station, and being warned that the price you're paying to put fuel in you tank is not the real price, you have to pay a premium! Obviously, there would be an uproar...

Phow can you cut out the middleman and sell to Collectors instead? Well, I can think of two ways. 1). DIY - Do It Yourself selling on eBay. That may be fine for lower grade material - but, would you risk auctioning relatively unprotected rare material on eBay? We don't and we're professionals, so we should know what we're doing. Or 2). 

BBC and Broadcasting History Anniversaries 1922-1972

The BBC came into being in November 1922 as the British Broadcasting Company. A 10/- (50p) licence was introduced and on 14th November 1922 daily broadcasts began from the London station of the company. On 1st January 1927 the company was turned into a public corporation constituted under Royal Charter.

By 1972, after 50 years of broadcasting, the BBC was a very different institution from that at its inception - still imbued with the same ideals of public service but had grown to two colour television services, four radio networks, 20 local radio stations, a complex of Welsh language and regional broadcasting and an external broadcasting system in forty languages.

The first recorded suggestion of a stamp to mark the 50th anniversary of broadcasting in Britain came from George Campey, Head of Publicity at the BBC, writing to Tom Dawson, Director of Public Relations at GPO Headquarters, saying that the BBC and British broadcasting would be 50 years old on the 14th November 1972. Campey added that the BBC had issued a number of schemes to mark this historic date, and asked if a stamp could be considered. Dawson replied he would forward the suggestion to the appropriate department.

Arnold James, Principal of Barry College of Further Education, wrote on 9th April 1970 to the Philatelic Bureau with the suggestion of a stamp to mark the 75th Anniversary of the Marconi-Kemp wireless tests across the Bristol Channel in 1897. Arnold James was informed that the stamp programme for 1972 would not be chosen until summer 1971, but the suggestion would be added to the stamp programme.

The 1972 Stamp Programme

The Stamp Advisory Committee (SAC) met on the 22nd October 1970 to discuss the 1972 programme. The Post Office felt consideration should be given to the 50th Anniversary of the BBC, possibly linking it to the Marconi-Kemp wireless

tests. George Dawson, Director of Operations and Overseas, met with the committee on 11th December 1970; it was proposed to submit the following programme for 1972 to the Post Office Board:

- a. British Architecture: Old Inns
- b. British Explorers
- c. The Queen's Silver Wedding
- d. Christmas

Recommendations for a BBC Issue

The SAC meeting on 20th October 1971 was told by the chairman that the Post Office was going ahead with a stamp issue to mark the BBC anniversary and that it had decided to link the 75th Anniversary of the Marconi-Kemp wireless tests to this issue.

The design process was now underway as Stuart Rose, Post Office Design Advisor, had been asked to discuss the proposals with the Head of BBC TV design, and David Gentlemen had been commissioned to commence preliminary artwork.

David Gentlemen presented his preliminary drawings to the SAC on 25th November 1971.

The committee examined the designs and agreed the following subjects should be developed as finished artwork for essaying. Deciding three stamps would be for the BBC and one for the Marconi-Kemp anniversary.

BBC: Horn Speaker, Earphones (both in David Gentleman's preliminary drawings); Television camera

Marconi-Kemp: Morse key (also in the preliminary drawings)

Stamp Subjects: 3p Microphones

Design concept to suggest BBC sound transmission from the earliest days up to the present. Six microphones were shown from the start of Savoy Hill (bottom left) known as the 'meat safe' to contemporary models for studio and outside broadcasts, indicating the trend to smaller and lighter microphones.

5p Loudspeaker

'Listening in' the impact of wireless in the home, showing an early domestic loudspeaker, the AMPLION swan neck, dating from the 1920s, the precursor of the wireless receiver

7½p Television camera

During the preparation of designs, David Gentlemen saw an EMI colour camera (the latest at the time) in use at Lime Grove television centre and regional studios, suggesting this design as symbolising the present-day television services.

9p Marconi-Kemp Experiment

The design illustrated two items from the transmitting equipment, an early form of spark transmitter and an oscillator, used by Marconi in his 1897 Bristol Channel experiments in conjunction with the Post Office. David Gentlemen used photographs for reference.

