

CHAIR'S UPDATE

What is 2023 going to be like for our hobby? I would suggest that the year could be quite an interesting one!

At the end of January, the Royal Mail "Stamp Swap Out Scheme" ends and definitives without the "barcode" will not be valid – although it's interesting to read on the Royal Mail website: "Mail posted with non-barcoded Definitive stamps after 31st January 2023, will for the first 6 months be delivered as normal, no surcharge will be raised. After this 6-month grace period, an item with a non-barcoded



stamp would be treated as if there is insufficient postage. Any item that has insufficient postage is subject to a surcharge. Surcharge fees can be found on our website." So perhaps it's going to be early August before we see what Royal Mail really does with covers that bear non-barcoded stamps.

All through the year, of course, we will see new issues coming out from Royal Mail. With subjects promised such as *Blackadder, Warhammer, Terry Pratchett's Discworld* and *Dame Shirley Bassey,* it will be interesting how sales go for Royal Mail! It is very probable that in 2023 we will see new stamps issued for King Charles III. Gone is the term "*QEII*", now we will have "*KCIII*". I have seen it suggested that the start of a new King's issues would be a good starting point for new collectors to join the hobby. I'd be interested to hear what other philatelists think.

Then we have the ongoing situation during 2023 of local philatelic societies working hard to survive. In the philatelic press recently, I saw a letter that suggested many local societies that managed to survive the two years of coronavirus lockdown are still struggling due to an almost fatalistic attitude. The letter also suggested that they have failed to grasp that unless they adopt and change, they will not have a future. I would ask what can be done to make sure that our local philatelic societies do survive? There must be some great ideas out there – please do let me know what ideas you have!

Let me end by looking forward to 2025. EuroPhilEx, a European stamp exhibition, will be taking place in this country from 8th to 11th May. The venue will be in Birmingham at the National Exhibition Centre. Most competitive classes will be available to enter in competition. There will be a large number of dealers' booths and an auction will also be part of the events taking place. Note the

dates – more information will be published by the organising committee soon. I always like to stress the importance of communication. Without good communication who knows what's going on or what the current issues are in philately that need addressing? In my thoughts above I've asked several times for your ideas, comments and thoughts. Please do let me know what you think. Editorial

Four times a year for the last ten years or so I have worried in advance about what I can say in my editorial. Often after a few reports have arrived I see a trend or a specific piece of information which gives me an inspiration. This time is no different. The report from the Caledonian Society shows how one society has been reaching out and making contact with people in their



community. Will it bring in members? Who knows? However there is always more of a chance that an individual will return to philately or start stamp collecting if the idea has been planted than if no-one has made an effort to reawaken or start the interest.

Very often reports include statements that numbers attending meetings have fallen even though membership has been maintained. Wringing hands and bemoaning the fall without being active in working out how to change the situation is unlikely to reverse the position. We need to do something ourselves. Some have changed to day-time meetings, taking the risk that those who are still working will be excluded. Some offer lifts to take people to the meetings. Some look at their meetings and what their society offers.

If your society has gone through this process and found a large event to advertise or small change in your processes which has led to greater attendance or new members please share it with us. I can include the ideas in future issues. If you have tried something that was a total failure, possibly expensive, let us know that too. It is an example of trying which others might be able to learn from - they could avoid getting into a similar position, or make an adjustment that increases the chance of success.

If you plan something that could incur some costs which would strain your society's finance, remember that affiliated societies are entitled to ask ABPS for a small grant. We cannot cover thousands of pounds but sums of a few hundred to support your advertising, event or outreach are perfectly possible. You can find more details on the ABPS website (<code>abps.org.uk</code>) on the Societies tab - at the bottom is the Small Grants subsection or you can contact the treasurer on <code>treasurer@abps.org.uk</code>

As I write this I am also preparing for the January York Fair - by the time that you read this it will be over. However there are other similar events around the country in the months to come. Some are small regular fairs, others are major regional events. You will find references to some of these in the pages of this issue, including the Diary. They are a great chance to meet friends and to support philately in your region. I have found some wonderful material, very competitively priced (perhaps the dealer didn't know the meanings of some of the marks on a cover or the significance of a particular stamp.) I have one item awaiting certification at the moment - travelling hopefully again. If I am right - great joy. If not - I didn't spend much on it. Either way the dealer made a sale. Hope for me please.

Driving on the right side of the road?

