Chairpersons Comments

I hope that it is not too late to wish you all 'A very Happy New Year!'. The last few months since the last Newsletter have, in many different ways, been somewhat challenging for the Parish Council.

Residents had mixed views regarding the Banks group proposals for outline planning for up to 100 houses on Roundhill Road, but, now that the proposal has been given the 'go-ahead', we must surely get the best outcome and look forward to welcoming new residents to our community in the future. At the moment, there are plans that have been put forward (to be considered by the DBC later this month), for a wedding venue at the top end of Roundhill Road.

Due to work commitments, Councillor Simon Coultas stepped down from the Parish Council at the end of last year and, after interviews at the February PC meeting, I am pleased to tell you that Dot Oughton was co-opted to the council and we welcome her to the team.

There are some events planned. So, just to mention a couple, look out for details of the forthcoming Parish walks and activities for children at the Grange at Easter. I hope that you and your families will be able to support these events.

Sadly, there have been several instances of anti-social behaviour by young people in the village in the past few weeks. Should you encounter any such behaviour I would urge you to report it to the relevant authority, so that the message is out there that such behaviour will not be tolerated. There has also been an increase in the amount of graffiti spoiling our village. Since once it starts, it always seems to be added to, I hope that any that is found is either reported to the DBC or to the Parish Council so that arrangements can be made to get it removed quickly.

Dog fouling and speeding are still a problem in the village, but I am pleased to report that the zig-zag lines near the Primary school entrance have been extended to make the school crossing place much safer and that dropped curbs have been completed along Roundhill Road which allows wheelchair users to safely get to the Spar shop and the rest of the village.

The Council is in the process of writing a new Neighbourhood Plan and, if you feel that you could assist our team in the development of this, then please contact the Parish Clerk at the office at the Grange.

An advance notice-The Annual Assembly is scheduled to take place on Friday 19 th of May 2017 in the Fletcher Hall at the Grange and I hope that you will take this opportunity to find out what is, or has been, happening in our village.

Looking to the Future

Cllr David Wood and his team have embarked on the preparation of a Neighbourhood Plan which spans the period from 2017 to 2032.

The council has been following the Parish Plan which was developed in 2010, and has been updated each year. Tremendous progress has been made, climaxing in Hurworth being awarded Gold Status by the National Association of Local Councils, Hurworth becoming the first council in the north of England to achieve this.

However, times are changing, government policy is changing and Hurworth Parish is about to become larger.

The Vision

This initial objective of the Neighbourhood Plan is to determine what the residents want their village to look like in fifteen years time. Should it embrace small businesses, should it be a dormitory community with residents commuting to other towns, should it try to attract tourists and visitors, does it need to attract young people should it aim to be an old peoples retreat; many questions! Once the Vision is formatted, then the Plan must schedule the shape, size and facilities it will require to achieve this Vision and to provide long-term sustainability.

The Process

In order to obtain as much information relating directly to the views and wishes of the Hurworth community, a questionnaire will be prepared and distributed to every household in the parish. This is your chance to shape your future.

The results of the questionnaire will be carefully evaluated, and priorities will emerge. The details will be analysed, notations listed, priority weightings allocated, and a picture should emerge.

Throughout the process there will be a close liaison with Darlington Borough Council, and the Hurworth Plan should be dovetailed into the Darlington Borough Framework. Future planning will then be in accordance with the two bodies future outlook.

There is likely to be at least two Public Meetings to involve the residents and all parties and stakeholders, so that all views are heard. The first is likely to be the Annual Assembly on 19th May 2017.

Looking to the Future

The Referendum and Acceptance

All residents of Hurworth Parish will have the opportunity to vote on whether the parish will accept the Neighbourhood Plan. This is essential as it is critical to the development objectives which will affect your quality of life, and whether you wish to stay in Hurworth in future years. You will need to decide whether you 'buy into' the Vision.

The Timeframe

Clir Wood hopes to be able to complete the exercise and schedule the referendum in eighteen months. This means that by the time the 2018 Annual Assembly is arranged in May 2018, a fully detailed report with supporting material, and conclusions should be available for debate.

The Benefits

It is essential that your local Parish Council have solid guidelines upon which to direct their actions, spend your money, and achieve your wishes. The new Plan will provide these guidelines.

It is vital that future building developments are controlled so that the Vision can be achieved. The final Plan, which requires the acceptance of Darlington Borough Council, will provide the mechanism to work together to decide the number of new buildings, their location and the style in which they are constructed.

In the event that the village is to become larger, then it is essential that the appropriate infrastructure is in in place.

The amount of funding needed to achieve your Vision needs to be calculated, so that funding can be raised to finance your plans.

The Hurworth Plan will help you to decide whether this is the village you wish to live in, and will become a keystone for new people who may wish to consider bringing their families to our village.

