Church Services Explained (Part 5) Family Service by Ruth Orriss

What is it? - This is a 45–60-minute service suitable for everyone, not just Families, and it aims to be accessible by all ages. There will be some informal songs and percussion instruments to enable everyone to join in. We use modern speech in this service and all responses during the service are spoken. Music is provided by guitars or sometimes recorded tracks. The song words are generally on a screen, or you may be given a service booklet at the door. In between the songs there will be readings from the Bible or a story; interactive prayers and a talk of 10-15 minutes. There is no bread or wine. There will be a plate by the door if you want to make a donation. As the numbers are generally around 20 we sit in the pews, wherever we feel comfortable. Children may be invited to go up nearer the front to hear or see better and can be invited to help with a sketch or activity. There is normally tea, coffee and squash served at the end.

When is It? - This service is currently at 10am on every other 3rd Sunday of the month in Loxton Church.

Why do I go to this service? Ruth Orriss says, “ *I go to this service because families feel comfortable and it is fun for children. It is a chance to praise and worship God with my voice and a tambourine. The informal words and stories give variety, and a new way of hearing old lessons. The relaxed atmosphere allows for children who need to move. God likes to hear us laugh and loves children to be in his presence.* “

What do I need to do if I want to attend? - Just come into the church just before 10am and take your seat. If you would like someone to pick you up or meet you outside, please ring 01934 733281

GARDEN TWINNING - Smallholder families in Africa are finding it increasingly difficult to grow enough food to eat due to the climate crisis, covid, the cost of living and quite often conflict. You may have heard of Toilet Twinning, but now you can Twin your Garden and support a family in East Africa. This could be a private garden, allotment, church yard, school garden or any green space. A donation of £60 to Ripple Effect (formerly known as Send a Cow) will train a family in small scale sustainable organic farming for three years. This starts with a small kitchen garden, which will give them a varied and nutritious diet within months. They can sell their excess and afford to send their children to school. The final training ensures they can set up small businesses. It's a hand up, not a handout, and the family will build resilience to whatever life may throw at them.

They then pass on their knowledge, seeds, and plants to at least another 3 families, each of these will in turn pass it to another 3 families. This is the Ripple Effect and why our projects are so efficient and cost effective. A donation at the moment supports the project, Women of Migori in Kenya.

The gift pack you will receive includes a wooden plaque, vegetable growing guide by Charles Dowding our local No Dig expert, wildflower seeds, guides to create keyhole and bag gardens. *Philip Davies writes..*At its March meeting the Parish Council discussed the problem of the ash trees in the parish acre. The West Mendip Way goes through the middle of it on Loxton Hill and the sudden breaking off of large boughs caused by ash die back is a safety concern. The council is currently taking advice from tree surgeons and North Somerset Council on how to best deal with the issue.

We trooped up St. Congar's tower to the roof on a blustery cold day, taking in the 15th and 18th century bells in the belfry on the way up. There was an interesting and informative film charting the history of bell ringing and showing the interiors of some huge ringing chambers and belfries of 12 bells, including Liverpool Cathedral whose ringing chamber is reached via two lifts and a flight of steps! More tuition after lunch saw a few of the learners experience ringing both hand stroke and back stroke of ringing bells 'full circle' in the 17th century, uniquely English style. We all enjoyed a really happy day, meeting new people and trying new things.

Joint Choir Practice On Monday 20 March, the CROOK PEAK SPECIAL CHOIR was joined by the church choirs of Stone Allerton and Mark, to prepare for the 1573 Four Chalices service on 23 April at St. Congar's Badgworth.
