



Chairperson's Comments

I was recently asked to be chairman, and it was an easy decision to say 'yes', as I work with a great group of councillors; people from the village who give up their time and effort to make sure Hurworth continues to be a great place to live.

Over the past year, the council has been busy with various projects; some are fairly easy to notice, others less so.

The council have carried out repairs to the floor of the art room at the Grange, and this now means that the room will be available to rent out more frequently, and in a much better state of repair.

Hurworth recently became involved in the very first speed watch control in the area. Volunteers, from the village, will be out with speed monitoring equipment in various 'speeding hot spots' around the village. Speed monitoring has been carried out previously, but we have now been given our very own monitoring equipment; allowing us to tackle and control the speed within the village on a more frequent basis.

To allow improved access, for people who use wheelchairs and push chairs, an improved walkway is due to be laid between The Glebe and the rear of The Grange.

The council has recently completed repairs to the internal road on the village green, as large potholes were becoming a serious hazard for the local residents.

At the Hurworth Annual Assembly, held on the 19th May, the main subject discussed was the launch of the Neighbourhood Plan. Look out for the questionnaires, which will be going out to all households in the near future, and please complete them as it's important for residents to be able to voice their opinion about the future of Hurworth.

FRIENDS OF ROCKLIFFE COURT (GARDEN BUDDY SCHEME)

Over ten years ago residents of Rockcliffe Court commented to Barbara Bell their gardens were neglected. The owners of the sheltered housing had the grass cut but the flower beds were not cared for and needed cultivation. The large central garden facing the cricket club and the small residents' gardens near their windows lacked colour and interest.

Barbara decided to improve the outlook of the disabled residents at the sheltered accommodation so recruited friends and set up a scheme to develop and maintain the gardens. The gardens have blossomed and many residents enjoy the involvement of choosing flowers and plants then seeing them grow. Some residents have few visitors and the scheme provides a friend to chat with when the garden buddy calls to do the weeding or dead heading.

Barbara Bell has been Chair of this Registered Charity for ten years but with increasing home commitments she has unfortunately, decided to resign. Barbara hopes another Chair will continue the good work. The original Garden Buddies are now ten years older and some are unable continue. New people are needed.

It is not an onerous commitment as each garden is very small. Volunteers work in their own spare time, which benefits them and helps residents to enjoy their gardens.

The annual garden fête is much enjoyed and wonderfully supported by local people. It is organised by the Garden Buddies and in the past has provided enough income to cover expenses and purchase plants for the gardens. The friendly contact and gardening skills are much appreciated by residents and staff who wish to see the scheme to continue.

EPICH Beekeeping

We have four strong hives which are quickly multiplying in number as the queen increases her laying capabilities. The flying bees are bringing in lots of pollen and nectar which is used as food. The bees convert the nectar to honey which is stored in supers. Beekeepers harvest some of this honey for themselves.

New Village Notice Boards

In order to reach as many people as possible it was put to the council that we erect 3 large notice boards for passing traffic. Not only would this promote village events to residents but it would also market them to through traffic. Once the motion was passed, and, after researching all the different boards available, a design was selected which was in keeping for the rural setting in which they would be placed. In time, flowers will be planted around the bases so they will be a pleasant feature as people enter the village as well as promoting the events.

My Memories of Hurworth

My name is Carol Spence (nee Scott). I was born in Hurworth on 17th October 1947 in the Gables. The Gables was a very large house opposite the Church. Several families lived in the Gables. Our family lived on the top floor in one room. Our family consisted of my Mum and Dad, brother John and me. Next door lived Mrs Brently and family. Along the corridor there lived a couple. The husband had been injured in the First World War.



On the middle floor lived Mr and Mrs Hunter and family. On the bottom floor there was Mr and Mrs Pugh and family and Mr and Mrs Akers and family Mrs Akers was my Auntie Vera.

At the back of the building lived my Granddad and Grandma, Uncles and Aunties. Next to them was Mr and Mrs Nimmo and family. They had a Guard Dog called Nell. Next door was Dr and Mrs Adison who were lovely people (their house is now flats opposite the Church). Next to them was the farm where the Shutt family consisting of two sons and two daughters lived.

