New Year's planting with little hands



Hollie Bailey writes ... A local Badgworth toddler has been helping to plant bulbs, distributing local wool for nest lining within the trees, and hanging wild bird feeders in St Congar's churchyard in Badgworth.

Graveyards can be a place of contemplation and reflection, and can be sanctuaries for birds and insects also. We have access to plenty of wool from the fields of local sheep and we have been gathering the wool since the summertime. The local wool has been from the trees, foliage and by feeding stations where wild birds gather and offer a cosy lining to their nests. We hung an artisan nester from the large fir tree to provide winter shelter and spring nesting. Max has been helping to plant daffodil bulbs in the graveyard ready for a colourful spring flowers and is helping to build a shelter for insects. Look out for our bright yellow daffodils in early springtime.

Dear Friends,

On New Year's Day I was very emotional as I, and a lovely neighbour, left my whole family - of 4 + my 6 grandchildren at 'Drop off' at the Airport. I and my brother and another great farming neighbour were left in charge - they of the cattle and me of the sheep. My flock number 400, mostly pregnant ewes - 6 weeks from lambing. Being impossible to count, I walked what seemed like miles of hedgerows every day - always making sure that Tilly (she is a pet ewe who is, we think is 13 and loves pain au chocolate - ask Alice!) and a large lamb who persistently gets tangled in brambles - were 'present and correct', and no one else was in difficulty.

In Chapter 15 v. 3-7 of St. Luke's gospel, Jesus tells the classic farmers' parable of the Lost Sheep. Anyone who looks after livestock can identify with this - the main contented flock are passed by and the search begins for the one missing - hedges, ditches - the relief of finding it fit and well is a joy. We are all so fortunate in our communities, that if we were missing, family, friends and neighbours wouldn't rest until we were found. I think about the many who are not so fortunate. My prayer for 2023 is for the Lord's protection of so many vulnerable folk in this country and throughout the world. I wish His blessing on you and everyone in our Villages, and I wish you a very happy year.

Church Services Explained (Part 4) Evening Prayer by Ruth Orriss

What is it? - This service is a 30-45-minute quiet evening service. There is no sharing of bread and wine. You will be given a service book as you arrive. There will be readings from the Bible; prayers and a talk of around 10 minutes. There is usually a collection plate at the door. No one will mind at all if you do not donate. In Christon and Compton Bishop we generally use modern words and all responses during the service are spoken. In Badgworth the service will generally use the older words of the Book of Common Prayer (1662) and there may be singing with organ accompaniment. We sit in the pews wherever we feel comfortable and there is not usually any refreshments served.

When is It? - This is currently at 6pm on every Sunday of the month, in either Badgworth, Compton Bishop or Christon church.

Why do I go to this service? Ruth Orriss says, *"I go to this service as it is a chance to end the day with a quiet reflective time. The sacred space calms me and gives me peace"*.

What do I need to do if I want to attend? - Just come into the church just before 6pm and take your seat. You will be given a service book as you enter. If you would like someone to pick you up or meet you outside, please ring 01934 733281.

The village hall committee are currently investigating whether a chair lift could be fitted to improve access to the hall. The committee has also consulted acoustic engineers to find out what measures could be taken to reduce the echoing noise levels when larger events take place.

The Frankie Howerd Community Hub has been well supported by residents from all our villages as well as by visitors from far afield who have been staying at The Webbington.

Kieran, the hub manager and chef, was delighted when an unannounced visit by the Environmental Health Officer led to The Hub being awarded the maximum 5 stars. At £12 Sunday roast dinners are a new addition to The hub menu with a range of starters and desserts available at £5

The National Lottery and National Grid have joined forces to provide a grant for a community bus. The bus will be able to serve all residents living in BS26 and should be operational in March. The trustees would like to hear from residents who live in BS26 on the services they would like the bus to provide. Suggestions so far have been to pick people from their homes and take them to and from The Hub for coffee/tea, cake, snacks and a chat. Home to the Ritz in Burnham for the afternoon matinee. Home to Burnham/Winscombe/Wells for shopping. From home to connect with the Falcon bus with a return pick up so residents can get to Bristol.

The Trust would also like to establish a group of volunteer drivers so that the bus can provide as many opportunities for residents as possible. Anyone who passed their driving test prior to 1997 should have the minibus D1 entitlement on their licence meaning they will be eligible to drive it until they reach the age of 70 when the entitlement is removed.

The Trust would also like to hear from anyone who would like to volunteer to help at the cafe at The Hub. From April it is hoped that The Hub can be open every day but without voluntary help this will not be possible.
