## Pupil premium

Typical barriers to learning at Annie Lennard Primary School;

- Behaviour issues
- SEND
- Domestic Violence
- Parental Separation
- Emotional Issues
- Attendance
- Parenting Capacity
- Drug/ alcohol abuse
- Punctuality
- Parental engagement
- Mental Health in the family
- LAC

Schools will receive the following funding for each pupil registered as eligible for free school meals (FSM) at any point in the last 6 years:

- £1,320 for pupils in reception to year 6

Schools will receive £1,900 for any pupil:

- identified in the census or the [alternative provision census](#) as having left local-authority care as a result of one of the following:
  - adoption
  - a special guardianship order
  - a child arrangements order (previously known as a residence order)
- who has been in local-authority care for 1 day or more
- recorded as both eligible for FSM in the last 6 years and as being looked after (or as having left local-authority care)

There are currently 48 pupils on the pupil premium register, this equates to £83700 of funding.

The funding enables us to having a support member of staff in each classroom, subsidising educational visits, providing specific interventions for those pupils who need it as well as specific resources.

## Priorities 2020 – 2021

Accelerate the progress of disadvantaged pupils so that this is in line with national/ school non-disadvantaged pupil data.

- By the end of Year 6, the percentage of disadvantaged pupils attaining expected levels in maths, reading and writing overall is at least in line with national disadvantaged, non and school non-disadvantaged.
- Pupils eligible for funding make progress that is least in line with non-premium funding pupils.
- Structured intervention programmes to increase the rates of progress for disadvantaged pupils
- Attendance of pupil premium pupils is in line with non-premium pupils.
- Disadvantaged pupils are offered enrichment activities subsidised by funding.

<p><b>Family Support worker</b> is currently supporting vulnerable premium children and their families.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Pupil Premium children make up 50% of our Persistent Absence.</li><li>• Pupil Premium children make up 65% of pupils that receive family support through Early Help, Child in need, Child protection plans and previously looked after.</li></ul>	£18,000 (1/2 of salary covered through premium funding)		
<p><b>Learning Support</b> in each class. 43% of pupils on the SEN register are in receipt of premium funding; therefore, a proportion of the funding will contribute to learning support salaries.</p>	£60,000 (72% of the funding contributes to wards salaries)		
<p><b>Subsidy for Trips/ clubs/ residential/ enrichment activities</b> As an area of deprivation we find that families are living on the bread line. Without help from school many children would not be able to share the experiences that their peers do. This little subsidy contributes to them accessing the same as their peers.</p>	£4000		
<p><b>Additional resources/ support</b> Including uniform, counselling etc...</p>	£1700