To the left of the Gables were two cottages. On the corner lived the Mr and Mrs Pybus they had a son Bill and two daughters. Next door was Mr and Mrs Berryman they had a daughter Janet. Mr Berryman had a garden at the back of the cottage. It was full of beautiful flowers. We used to call it The Secret Garden. Behind the two cottages there was a little

house where a friend lived. Next to the Berrymans was the Reading Room where the men of the village used to read the papers and play snooker and darts. Women were not allowed in only the cleaner. Above the Reading Room was a place where you could

buy baby milk. Further down were two houses owned by the Etheringtons who were saddlers. Old Mr. Etherington would sit outside sewing saddlery and boots. The smell of leather was wonderful. Ozzie their son sold newspapers. A few more houses along was Hayes shop. It

was tiny inside but sold most things, an old fashioned village shop, it is now Poppy cottage. Then there was Bell's the butchers. They slaughtered animals at the back and you could see meat hanging in the buildings at the rear. After the Butchers there were a few houses. My friend Maureen lived in a flat between two houses. Then there was the Old Chapel which became a carpenters shop.

The next houses all had big steps, I am sure that this was to stop flooding from the river. They had no electricity or inside toilets. Mr. & Mrs. Smith and family lived in one of them.

Then there was the Blacksmiths who were Mr & Mrs Longstaff, they had two children, one of whom Rosemary, was a friend. Then there was the Pub, The Otter & Fish over the road from which lived Mr Pybus, Colin and Marianne. Then the Curbinson family including Dot, another friend.

Over the road on the riverside lived the Lawrences and their children Gilly, Christine and Rosemary another lovely family. You can still bump into Gilly in the village and Rosemary has just moved back into the village. Then there were a few cottages and then the main building of the village The Emerson Arms. The landlord was Pat Macalane with his wife and daughter Moya. Next were a few cottages, Mr & Mrs Segger lived in one and a dinner lady at the infant school I knew as auntie Evalyn.



Ozzie Etherington delivered newspapers in the village for 60 years.

Then came the Village Hall and a few other properties followed by the Fish shop which was ran by the Dodds family, they had two daughters. Next lived the Lunn's, in a grocer's shop, which is now the church yard. A horrible place riddled with rats and mice. Then there was a big house where my friend Denise lived with her mam and sisters. All have now died and lie in the Churchyard. Up the village was the Macaby's Post Office. Over the road was Swifts shop and Farnaby's Tobacconist.

I went to the village school, Juniors and Infants at one end and Seniors at the other. I loved the school, everyone knew each other. I particularly remember going carol singing and everyone knew who we were. I love the village and always have. All the families in The Gables looked out for each other. I remember our cat being let out on a night and then let in the following morning. It would cry all the way up the stairs waking everyone up. Everyone shouted "that bloody cat". Things have changed and, so they should but memories are everything and you young ones will recall your own. I moved into Sanderson road in 1966. I remember the houses being built on fields that used to be part of the farm. The farm stretched from Church View down to Strait Lane. Michael Hunter and Mr Shutt used to call the cows for milking. Hey Up used to get them moving.

I was asked to write down my memories they may be, not as others remember. So forgive me if you think some are wrong or not as you remember them. Your memories will live on with you.

Triumph For Hurworth Academy

On 4th May 2017, I was selected to attend a Computer Science Competition (age 11-16) at Durham Leadership Centre, Spennymoor, where my team from Hurworth Academy (Will Phillips, Ellis Buckley, Damiano Regglani and I) took part in an activity to find the password to a locked briefcase, which was placed at the front of the room. Many teams from all over the country simultaneously took part in the event.

The event needed the skills learned in our computing lessons at school to be utilised (our teacher being Mr. Elliott who accompanied us to the event). We were all given a pack of evidence containing suspect's DNA report and information (place of residence, age, name etc.) and some photos. The equipment we were given to find the code was a smarties tube, two long sheets of paper that had the alphabet on (one upper the other lower case), a magnifying glass and a computer tablet (containing many documents but no internet).

We then had to use the equipment and study the evidence to see if anything could be used or combined such as: use the magnifying glass provided to see hidden words in the photos and finding a letter on the smarties tube. We then placed the right letter on the alphabet sheets over the ones on the tube and wrapped it round multiple times to make a sentence. Those sentences might then be a document name on the tablet, which held more information and created more tasks.

It was a fun, friendly event that the team really enjoyed. To top it off our team found the code first and therefore won the competition.