Background

In Sweden there were various arguments for the change to driving on the right-hand side of the road:

Neighbouring countries, Norway and Finland, with which Sweden shares land borders. They have five million vehicles crossing annually.

Approximately 90% of Swedes drove left-hand drive vehicles. This led to many

head-on collisions when passing on narrow two-line highways. However, the proposal was not popular. In the 1955 referendum, 83% voted to keep driving on the left. Nevertheless the Swedish Parliament approved Prime Minister Tage Erlander's proposal on 10th May 1963 of right-hand traffic beginning in 1967, as the number of vehicles tripled from 500 000 to 1.5 million and was expected to reach 5.8 million by 1975. The Statens Hogertraffikkomission (HTK - the state right-hand drive commission) was established to oversee the change.

Preparing the country for the change was a costly and complicated endeavour. Traffic lights had to be reversed, road signs changed, intersections redesigned, lines on the road repainted, buses modified and bus stops moved. A massive PR campaign was conducted to reconcile the public to the change and educate how it would be implemented. Dagen H even got its own logo, which appeared on everything from milk cartons to underwear, and a song contest! The winning tune by the Telestars was "Hall dag till hager Svensson" - Keep to the right Svensson.

As part of the PR campaign, Sweden issued a set of two stamps on 2nd September 1967, designed by P.

Olofsson, "Keep to the right" issued in commemorative booklets and coils, perforated 12.5 x imperforate. Booklets contained panes of 10, values 35 öre, 45 öre. The stamps were printed on fluorescent paper in connection with postal mechanisation experiments. Two types were used, one reacting yellow and the other reacting white under UV light, the experiment ended on 19th June 1976, when non-fluorescent paper was reintroduced.

The last issue was the Royal Wedding, issued in commemorative booklets, imperforate x 12.5.


General Notes: Printer from 1920 - all Swedish stamps were printed by the Stamp Printing Office of the Royal Swedish Postal Administration on rotary machines from recess plates, unless otherwise stated.

Results

On the day of the change only 157 minor accidents were reported, of which 32 involved personal injuries with only a low number being serious. These initial improvements did not last. The number of insurance claims returned to normal over the next weeks, and by 1969, the accident rates were back to levels seen before the change.

Although all road traffic in Sweden became right-hand, metro and railways did not switch to the new rules and continue to drive on the left.

About The Author ► Andrew found his Father's stamps at the age of 10. A year later at Senior School he immediately joined the School Stamp Club. He 'specialised'(I) in British, but soon was interested in Queen Victoria which he could not afford. The 2nd to last boy wearing short trousers in his school year, he religiously bought Post Office New Issues on Tuesdays with his pocket money. He soon found that he enjoyed swapping / trading stamps as much as collecting them. Aged 19, eschewing University he quickly found a philatelic career in London, leading to creating his own companies in stamps. Andrew has authored many internationally published Stamp 'Tips' articles, appearing on Local Radio and National TV promoting Philately with Alan Titchmarsh. Andrew's area of expertise is unusual - in so far as his grounding in collecting and wide philatelic knowledge has given him a deep understanding of Philately. He has studied Philately for the past 51 years, in combination with Commerce and Marketing Expertise, enabling him to create synergies in 'lifetime' interlinked Stamp Selling Systems, selling unit-priced stamps through to handling collections & Rarities up to £700,000 each. Today Andrew is fortunate to be co-owner with his Wife, of Universal Philatelic Auctions (aka UPA) - the Largest No Buyer's Premium Reducing-Estimate System Stamp Auction in the World, creating records selling stamps to 2.261 different bidders

from 54 different countries in his international auctions.
Andrew stopped collecting stamps aged 18 reasoning that his enjoyment of stamps would be in handling them and solling them... He loves working in stamps Three years later, attending my first public stamp auctions I wondered how some bidders seemed to buy everything, paying the highest price? ...but did it really? What was the real reason? How could a Dealer pay a higher price than a Collector? It doesn't make sense, does it? Collectors are customers. Customers usually pay the highest price, unless... for a Collector, this was...

Wrong Presentation Wrong Place X
therefore Wrong Price X

3 Fast-forward 48 years later to a British Empire collection, lot #1 in an International Stamp Auction – Estimated at £3,000, but we were the highest bidder at £21,000 – YES – some 7×higher. Including Buyer's Premium in the extraordinary sum of £4,788 we actually paid GBP£25,788= upon a £3,000 estimate... however, we broke it down into sets, singles, minicollections etc. We made a profit. Some might say it found its price. Others may say:

Wrong Estimate X Wrong Presentation X
Wrong StructureX Wrong Protection of Price X

– Lucky for the seller that 2 well-heeled bidders saw the potential value that day or it could have been given away... the seller could easily have lost out couldn't he? or she?

