The Pupil Premium is funding provided to publically funded schools in England which is additional to main school funding. The purpose of the fund is to raise the attainment of disadvantaged pupils and to close the gap between themselves and their peers. It is allocated according to the number of pupils on roll who are eligible for free school meals (FSM), service families and for pupils who have been 'Looked After' (in care) for 6 months or more. Since 2012, funding was extended to include pupils who have been eligible for free school meals within the last 6 years.

The Government believes that the Pupil Premium is the best way to address the current underlying inequality in outcomes between pupils eligible for FSM and pupils who are not eligible. The Government believe it is necessary to provide funding to disadvantaged families as a way of supporting the families and pupils who need it most. However it is for schools to decide how the Pupil Premium is spent, since they are best placed to assess what additional provision should be made for the individual pupils within their responsibility. Schools are held accountable for how they have used the additional funding to support pupils from low-income families and from September 2012 this information must be published.

THE CONTEXT OF THE SCHOOL

- Barford St Peter's is a village school. The pupils are taught in six classes of which two are mixed ages. Reception became single form in September 2013 and the school increased the PAN to 30 in September 2015.
- The socio-economic backgrounds of pupils are mainly professional. The vast majority of pupils are well motivated, have a positive attitude, are keen to experience new challenges and possess a good range of personal skills to help them access the curriculum and realise their potential.
- Most pupils benefit from a strong home-school partnership that supports a positive attitude to learning and have rich and varied experiences outside of school which complement their learning in school.
- The number of FSM pupils is well below the national average. In September 2018 it was 3. We have 6 previously LAC. The proportion of pupils with learning difficulties and/or disabilities is broadly average.
- **11.5%** of pupils are from ethnic minorities or mixed race families.
- Most pupils enter into the Reception Class from our onsite Pre-School and are broadly in line with the national average. They make a strong start to their school life socially, emotionally and academically
- Barford has a strong family feel and a nurturing ethos, this is very important in **creating a warm, friendly environment** where there is a tangible feel of everyone working together as a tightly knit family, where achievements are shared and relationships are highly productive. Each pupil is well known by the teachers and looked on as an individual as a result, pupils approach their work with confidence, high levels of self-esteem and are not afraid of learning from their mistakes. Opportunities for personalized learning approaches, extended care and well-being of pupils and parents partnering with the school are extensive – a large majority of parents engage in this partnership (**100% attendance at Parents Evening and 80% Stay and Play sessions**). The pupils are prepared very well for the next stage in their education.
- The excellent curriculum motivates pupils because it takes into account their interests and aspirations and is enriched through an outstanding range of clubs and extra-curricular activities, some of which are free. The participation rate by pupils is high with pupils competing at a very good standard in both music and sport, enabling the identification of gifted and talented pupils.
- The school's breakfast and after-school clubs (Inspirations) provide a friendly and stimulating environment where pupils of all ages mix well together, something parents and carers particularly value.