Conclusion

This is your village, your home is here, this will be your decision, please ensure that you participate in this process. There will be no benefit in complaining afterwards, please get involved.

Hurworth Spring Bulbs

During October EPICH volunteers planted twelve bags of King Alfred daffodil bulbs along the entrances to the Grange estate and Westfield Drive and around Hurworth Place.

Narcissi bulbs were planted on the riverside opposite the Cornet and on the grass area next to Lime Cottage.

Four bags of woodland bulbs containing winter aconite, snowdrops, bluebells, native small daffodils and crocus bulbs have been planted at Hawkswood, on the roadside area at entrance to Grange Avenue, on the grass area beside the Otter and Fish, beside the tootpath on Emmerson Road comer and on a small triangle of grass near the village Green

Thank you for the location suggestions, the words of encouragement given to us when out planting and to the two residents who gave up their time to help and even supplied us with tea and biscuits! All greatly appreciated!

Please continue to let us know of areas around the village where you would like to see spring bulbs planted. Tell us of any locations you think would benefit from spring colour and give us an address or brief description of the area so we can find it!

We will supply the bulbs and the planting volunteers - although we are always happy for arriyone to come along and help.

EPICH at the Grange

EPICH would like to thank one of our local residents Brian Gable for all the support and advice given to us in order to enhance the Heritage Orchard site at the Grange. Brian has kindly donated several apple trees and a vine which have been planted in that area.

Wildlife Map

The child friendly wildlife map, which describes the flora and fauna to be spotted when walking along Hurworth public footpaths, is ready for printing and should be available for spring time. Copies will be available from the Grange Community Centre, the Mustard Tree Café and local schools and businesses.

Beekeeping

During the winter, regular visits to the aplary are needed to ensure the tilves remain intact and free from mice infestation. Insulation covers are put around the hives to protect the bees from extreme cold and damp. Extra food in the form of sugar fondant is placed above the cluster where the bees are keeping the Queen warm. Beekeepers are busy sorting out all the equipment they will need for the next season.



EPICH PROJECT 2017

We are always looking for opportunities to help people get closer to nature. Our idea is to convert part of the pathway around the Community Centre grounds into a more user friendly surface, making it accessible to all residents. Eventually it is hoped that this path will link up with the Glebe public footpath forming a circular route within the village. Below is a photo of a similar type of an all weather pathway.

With this in mind, EPICH have researched materials and costs and have applied for a grant to help with the expense. Supporting letters from HPC and HCA have been included with the application, as EPICH are not the landowners. Hopefully our application will be looked on favourably.



SOS Darlington Memorial Hospital



Darlington has a non-Party
Political Campaign fighting
to avoid the downgrading of
Darlington Memorial Hospital's
key services. This campaign is
supported by both Darlington's
Labour Party MP Jenny
Chapman and Richmond
Conservative Party MP Rishi
Sunak. Proposals to be put
forward by County Durham and
Darlington NHS Foundation

trust could well include the loss of Darlington's A&E Dept. and Consultant led maternity services.

This campaign is therefore aimed at preventing these changes becoming the preferred option when the formal consultation commences on the 1stJune.

If DMH lost its A&E it would mean medical Emergencies being transferred to James Cook, North Tees or Durham which could have a very significant impact on the safety of our rural communities.

Given the above, the prospect of all A&E services being transferred away from Darlington, and with the Ambulance service under such severe strain, the end result could be that lives may be lost due to the extra time taken to get appropriate hospital care.

At the Hurworth Parish Council meeting on 2nd February, the council voted unanimously to support this campaign.

Highways

As you can see from our HPC speed monitor data, speeding is a major concern along Roundhill Road, Hurworth Road and The Green/WestEnd, particularly at peak times.

HPC is seeking to provide wheelie bin stickers to residents on these main routes to remind motorists, on refuse collection days, of the need to slow down— would you like to be part of a Highways Working Group? We continue to lobby Ron Hogg (our Police and Crime Commissioner) regarding speeding in our village and our speeding data is sent every month to Sergeant Cat Iley at Durham Police in order that resources may be deployed to our village to combat speeding.

HPC have ensured the zig-zag lines outside Hurworth Primary on Roundhill Road have been extended so that motorists have a clear line of sight and our lollipop lady is now visible from the Spar corner. Darlington's Parking Enforcement
Team have responded to our reports
of motorists parking inappropriately
and illegally during school run times.
PLEASE KEEP ZIG-ZAG LINES CLEAR
and PARK RESPONSIBLY for everyone's
safety.

We have had many reports of motorists entering Blind Lane via the wrong side of the monument. We are investigating the possibility of increased signage in this area.

We have noted the large potholes outside All Saints Church and reported this to DBC. If you are aware of any potholes or issues, do get in touch.

Finally, Community Speed Watch in Hurworth is set to recommence. Sergeant Cat lley is ensuring the resources will be made available to our team of twelve volunteers!