So, by un-peeling the layers of obfuscation, hopefully we can all agree:

The Secret is Simple –
it's ALL ABOUT : TIMING
Plus the 3 Philatelic 'P's –

Presentation Place V and Price V

4 Understanding the problem... always remember the car trade had their own little 'bible' - Glass's Guide. I've no idea, I've not even looked - in this internet-dominated world, it may even have disappeared. Well, there's an insider Stamp Trade publication for Stamp Dealers called "The Philatelic Exporter". There's nothing that special about it - and you won't learn much or find massively reduced prices by subscribing - BUT - it is a forum, a paper focal point, a last 'bastion' in this on-line transparent world that we inhabit... whereby dealers (and auctioneers) can try and communicate with each other. I publish my own articles there...

Recently I discussed the outcome of my 10 years' simple research, asking dealers and auctioneers 'what is your biggest problem?'

To a man, (why are we almost all men), they replied — "my biggest problem is stock, if I can get more of the right stock I can sell it easily"

Strange that, nobody ever asked me the same question back – because my answer would have been entirely different (and I don't treat it as a problem) – I seek to satisfy more collector clients than any other stamp auction

This is the reason why my company has such massive advertising. This is the reason why we spend up to 8% of turnover – up to £200,000 per annum in marketing costs. (Most dealers don't even sell £200K per annum).

5 Why is that? Because, as the world revolved the Stamp Market, imperceptibly Changed, and incrementally -Massively

So, although few will tell you this, it's clearly evident that the problem for most Sellers of Stamps today is no longer absent stock – but absent collectors in

the place they choose to sell their stamps in. Simply put, other Dealers, Auctions, Stamp Fairs have not invested in marketing to have a strong Customer-core. To be fair, this is not true of all - but it is true of most - so that our former competitor 'Apex' had 800 bidders in a recent auction. In my most recent 20,000+ lot UPA 77th Auction we had 1,793 different bidders from 49 different countries, 95% of whom were Collectors. Some other well-advertised auctions only have 200 bidders (a high percentage of whom are dealers - so that, essentially they are Dealer-dominated auctions) - so that when you sell through them - you're paying up to 18% (including VAT) seller's commission and the buyer is paying up to 25% and more in Buyer's Premium, credit card fees, on-line bidding fee, delivery and insurance etc... AND all of that so that your stamps may be sold, wait for it - TO DEALERS (and some collectors), but Dealers, that naturally must make a profit to survive...

Now, let's examine the cost implications - Example: Your stamp collection sells in public auction for £800. Upon a 25% buyer's premium, the dealer pays £1,000 and it could be more. He breaks it into £2,000+ selling price (much lower and he'll go out of business). The auction charges you a seller's commission of up to 18% (VAT included) upon the £800 sale price. This is GBP£144. Therefore you receive approaching £656 - which is approximately 33% of the dealer's £2,000+/- retail selling price - BUT... now that we have identified the problem...

> Isn't the Solution Staring us Right in The Face?

Why Pay an Auction to Sell to Dealers: Sell to Collectors instead? In our example with buyer's premium, sellers commission, lotting fees, extra credit card charges, VAT and even insurance - you're already being charged in different ways up to 40% of the selling price to sell, possibly or probably, to the wrong person.

Why not direct that 40% cost you're paying to sell to Collectors instead? Sounds good, so why hasn't this been done before?

obvious so that money may be taken, almost surreptitiously, in numerous different ways, (without us apparently noticing until we see the cheque in our pocket) - the transparent 'seller pays' has been deliberately 'obscured' - so much so that, amazingly, the latest 2017 European Auction Selling Legislation just introduced - now requires auctions that charge 'buyer's premiums' to warn the buyer in advance. Just imagine going into the petrol station, and being warned that the price you're paying to put fuel in you tank is not the real price, you have to pay a premium! Obviously, there would be an uproar...

9 How can you cut out the middleman and sell Collectors instead? Well, I can think of two ways. 1). DIY - Do It Yourself selling on eBay. That may be fine for lower grade material - but, would you risk auctioning relatively unprotected rare material on eBay ? We don't and we're professionals, so we should know what we're doing. Or 2). Cut out the extra middle-man. Use my company UPA, which reaches collectors instead. Here's how it works: Continuing from our previous Example:

The auction sold your stamps to a dealer for £1,000 - but You received circa £656

UPA sells them to collectors for you for up to £2,000 – even after 40% commission you receive up to £1,200. Up to £544 more. Now that's amazing, isn't it?