Parish Council Approved Projects in 2017

Your council continues to take a proactive role in 2017, and in addition to the major project of compiling the Neighbourhood Plan, several other significant projects will be rolled out. These include:-

- A firm based pathway through the woods in Hurworth Grange will provide a passageway suitable for prams, pushchairs, mobility chairs and cycles. This is the first phase of a two-part project to provide a circular route from the entrance of the Grange via the Glebe, to Roundhill Road. EPIC are undertaking the project, overseen by HCA and funded by the Big Lottery.
- The art Room in the Grange is being totally refurbished, with new flooring, and wall design. This will become an attractive room, which can be used for meetings, drama groups, art classes and children's events, this is being funded by the Durham County Charitable Trust.

- The Grange is going to have a second entrance, which will be constructed at the fire exit of the Fletcher Hall. This structure will provide a disabled entrance, standard and disabled toilets and will become the main entrance for events in the Fletcher Hall.

This extension to the building will allow the main hall to become self-contained, thereby allowing more than one function to be hosted within the Grange. The Grange is attracting more and more groups, associations and people every year, as the community realise the huge potential of this wonderful venue. There are functions every day, and the Grange Bar, under Ian Palmer is become a popular watering hole, with both indoor and outdoor facilities. The recently repaved patio, with new seating and umbrellas now has an outdoor heater, just in case it gets a little chilly.

We thank Heineken for providing part of the funding for this new project. Other grants are being sought.

Prestigious award for Hurworth lady Milly Stoney

Milly Stoney was recently received the "Exceptional Volunteer of the Year" award sponsored by the Tees Valley Rural Community Council at the Best of Darlington 2017 ceremony in March. Her recommendation for the award included some of the following information:

Milly has volunteered at Darlington Citizens Advice for 31 years and she has brought stability to the lives of many residents of the town by giving advice on many issues including debt management, welfare

benefits, housing, immigration and asylum problems as well as employment, consumer complaints and landlord/tenant disputes. She has helped over five thousand people with over

seven thousand problems. Milly's passion is to ensure that all aspects of client care and peoples' voices are heard. After looking at the problems of clients she collates information to influence policymakers with the aim of renewing laws and addressing unfair practices which affect the people of Darlington.

Milly also has many wider interests in helping the community. In particular, she is on the board of the Hurworth Rogers Charitable Trust which supports the elderly and those suffering from mental illness in the Hurworth area. This has helped many residents to reach their goals with successful outcomes.

Hurworth says 'goodbye' to PCSO John Angus, our local 'bobby'. John retired at the end of April, after serving in Hurworth and the adjacent villages for the last 14 years.

In recent times the PACT figures show that Hurworth is a quiet and safe place to live, with very little crime and anti-social behaviour to report. It was not always like this.

Ten years ago the Grange used to be the centre of youth anti-social behaviour, with incidents of chairs being thrown through the windows, drugs and alcohol being distributed by vehicles on the skateboard rink, intimidation of residents and general bad behaviour. For almost two years the Grange needed to employ a 'bouncer' to man the doors when an event was being held. The additional expenses incurred on repairs and security almost brought the viability of the Grange to a halt.

John, with the help of his colleagues managed to overcome the problems; many of the culprits were from out of Hurworth, and they were sent back to their own villages; the drug and alcohol distribution was squashed, our quality of life improved immensely.

John was an 'old fashioned' bobby; if you had a problem, whether it be with a neighbour, bullying, traffic problems, disturbances, youthful over exuberance,

or sometimes even a private problem, John would come to your assistance. He seemed to know everybody, and would knock on the doors, talk to people and resolve the problems, politely and positively. He will be a great loss to our community.

We all wish him well!



At the Annual Assembly on 19th May, John was presented with a leaving present, part of which was a voucher for the golf shop, as he and his wife are moving to Scotland, and he intends to bring his golf handicap down, and enjoy the local range of beverages.

Cllr Paul Walters later added: I have met John's replacement in training, PCSO Patryk Montelaty. We had a good chat and I explained that, as the police liaison councillor for Hurworth, I wanted to maintain the excellent relationship we currently have with the police and help in any way I can. Patryk has confirmed he will be able to attend the Parish council meeting on the 6th July and will be introducing himself to those present.
