### **Head Teacher's Update**

It is an honour to write in the Newsletter for the first time as Headteacher.

The past 10 weeks have been somewhat of a whirlwind of productivity and ideas. It's been fascinating to listen to children, staff and parents talk about their plans for Maidenhill's future. Many of these ideas are already taking shape and I'm looking forward to delivering these over the next few years. So far:

- Students, staff, and other stakeholder groups have revamped our mantra which from September will become 'Be Kind, Aspire, Persevere, Achieve'. Whilst we retain kindness as a virtue, this represents a significant shift to ensure we remain deeply aspirational for the academic outcomes and real world success of our students.
- Our curriculum has been substantially improved and at Key Sage 4, students will now study 9 GCSEs including 4 options subjects. 5 new courses on offer are Statistics, Computer Science, Health and Social Care, Travel & Tourism and Photography. Our Key Stage 3 curriculum will also see Dance and Photography introduced for the first time, broadening students' experiences further.
- We have **recruited teaching staff exceptionally well**. We must be one of the few schools around that is overstaffed for September with Subject Specialist teachers in all areas. This will ensure students get the very best teaching and learning experiences possible.
- We're improving our digital capacity with the building of a new state of the art IT suite
  and the purchase of new DSLR cameras for Photography. We are recruiting a new Social
  Media leader who will ensure we have a place on the national stage, so we can share the
  incredible things our students do day-in, day-out, with you.

We have recently secured money to improve our toilet facilities across the school. Our
Governing body has also pledged extra funding to ensure that we support the most
fundamental of necessities! We're re-vamping our approach to toilet use and more
information will follow.

• We have made plans for the first time for our **Year 10 students to engage in work experience**. Additionally, students in school in July will have, subject to satisfactory school conduct, the opportunity to participate in an **'activities week'** in a celebration of their approach to learning all year.

I look forward to seeing Maidenhill grow from strength to strength with you!









#### **Eco Council**

Maidenhill's Eco-council have been working hard this term to turn an unused area into a beautiful space for nature (and students) to use. They secured a £460 grant through the Green Influencers Scheme and have planned, purchased and planted a variety of plants with pollinating insects in mind. The group are currently making bug hotels, using the wise

expertise of tech-genius Mr Sadler and plan to plant a small wildflower meadow on the school site next academic year.

Maxine Strode (Y10 RJS), has been training as an Elite gymnast and is a Junior squad member at The Academy of Gymnastics in Portishead.

In December last year, Maxine qualified to represent the Southwest Team at the Women's Artistic Gymnastics (WAG) National finals and their team brought home the Bronze medal. Maxine's high score on Bars and another team member's high score on Beam secured a silver medal for the South West Team for their total scores in each apparatus.

In April, Maxine won 1st place National 3 South West Champion, 2nd place on Bars, 1st on Range and went on to represent South West Team in The National 3 WAG Finals in Stoke-on-Trent.

On Saturday the 20th May, Maxine competed (with the South West Team) in the WAG National 3 Finals at Stoke-on-Trent. The South West Team came 1st and is the 2023 WAG National 3 Champions.

Maxine garnered a total score of 49.00 in all her apparatus, taking the 4th place out of 62 competitors

The students participated in numerous events including Shotput, Javelin, Discus, Long Jump and High Jump, alongside a list of short and middle-distance track events.