Sounds Good Andrew, but Can You 'Deliver'? Obviously, nothing is as simple as that, and as we auction stamps to collectors some collections may 'break' to the example £2,000+/- but the stamps may be sold for more or less - especially as we reserve all lots at 20% below, (Estimate £2,000 = £1,600 reserve) and not everything sells first or even 2nd time so prices may come down... Caledonian PS (Glasgow) Outreach

The Caledonian Philatelic Society has had a relationship with Glasgow Life / Museums for a number of years by attending events organised for families held in the Kelvin Hall. This hall hosts sporting and cultural events in the West of Glasgow run by Glasgow Life which is affiliated to the local museums. A Family Event was held in November 2022 and had as its theme "Mary Queen of Scots". Glasgow Life had organised sporting activities designed for children, one of which was a form of indoor bowls: Mary Queen of Scots was a keen curler and bowler.

The Caledonian PS provided stamp displays by two members: **Elizabeth Nairn** and **Sandy Kerr** on "Famous Scottish Women in New Zealand" and "St Andrew, the Saltire and the Use of the Saltire in the UK flag" respectively.

We also created a template showing Mary Queen of Scots with her pet dog on her lap asking children to stick a stamp with a dog on it in a space on her lap and also to fill a panel with other animal stamps as Mary was a great lover of animals. Another stamp activity involved the children completing three "stamp snakes" started during previous family days.

The Family Event was well attended with over 500 people attending during 4 hours. The Caledonian PS children's activities were by far the most popular with over 100 children completing Mary Queen of Scots "stamp pictures".

The Caledonian PS has now started face-to-face meetings after the restrictions during "lockdown". During lockdown we held Zoom meetings which were reasonably popular. We are now experimenting with a mix of face-to-face meetings (the majority), Zoom meetings and as a new venture, joint afternoon meetings with the Glasgow Philatelic Society. We will survey members later in the 2022/23 season to ask members to rate the different forms of meeting and plan our next season appropriately. *Stewart Gardiner*



But it does happen!

Many years ago a dealer in SA sold me an Austrian Levant 1871 2 soldi with what he said was a forged Alexandria postmark - beautiful upright clear cancel - too good to be true beautiful. I put it in my reference collection of forged Levant postmarks which are quite common unfortunately. Years later I showed these to Dr Ferchenbauer in Vienna (THE best examiner there is) and he immediately spotted it and said it was in fact genuine. He took it away and later provided me with a full certificate of authenticity - also with the comment "if ever you want to sell it give me first refusal". I sold it recently for over EUR 1000. Not bad for a R2 buy which had lain in my album for more than 40 years!

How Much?

This is the typical "Yorkshire" response when I say how much money I have made from stamps, and tax free as well.

How did this happen? It all started when on my way to catch a bus home I noticed a part set of stamps of Malay Straits portraying a tiger which I was keen to purchase. Unfortunately I did not have sufficient money to buy them. In those days there was no such thing as "The Hole in the Wall" banking system, therefore I caught a bus home, grabbed some money and caught a bus back into town. On approaching the shop I noticed that the set was no longer there. On enquiring of the shopkeeper I learnt that he had just sold them.

I left the shop feeling very frustrated and stopped to light a cigarette, and that moment realised that the reason that I did not have the funds to buy the set originally was because I had just previously bought a packet of twenty.

Immediately I grabbed the remaining cigarettes in the packet, screwed them up and threw them into a waste container. This was the last time that I had a "smoke" – thanks to my stamps and a certain amount of willpower.

If you reckon 20 cigarettes a day (more at the weekends) at present day prices of £9 to £14 the total over 45 years is between £150 000 and £230 000 – and health-wise I must be better too. Not that I have that much in my pocket, but I do now have that set of Malay tiger stamps.