A special commemorative handstamp sponsored by the Marconi Philatelic Society was issued at Chelmsford, as the town has an association with Marconi dating back to 1898 when the World's first wireless factory was set up in Hall Street (now flats). BBC Special Arrangements

Two exhibitions were mounted by the BBC from 1st November 1972 until the end of 1972 to commemorative 50 years of public broadcasting. A commemorative cover was produced by the Post Office who also arranged for special handstamps to be applied to items posted at these exhibitions. 32 600 special BBC presentation packs inscribed 1922-1972 were given out by the Chairman and Board of Governors, the Director-General and Board of Management of the BBC to every member of staff on 13th September 1972.

First Day Covers

Two pictorial handstamps were provided by the Post Office, each showing a radio mast transmitting

THE ABPS PHILATELIC CONGRESS OF GREAT BRITAIN 2021

The Philatelic Congress of Great Britain, organised by the Association of British Philatelic Societies (ABPS), is one of the highlights of the philatelic calendar attracting leading collectors from all over the world. This year, the 102nd Congress was held in Harrogate from 23rd to 26th September. The event has several elements to it; a series of philatelic displays and talks, standing displays, signing of the Roll of Distinguished Philatelists, the ABPS AGM and presentation of the Congress Medal. In addition, there is an informal programme of receptions and dinners which allows delegates to get to know each other and share their interests. This was much appreciated this year as Congress could not be held in 2020 due to Covid.

Harrogate itself had a lot to offer visitors with the world-famous Betty's Tea Rooms, a walking tour of the town, The Royal Pump Rooms and a visit to the RHS Harlow Carr Gardens all being popular attractions not far from the venue.

Delegates were welcomed by Congress Chairman, **Keith Burton**, who introduced a presentation on *The Story of Flying from the Stray* by **Peter Rix**. Keith then showed a *Welcome to Harrogate in Postcards* which was followed by a presentation by the 2021 Congress medallists, **Barry Burns** and **Bernard Mabbett**, on *Preserving the philatelic archive of St. Helena*. After a reception and dinner there was a fun competition of "Four sheets to tell a story". **Derek Williams** from Preston was the popular choice with an amusing story featuring mathematics.

The Mayor of Harrogate, Councillor Trevor Chapman, performed the official opening on Friday morning, supported by his lady. They viewed the standing display by Gerald Marriner on the German Occupation of the Channel Islands and remained to listen to the Kay Goodman lecture by Richard Smith from Leeds PS who asked the question Do Philatelic Societies have a future? After the challenges and learning points during the pandemic, Richard brought home the importance of using modern technology when giving presentations.

The AGM of the ABPS included the introduction of the new Chairman, **Steven Harrison**, and completed the formal business of our national federation. **Barry Burns** and **Bernard Mabbett** received

the Congress Medal for their efforts in preserving the St. Helena postal archive.

The Signing of the Roll of Distinguished Philatelists recognises the highest contributions in philately from around the world. 2021 was 100 years since the first signing of the Roll in Harrogate which is headed by King George V. No signing took place in 2020, so **James Grimwood-Taylor** from the UK belatedly signed the Roll this year. Regrettably, many were not able to travel to the UK because of travel restrictions but **Seija-Ritta Laasko** (Finland), **Henrik Mouritsen** (Denmark) and **Jose Ramon Moreno** (Spain) all signed the Roll. Others will be carried forward to the next event.

After a relaxed dinner in the hotel restaurant, retiring ABPS Chairman, **Graham Winters**, entertained us with a display of *Yorkshire*, *my adopted county*.

Saturday opened with a presentation by winner of the 2020 Congress Medal, **Nigel Gooch**, with a stunning display on *Persia 1896 -1907 – Reign of Muzaffer -ed-Din Shah Qajar*. **Chris King** followed with the *Fathers of Philately* which told the story of some of the early signatories to the Roll of Distinguished Philatelists and internationally renowned collectors. The standing display by **Jon Aitchison** was *The Local Posts of the Isle of Man*.

One of the great innovations of recent years has been presentations by new RDPs. Once again, they did not disappoint with some stunning collections on show and entertaining stories:

Seija Riita Laakso From East India Company to P&O - carrying mail between Britain and East India

Jose Ramon Moreno The Great, Funny and Unrepeatable Father of Philately – Doctor Thebussem

Henrik Mouritsen Why I became and remained a philatelist James Grimwood Taylor The Expected and Unexpected – from my collections

A small dealer bourse in the hotel provided an opportunity to acquire some items or the afternoon gave the opportunity to explore Harrogate and the local area. An evening reception preceded the formal Congress Banquet which was also attended by the Mayor and Mayoress of Harrogate.

