Frances Elizabeth Brill Eskridge-died Sunday, July 19, 2009.

Frances Elizabeth Brill Eskridge, age 93, of Marlinton, died Sunday, July 19, 2009, Pocahontas Memorial Hospital. Born near Buckeye July 27, 1915, she was the second daughter in a family of six whose parents were Ira D. and Lura Moore Brill.

She lived with her family over the Peoples' Store until she went to college in 1938 at Fairmont State. She took graduate courses in English at the University of Pennsylvania in 1938-1939. Frances taught music in an elementary school in Fairmont and also Greene Street Friends in Overlook, Pennsylvania.

In 1938 she and her sisters went to Philadelphia to study music. Frances took private piano lessons with Messrs. Conradi and Boyle, well known pianists at the time. Frances was an accomplished pianist both in classical music and by ear. She could play any piece after hearing the melody once. In Philadelphia she and her three sisters formed a quartet known as "The Brill Sisters Quartet" and sang in many churches and clubs in the Philadelphia area. The Quartet performed every Sunday on TV in a Vesper Hour sponsored by the University of Pennsylvania.

In 1954, Frances married Willard Eskridge, of Marlinton, and moved back to West Virginia and taught music at Hillsboro and was the band director at the high school. She was the choir director and organist at the Marlinton United Methodist Church. Frances loved poetry, not only to read, but to write. In 2001 she published her own poems title "A Poetic Portrait of My Family and Me."

She will be remembered as "The Music Lady" by all who knew her.

Frances was a retired music teacher and was a member of the Marlinton United Methodist Church.

In addition to her parents, her husband, Willard A. Eskridge, and daughter, Ann Eskridge, brother, James S. Brill, and sisters, Margaret B. Reinert, Sue B. Stettler and Lois B. McElwee preceded her in death. She is survived by a sister, Milly Brill, of Bryn Mawr, Pennsylvania; a grandson, Todd Cleek, of Portland, Oregon; and several nieces and nephews.

A visitation will be held Friday, July 24, from noon-1 p.m. at the church with Rev. Robert Mann officiating. Interment will be in Mountain View Cemetery.

Alfred Renick Gum, Jr., age 48, died April 26, 2007, in Pocahontas Memorial Hospital, Buckeye, from injuries received in an automobile accident which occurred near Marlinton.

He was born July 21, 1958, in Roxboro, North Carolina, to the late Alfred Renick Gum, Sr., and Mable Louise Kirkpatrick Gum. Alfred, Jr., graduated from Pocahontas County High School in 1976, attended Potomac State College of West Virginia University 1976-1978, and received the B.S. Degree in Agriculture & Physical Science from Morehead State University, Morehead, Kentucky, in 1981.

He is survived by his aunts, M. Maxine Kirkpatrick, Huntington, Ruth G. Ruckman, Angier, North Carolina, Mildred K. Sharp, Roanoke, Virginia; uncles Max L. Gum, Buckeye, M. Max Kirkpatrick, Kitts Hill, Ohio, and James F. Kirkpatrick, South Charleston.

He was a farmer and was employed by Hammond and Mitchell, Inc., Covington, Virginia, as a herdsman on the Falling Springs Salers and Angus Farms.

Interment was in the Oak Grove Cemetery, at Hillsboro.

Charles Wallace Gum-Died December 5, 2006

Born June 12, 1918, near Mill Point, son of the late Charles Emory and Rachel Ruckman Gum and a resident of Oak Hill, Charles Wallace Gum, 88, died on Tuesday, Dec. 5, 2006, at Plateau Medical Center in Oak Hill. On May 28, 1954, he married Melissa Gwinn Payne. She preceded him in death on May 9, 2000.

Mr. Gum was a 1936 graduate of Hillsboro High School, Hillsboro, and received his B.A. degree from Fairmont State College, magna cum laude 1947 and his M.A. from George Peabody College, Nashville, Tenn., in 1948. He taught three years in Pocahontas County, six years in Fayette County and served as principal in Warren County, Ohio, and 21 years in the Middletown City Schools in Butler County, Ohio, from which he retired in 1979.

Charles was drafted into the military service April 26, 1941. He served in the 201st Antitank Company at Fort Greeley, Kodiak, Alaska for 15 months after which he was transferred to the Antitank Company, 350th Infantry, 88th Division as a reconnaissance non-commissioned officer at Camp Gruber, Ok. The 88th Division was the first all draftee division placed in combat in the European Theatre. It arrived at the front lines March 4, 1944, north of Naples at Minturno, Italy and was the first allied division to enter Rome June 5, 1944 and continued to the Italian Alps at Bassano, Italy until May 2, 1945 at the surrender of the Italian and German Armies in Italy.

He received many service awards including Combat Infantryman Badge, Bronze Star Medal, Sharpshooter Badge, American Defense Medal with Foreign Service Bar (often designated the Pre-Pearl Harbor Service Medal), Asiatic-Pacific Service Medal with bronze campaign star, American Theater Service Medal, European-African-Middle East Service Medal with three campaign stars: 1. Rome-Arno, 2. Northern Apennines, 3. Po Valley, Good Conduct Medal and World War II Victory Medal. He was discharged Aug. 11, 1945, Fort George G. Meade, MD after 52 months of service of which 36 months were overseas duty.

Mr. Gum was a 60-year member of the American Legion and the Veterans of Foreign Wars.

He was a member of the Oak Hill United Methodist Church, where he assisted in writing the latest addition to the history of the church. He was a member of the Fayette County Historical Society and served as a tour guide at the George W. Eads Museum and "Contentment" the home of George W. Imboden, Lt. Col. CSA in Ansted. He also assisted in writing and editing the 1993 Fayette County History.

Survivors include sister, Madeline Ruth Gum Ruckman of Selma, N.C.; brother, Max L. Gum of Buckeye; five nieces and five nephews. A sister, Verna Kathleen Gum Robbins and a brother, Alfred Renick Gum Sr. preceded him in death.

Visitation will be held at Tyree Funeral Home, Oak Hill, on Friday, Dec. 8, from 6 to 8 p.m.

Service will be on Saturday, Dec. 9, at 1 p.m. at Tyree Funeral Home, Oak Hill, with Dr. John Sauvage officiating.