Peter High in action

Malaya Study Group

The Zoom display on 22nd October from **Michael Waugh** on *Early Malayan* Philately commenced with a letter from the botanist Dr William Jack, 1818, from Bencoolen to Aberdeen. It then passed through correspondence in the prestamp era, postal history using India stamps in the Straits Settlements, the Provisional issue of 1867, and the definitive issue from 1867. This was followed by examples of surcharges and finished with Bangkok Bs with watermark Crown CC. The next meeting on 19th November was Survey Department Essays. Andrew Norris opened with Negri Sembilan but also including new aspects of Pahang and Perak. Susan McEwen followed with a detailed study of the mosque and Sultan Suleiman essays of the Selangor 1935 issue. Peter Cockburn displayed a range of revenue stamps from Sarawak, from 1875 featuring Rajah Charles Brooke, then from 1918 showing Charles Vyner Brooke and later some plate proofs of 1900 printed by De La Rue in small format. Our Christmas Celebration on 10th December was members` displays N to P. Michael Waugh began with Mail from Netherlands Indies through Malaya, from 1845 from British firms in Batavia through censorship in WWI to similar in WWII. Peter Cockburn produced a powerful Study of Perfins, and a registered cover from North Borneo with 74 2c brown applied. Martin Roper showed a study of Early Negri Sembilan. Susan McEwen covered Penang to 1936 Imperial

Airways to Hong Kong. Andrew Norris finished with Stamp Booklets of Negri Sembilan, Pahang, Perak and Sembilan after 1935. Michael Waugh

Royal Philatelic Society, London

The centenary of the discovery of the tomb of Tutankhamun by Howard Carter on 4th November 1922 was marked by displays from members of the Egypt Study Circle on 17th November. The displays aptly began with the 3p stamp issued by the British Post Office in 1972 on the 50th anniversary of the discovery, but included Salt Tax and 'No Value' stamps; Officially Resealed Mail; the Advice of Receipt Service; the Palace Post of King Farouk; the store in Port Said – operated by Simon Arzt – that catered for tourists with its own post office; the story of the ships trapped in the Great Bitter Lake during the Suez Canal closure in 1967. With no fewer than 62 one-frame displays to view, members had a rare

treat when they were entertained by the Great Britain Philatelic Society on 1st December. Understandably, it proved to be an extremely popular event, with over 150 attending. In early November lan Kelly of Witham was our guest speaker. His presentation's first part displayed numerous examples of Postage Rates from 1858 to 1946 in Germany on a variety of envelopes and postcards. Particular emphasis was placed on the hyper-inflation period affecting Germany from mid-1923 to the end of that year when the currency was stabilised by reverting from the Mark to the Pfennig. The most striking example was an envelope sent to the Swiss Bank in London on 7th November 1923 bearing stamps to the value of 5 billion Marks. Ian continued with a display covering Germany from the 1930s to 1946. This included Cash on Delivery, propaganda, Olympic Games and Zeppelin mail, as well as commercial mail. For our final meeting of the calendar year **Pat Adams** gave a display on *Iceland*. This began with a brief history of the country and then a wide variety of stamps from the late 19th century of typical Scandinavian design, followed by 1902 issues containing the King's portrait and then numerous stamps produced covering many topics including sport, personalities, scenery and buildings. For the second part Pat displayed stamps commencing in 1963, including commemorative issues, with one covering the 1000th anniversary of the settlement of Iceland. Finally she displayed Viking history from several nations including a first day cover of 1991 commemorating the 1000th anniversary of the Battle of Maldon. David Everard

Dennis Noe gave a great display about Great Britain Revenues. Impressed duty, or revenue, stamps were introduced in the 1694 Stamps Act. Adhesive stamps appeared in the 1740s, but it seems that none have survived. The Window Tax in 1696 is widely known but there were many others – including taxes on hats and gloves, on cheques, properties and land. From around the 17th century about 10 000 different types of impressed duty small tin impressions exist. These impressions were inserted into coloured paper and were embossed. Later there were albino. pink, green and vermilion stamps. The collection was fascinating and included two large vellum examples. Both had royal cyphers on them. One was from

Queen Anne's reign and the other from King George III's. Dennis's knowledge demonstrated the changes in embossing and design through many decades.