Sunday again saw some amazing displays, with **Frank Walton** showing *GB Postal History 1952-1971* and **Simon Richards** *Dominica*. Static displays were shown by the recipients of the ABPS Award of Merit - **Michael Dobbs**, **Eddie Mays**, **Richard Smith** and **Des Kent** - and by local society members.

The closing ceremony included the presentation to **Frank Walton** of the Congress Certificate for the best display.

These events take a lot of organisation and ABPS greatly appreciated the support of members of the Harrogate Philatelic Society, local companies, and sponsors, which included Cavendish Philatelic Auctions, Jon Aitchison and Alan Holyoake.

The 2021 Congress was less well attended than usual but this was not surprising given the ongoing international travel restrictions and concerns over Covid. Let us hope that Congress in 2022, planned for Birmingham, will be a


For the second year we held our AGM using Zoom. Two members from Thailand participated. With business quickly concluded and the committee remaining we

PIONEER AVIATION IN THE CHANNEL ISLANDS

in two volumes, by Roger E. Harris
The author has been a member of CISS for over 50 years. The society published his first Channel Islands history work in 1979 when he wrote *Islanders Deported*, the illustrated history of Islanders deported and interned in Germany during the German

occupation and their postal services back to the Channel Islands. *Pioneer Aviation In The Channel Islands* is the first comprehensive history of aviation in the Channel Islands, spanning from the dawn of aviation with balloon flight, through two World Wars to the nationalisation of the commercial air industry in 1947 and the last pioneer flight to the Islands in 1952.

The author's intention has been to record every known flight to, or within, the Islands, with descriptions of the aircraft flown and each pilot and passenger identified. There are biographies of the more famous or infamous characters involved including famous pilots and lady aviators, honoured war heroes, brave experimenters, entrepreneurs and even a treacherous aristocratic spy saved from prosecution by Sir Winston Churchill. One of the most interesting people

recorded is a Jersey resident who was Britain's richest and possibly most beautiful and eccentric woman who started life as a show girl but went on to be one of the first five women to be awarded the title of Dame of the British Empire. Her philanthropic financing of the development of the Spitfire helped save the RAF in the Battle of Britain.

Over eleven hundred original photographs and images from the author's own lifetime collections illustrate the two volumes of the book. These include postcards, photographs, posters, timetables, tickets, ephemera and airmail letters; many of which are very rare or even unique. As a novel addition and an aid and encouragement to collectors, the author has awarded each of these illustrations a "Collector's Value" at 2020 market prices.

For the aviation historian and interested layman, Pioneer Aviation In The Channel Islands is a fully illustrated and comprehensive history of the development of flight in the Islands and for the collectors of aviation ephemera or airmail first flight covers, the book is a complete record and catalogue of every item available to the interested collector and researcher. "The Inks of De La Rue & Co. and their introduction of synthetic and aniline ingredients c.1850–1910"

by Peter Young FRPSL - Reviewed by Charles Oppenheim

It is rare for a book to appear that will see changes in how collectable material is studied and recorded, catalogues re-write the names of colours, and will extend the knowledge of printing methods, processes and ingredients in use 150 years ago.

While the book focuses on postage and revenue stamps from Britain and around the world, from Antigua to Zanzibar, it also deals with other security printed material of the period, such as Mexican bank notes, Italian bonds, and Colonial Telegraph materials.

Starting with the history of inks and ink makers, it extends through ingredients, and included samples or trials, testing for light sensitivity and fading, fluorescence and 'bleeding', even use for postmarking, as well as their export. The second half of the book then records over 2500 recipes used by the firm. The study examines in depth a number of documents and correspondence not previously discussed elsewhere to consider the firm's intaglio (recess-printing) inks that accounted for much of its extensive bank notes and other security printing, its letterpress (surface-printing) inks used to produce so many postage and revenue stamps over the period, its ordinary inks for lithography for its substantial jobbing work, and its embossing inks for the stamps of the Gambia and those of Somerset House.

Using previously unexamined documents, the book not only reveals the day-to-day 'makings' and quantities of the ingredients and the maker's comments, but includes processes not discussed previously. Finally, a gazetteer, an index of the ingredients and a comprehensive general index are provided. Inks have been the least studied aspect of printing history which makes this new book a notable work of reference.

The author published his first philatelic study in the *GB Journal* of the Great Britain Philatelic Society in 1968. He has been the 'Victorian Surface Printed Consultant' for that society for fifty years.


