Independent Study Task

In French you will meet a lot of new language which will seem overwhelming to begin with. You will also be expected to be able to watch a French speaking film and read a piece of French literature and be able to write about them in the target language. We are asking you to complete a task based this which will break you in gently to the new A Level.

You need to produce a presentation summarising a French film of your choice. It can be an old or modern film. You can often find these on both Netflix and Amazon or you may be able to borrow one from the library.

You will also need to research the director and main actors using the internet. Information should be in your own words and not copied and pasted. You should also include a list of references stating the sources you used to help you.

Extension: include a piece of writing about yourself in French demonstrating your best work.

The notes and presentation should be handed in during your first lesson.