Samples of drawings, proofs, and many more were shown. His collection is a highly remarkable collection of British revenue history. *Martha Brown*

Croydon

President Pauline MacBroom opened the meeting, which was attended by eleven members, and invited Roger Morrell to present his display of Bulgaria. The Bulgars reputedly came from across the Danube in the Middle Ages and merged with the Slavonic population, spreading almost to the Adriatic Sea. Part of the Austro-Hungarian Empire in the 1700s, then part of the Ottoman Empire until the 1870s, then independence was eventually achieved. The resulting complications included its postal system. From the 1870s we saw Turkish stamps for local post offices followed by the first issue of Bulgarian stamps printed in Russia in 1879. Postal stationery was extensively represented. The Balkan Wars, WWI and

WWII were well covered right through until 1990 when communism collapsed. In December Marcus Sherwood-Jenkins' display was entitled *The East*. There was a mixture of the postal history of Ukraine from 1914, the postal history of St Petersburg and the stamps of the USSR. The display gave a brief summary of the history of Ukraine from the 19th century to the present day. From 1919 Ukraine used the stamps of the Soviet Union until the end of 1991, apart from during WWII when occupied by Germany. The display showed overprints of Russian and German stamps. There were examples of postal stationery, Russian prison mail, War correspondence envelopes and Russian censor covers. Ukrainian postage stamps have commemorated the defence of Ukraine by its armed forces and people and creating propaganda directed against aggressors.

Dawlish

Our Zoom meeting in September had a quick change from the booked speaker to a stand-in speaker. We saw some rare material from *Cyprus* that had lots of flaws and errors not included in Gibbons Specialist Catalogue. This included one of only five known stamps from a sheet that had been printed with an inverse watermark, an interesting display produced at very short notice. The meeting in October was Auction Night with some interesting sales and purchases by members and visitors. Our meeting in November was a series of displays on *Telling Stories* using philatelic material. The first presentation was on the *American Apollo Programme* to put a man on the moon. Karlsbad in Czechoslovakia was Lindy Bosworth's theme with a lovely Moza biscuits advertisement cover and postcards of the Karlovsy Varg spa baths. John Shaw showed Chile 1878-1920 with archival specimen strips with "00000" sheet numbers and **Geoff Hanney**'s contribution was *Military Covers from the post-*1919 Ottoman Area. Phil Clarke moved forward to recent days with issues from Kosovo under UN authority and president Michael Dobbs covered Cachets for post-WWII Allied censorship in the Netherlands. 

A New Book

The Channel Islands Specialists' Society has published a new 93-page book, *Delivered by the Hotel's Care*, written by member Roger E Harris.

What began as a simple catalogue of the various cachets used by hotels in the Channel Islands on postcards at the dawn of the 20th century developed into serious research with very interesting results. It transpired only four hotels in Jersey used the cachets and they were only found on mail addressed to France.

In the latter part of the 19th Century, four French hotels in Jersey offered a postal service "by the Hotel's care", whereby letters posted in the hotel mailbox would be taken by hotel staff and posted in the *Boîte Mobile* of the mail boats for France or taken to the head sorting office in Jersey for sending on the next mailboat to France. The envelopes were required to be hotel stationery, acting both as adverts and alerting the Post Office that they should be sent direct to France.

When the picture postcard became popular at the turn of the century, the hotels extended their service to postcards posted in the hotel mailbox but – as they were not identifiable hotel stationery – they devised their own cachets that they applied to the postcards, after posting in the hotel mailbox, to identify them as French hotel postcards.

This recognition by a State Postal Service of private stationery and private cachets as instructional marks for the post office sorters is possibly unique in world postal history.

Roger's research compiled in *Delivered by the Hotel's Care* illustrates all the different cachets as well as hotel stationery, gives a short history of the hotels and describes the other cachets that have been recorded.



REVIEW – US ZEPPELIN AND AIRSHIP MAIL FLIGHTS, by Cheryl R. Ganz



Published by the author in 2021, 279 pages, 8 ½ inch format, hard cover. Available from: classic.stamps.org/Publications for \$80.00. 10% discount to American Philatelic Society members, plus \$5.08 media rate postage within the USA and \$37.60 Global Priority mail outside the USA.

This book is all about US Zeppelin and airship mail flights and Cheryl is the perfect person to write it. She has collected, exhibited, researched, lectured and written about airships for many years. Each chapter covers a different airship, starting with the "Shenandoah", and continuing on through the ZR-2, ZR-3, ZRS-4

"Akron", and ZRS-5 "Macon". There is background information on each airship with lots of historic photos of the airships and the people connected with them. Then all types of known covers are shown in colour, followed by a flight log of all the flights by that airship. There is also a special event cover list for the "Akron". The final chapters cover Navy airship bases and squadrons, Army airships, show covers from those bases, and finally a section on private and commercial airships, showing all known souvenir covers carried by them, also in colour.

There is an extensive list of references and a comprehensive index.

The book is well done and will be essential for the library of collectors of airship and Zeppelin covers.


