A grave insult

Historians plead for help to restore old memorial

Military historians have condemned the "deplorable" state of a memorial honouring Paisley men who were killed in the First World

The inscribed shrine at Hawkhead Cemetery, which commemorates workers of the former Doulton & Co. factory, has fallen into such a state of disrepair that HALF the names of soldiers

Two giant ceramic tiles have fallen off the plaque, leaving only 11 men identified for paying the ultimate sacrifice, while a host of their fallen comrades go unremembered.

Now history buffs have launched a battle to save the crumbling shrine and are

urging people to help restore the commemorative artefact, as well as replacing the missing soldiers'

David McNay, chairman of the Scottish Military Research Group, said: "I think this needs to be highlighted, as this condition is frankly deplorable.
"The First World War memorial

in Hawkhead Cemetery, which has been neglected for some time,

is in danger of being lost.

"It is in a poor state and half of the names have disappeared

"If nothing is done, the condition of the memorial will deteriorate and there will be nothing left to commemorate the men of the former Doulton & Co. Factory who died in the war.

We would be willing to work in partnership with any interested parties in Renfrewshire who would care to intervene to safeguard this memorial.
"While we are sadly not in a

position to act alone with regard to restoration or possible relocation, we feel we cannot stand by without bringing this to your attention and offering to help in any way we possibly can.

"We would like to hope the

"We would like to hope the names which are now missing can be identified – possibly from old photographs, old newspaper articles or from local people who know of the memorial."

The memorial includes the inscription: 'In memory and honour of the men from these works who fell in the Great War.

works who fell in the Great War 1914-1919.'

The company which originally erected the memorial, Doulton & Co. no longer exists. It went into administration in 2009 and was bought out in 2011 by Asian-based parent company Wedgewood Waterford Royal Doulton.

Mr McNay said: "It is our hope that the people of Paisley can identify the missing names and rescue the Doulton & Comemorial

from further damage."

Last night, bosses at Renfrewshire Council said they are willing to help restore the memorial.

A spokesperson added: "The community of Renfrewshire has a proud military tradition and the council has played its part in fully supporting that – particularly with regard to commemorating those who have given their lives

on active service.
"We are arranging a service of rededication at Renfrew War Memorial on June 1 and, last year, we erected a plaque to commemorate military service personnel who lost their lives in post WWII conflicts.


"The council is certainly

willing to look at how we can support proposals to help a joint approach to restore the plaque or help identify the missing names on the plaque.

"We are already asking families to come forward if they wish the fallen of modern wars to be commemorated.

"Hopefully, we can help with similar support to remember the veterans of 1914-18 whose sacrifice was honoured on the plaque at Hawkhead."

within a hallway at the hotel, with the other woman found in a nearby bedroom.

Lastnight, police revealed that both Margaret and Nicola had suffered "significant" injuries.

They were taken to Inverciyde Royal Hospital for treatment but Margaret

for treatment but Margaret died yesterday afternoon.

Nicola remained in a critical condition in hospital last night.

Margaret's loved ones were too distraught to comment at the family home

in Corsebar Avenue

However, one shocked neighbour, who asked not to be named, told the Paisley Daily Express: "Margaret seemed like a really lovely lady. She was always friendly anď polite."

Officers have said both Margaret and Nicola were seen in the Paisley area on Thursday morning but it is unclear where they went before they were found at the hotel yesterday morning.

Detective Inspector David Wagstaff said: "Enquiries are at a very early stage and

we are piecing together the movements of Margaret and her daughter, who are both from Paisley.

"We know that both

women were in the Paisley area around 9am on Thursday. However, we are trying to establish their movements from that time until 7am on Friday, when they were found with serious injuries within the hotel.

"We are unable at this time to establish whether there are any suspicious circumstances

'We know that the women

had access to a red Suzuki Swift, which was later recovered from the car park of the hotel.

"I would appeal to anyone who saw these two women in their vehicle to come forward to police. As yet, we have been unable to speak to Margaret's daughter, due to her ill health. I need anyone who can help us put together their last movements to come forward."
