Charlie Taylor of BBC Radio Somerset came and judged them, awarding all entrants a Jubilee rosette. The winner of the competition was the skateboarder, Tony Hawke, designed and erected by the Ham family of Moorland Farm, Old Coach Road. Runners up were: Sophie Partridge with Scrap Baby, the Aclands with Where's Wally and the Murrays with Corvid 19. A big thank you also to Tom and Amanda Lang for their generosity in providing the Crook Peak Beacon and to them, their band of helpers and the National Trust for getting it up to the top! From our vantage points around the village, not only could we see Crook Peak lit up, but the beacon on Brent Knoll too. Quite a special moment. The beacon has now been donated to our parish. Finally, a fund has existed in the village for a number of years to help organise local events for the community. It was originally made up of profits from previous village events and intended to provide a fund to cover the hard costs of future events. Due to difficulties in arranging banking facilities and the like, a decision has been made to dissolve the fund and redistribute the money to the community. It will be split between village projects and organisations that support residents, not charities, so the benefits go back to the community from where they came.

We honestly did think that having left the Old Vicarage in Weare our garden opening days were over, but as we began to live with our new garden up on Notting Hill Way - the 'top road' - it felt like with a year's hard work it could become a National Garden Scheme entrant. Luckily they agreed! So we planned for the weekend of 11th and 12th June and prayed for good weather.

The first headache was safe car parking. it's a busy road so we were very pleased that our neighbours Roy and Wendy Durston and Alston Sutton farms gave us permission for visitors' parking in the adjacent field. Otherwise the plan would have faltered. The next part of the plan was to find someone willing to take on the teas and refreshments (cake, basically) and we were once more hugely lucky to have Sarah Pettifer volunteer to take it all on - just one week after all her hard work on the Jubilee weekend.

The weekend came and generally it was nicely sunny with a cooling breeze (but luckily not quite breezy enough to blow down the sail cover we'd erected over the courtyard cafe). We were so pleased that over 230 people came, and we raised just over £2,000. The various NGS nursing charities benefited from both the gate entry, and also of course the plant stall, beautifully prepared and managed by plantsman and designer Helen Johnson. All the proceeds from the café takings went to Weston Hospicecare, so huge thanks to Sarah and her crew. It was also lovely to see our chief car parking attendants, our son-in-law James, and his ex-teacher Trevor Morgan up from Weare, re-united in some really good traffic control.

The reactions and comments from visitors were just wonderful to hear - honestly, you never quite know how a first-time opening of a new garden is going to go, and it was very uplifting to hear it so well received, and to see groups of people obviously getting absorbed in the garden as they discovered its various sections. At this point I should perhaps thank my wife Trish - the 'head gardener' as she's referred to, who after a year during which she's had a triple heart bypass and a hip replacement still managed to bring it all together to deliver such a lovely and successful opening!

Church Services Explained - Part 1 Praise & Worship – by Ruth Orriss

What is It?

It is 45-60 minute service suitable for everyone, including children. There will be with informal songs and percussion instruments and sometimes flags are available for those who can't join in singing the words. We use modern speech in this service and all responses during the service are spoken. Music is provided by guitars or recorded backing tracks. The words of the song are generally on a projected screen. In between the songs there will be readings from the Bible or a story; interactive prayers and a talk of 10-15 minutes. There is no sharing of bread and wine. There will be a plate by the door should you want to make a donation.

We sit in the pews wherever we feel comfortable. Children are welcome and might be invited to go up nearer the front to hear or see better or maybe to help with a sketch or an activity. There is normally tea and coffee and squash served at the end.

When is it?

This service is currently at 10am on the 1st Sunday of the month in Weare Church.

Why go to this service?

Ruth Orriss says, it is a chance to praise and worship God with song. The informal words and stories give a new way of hearing old lessons. The informal atmosphere allows room for children and others who need to move more. God likes to hear us laugh and loves children to be in his presence.

What should I do if I want to attend?
