Dear Mrs. Clay,

Thank you for your letter & the photo of your house, which reached me last week, having been to Mankoya first. I was so sorry to leave Gervas but did so in response to a wire offering me a job. Unfortunately, when I arrived at Livingstone I found that the position had been filled owing to the delay in reply to the wire.

As the wretched native who brought the telegram from Mongu took 7 days & the rogue who returned with the reply took 5 days (126 miles) I cannot say I was surprised greatly that that had happened.

I have had no luck at all & up to the present have not succeeded in obtaining employment although I have written to every possible employer including the Mines & Government. It is very disheartening. Gervas urges me to go back to him at Mankoya but I must hang on as long as possible as going back there would mean practically complete surrender of any hope of a job, unless recruiting was started again. You may be sure I want to go back, & miss Gervas very much.
